Forrest Durbin, 77, Former Warehouse Manager Passes

Forrest W. Durbin, a former manager of the Genesee Union Warehouse Co., passed away at 8:20 a. m. Saturday, May 28 at Latah Care Center, Moscow.



Forrest had been employed by the warehouse firm 42 years when he retired in 1970. He was only the third manager in the firm's history. He was born July 19, 1905 in Nevada County, Missouri, the son of William F. and Hettie Durbin. Three years later the family moved to Troy, where his father was employed by the railroad.

He graduated from Troy High School and then earned a degree in business at the University of Idaho. He went to work for Genesee Union Warehouse as a bookkeeper October 15, 1928, and was named manager September 10, 1947. He was manager of the firm for the next 23 years.

Forrest married Lillian Messmer July 9, 1939, at Moscow, and she survives at the family home.
He was a member of the Genesee Community Church and the Shrine at Lewiston. He also was a 50-year member of both the Masonic Lodge and the Order of the Eastern Star.
Other survivors include three sons, Richard of Verdale, Wa., David of Goleta, Ca., and Robert of Boise; a daughter, Marilyn Markell of Aurora, Colo., two sisters, Edna Durbin of Moscow and Lucille Kiebert of Hope, Id., and six grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted at 11:00 a. m. Tuesday at the Genesee Community Church with the Rev. Roger Herndon officiating.
Burial was at the Genesee City Cemetery with a committal service by the Masonic Lodge.

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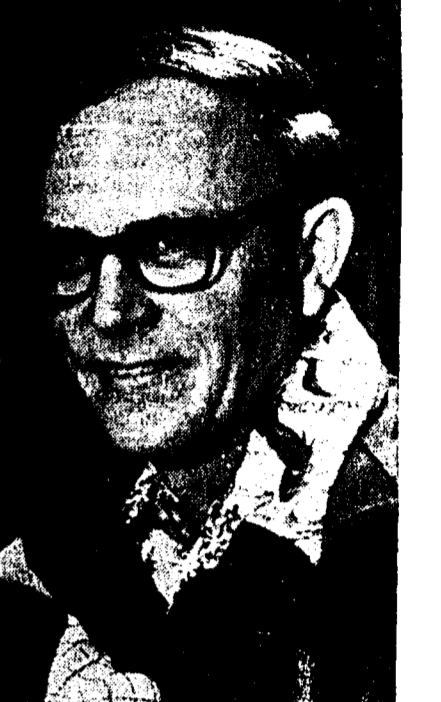
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Floyd Heimgartner Retires As Juliaetta Postmaster

Floyd K. Heimgartner, Postmaster of the Juliaetta Post Office, will be retired June 1, 1983, after having served the longest term as postmaster in Juliaetta's history.



Of the 100 years the post office has existed (began by Charles Snyder in October 1882, named after his daughters, Julia and Etta), Mr. Heimgartner has been Juliaetta's Postmaster for 26 years, from 1957-1983.

He retires with 30 years of government service. Besides serving the federal government as postmaster, Mr. Heimgartner has also been a pilot with the Naval Air Corps during WW II and an auxiliary mail carrier in Juliaetta before being appointed by President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1957 as Postmaster.

Mr. Heimgartner's appointment followed Myrtle Cochran as postmaster while May Walsh was Officer-in-Charge before Mr. Heimgartner officially took his post.

Mr. Heimgartner was instrumental for the new building constructed in 1974 which now houses the current postal services in Juliaetta. He remembers when mail was delivered three times a day by railroad prior to the Highway Post Office trucks (HPO's) and the current contract service. Besides the change in mail delivery during his term, Mr. Heimgartner has experienced the change of postal rates ranging from the 3c stamp for first class mail to the 20c stamp.

While being postmaster and a member of the National Association of Postmasters for 26 years, Mr. Heimgartner has served as Board member of the Kendrick Joint School District for 9 years; as Juliaetta's City Clerk in the 1960's and 1970's; as Board member of the Nezah Cemetery District for 3 terms; and active member and Treasurer of the Kendrick Lodge No. 26 AF & AM; a charter member in the Juliaetta-Kendrick ambulance service of EMT's; a volunteer member of the Juliaetta Fire Department.

In September the next Juliaetta Postmaster should be appointed Ben Carpenter of Lewiston from the Clarkston Post Office is the Officer-in-Charge.

Now that retirement has begun, Mr. Heimgartner will continue his volunteer and civic activities, along with more time for fishing, traveling, pursuing hobbies, but more importantly, along with more time to enjoy life and his family.

Pre-heating Oven Is Not Necessary, Study Shows

Moscow, Idaho—You can cut fuel costs by ignoring recipe instructions that tell you to "cook in a preheated oven," according to Marilyn

Swanson, food and nutrition specialist for the U.I Cooperative Extension Service. Foods of excellent quality can be prepared without preheating the oven, she said.

"These studies evaluated plain muffins, yellow cake, baked custard, apple pie, tuna casserole, frozen tuna casserole, cheese souffle and meat

loaves. Foods were baked in standard gas ovens and standard and self-cleaning electric ovens," the University of Idaho nutrition specialist said.

Foods cooked in non-preheated ovens required a little extra baking time—not more than five minutes extra. "There was only a slight difference in baking time between preheated and non-preheated ovens. Larger variances were noted when the different types of ovens were compared. Even when ovens were preheated, some ovens required considerably longer baking times than other models," Swanson said.

The studies showed that energy costs could be cut about 10 percent by baking foods in non-preheated ovens. In appearance and quality, there were few appreciable differences between foods cooked in preheated and non-preheated ovens.

"When fuel costs were low, people preheated their ovens without thinking much about it. Now, we can't afford to waste energy. The USDA studies indicate that preheating the oven is an unnecessary use of energy and is not essential for good product quality," Swanson said.

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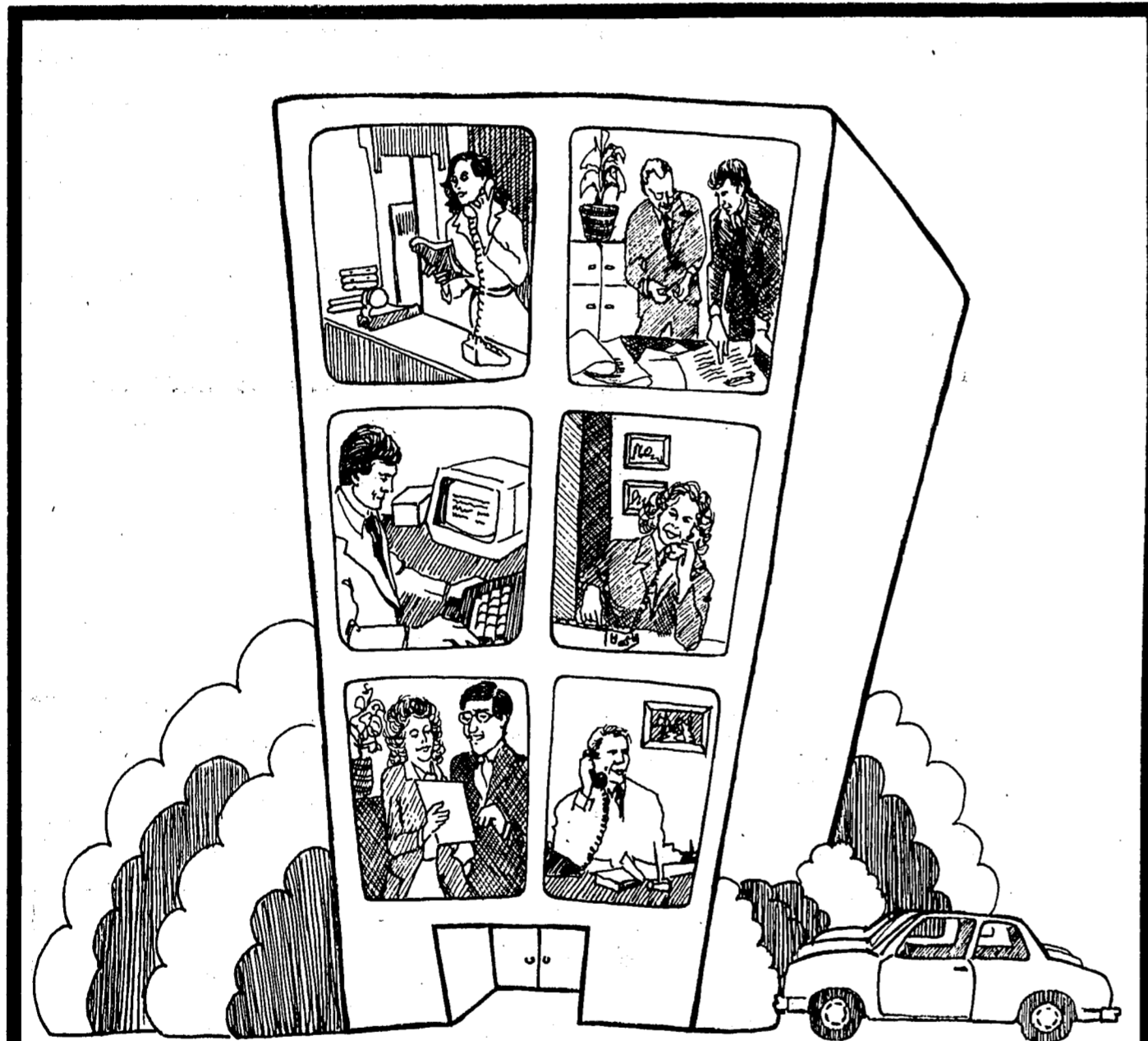

Arthritis—Number One Crippling Disease

Arthritis is the nation's number one crippling disease, but it comes in dead last in public support when compared to other major health problems, reports the Arthritis Foundation.

"Many people still think of arthritis as only the minor aches and pains of old age," said Sharon McKeeth of the Arthritis Foundation's Idaho Chapter. "They don't realize that arthritis cripples, disables and in some cases even kills its victims."

Arthritis is an umbrella term that encompasses over 100 separate diseases. The most common are osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, lupus, spinal arthritis, scleroderma and gout. It strikes at all ages, including infancy.

"Even though arthritis is the most common disease in this coun-

try it receives an extremely low amount of financial support from the public," said Sharon McKeeth.

Over 31 million Americans have arthritis, and last year 68 cents per person was donated to find a cure for their disease. By comparison, approximately 250,000 people have muscular dystrophy, and \$369 per patient was donated to find a cure for their disease. Arthritis also receives less public support than cancer, heart disease, and cerebral palsy.

"Congress has declared May as Arthritis Month to bring the problems of arthritis to the attention of the nation," said Sharon McKeeth. "The Arthritis Foundation is working to provide answers for this serious health problem, but we need everyone's help. We receive no government funding, so we depend on private contributions."

Women Also Have Social Security Benefit Eligibility

Every American is affected either directly or indirectly by Social Security, but certain elements of the program are particularly relevant to women.

While we occasionally read about a man remaining at home to care for his children while his wife is employed outside the home, these are not the usual roles; it is almost always the woman who interrupts her career to raise the children. These women should realize that the work credits they have already earned remain on their work record and are added to any additional credits they earn after returning to work.

Some women, like men, work throughout their adult lives. These women are earning credits toward their retirement benefits. In addition, those who are married and have children are also earning protection for their families, including disability and survivors insurance.

For example, a woman who becomes disabled and is unable to work for at least 12 months may be eligible for disability benefits if she has worked long enough and recently enough under Social Security. Those who receive disability pay-

ments for 24 months also become entitled to Medicare protection.

The disabled woman's unmarried children may also be entitled to benefits. Monthly checks are payable to children under 18, children who became disabled before 22 and remain disabled, and children under 19 who are attending elementary or high school full time.

The disabled woman's husband may also qualify for payments if he is at least 62. Even if he is under 62, he may qualify if he is caring for a child under 16 or disabled and entitled to benefits.

If the woman dies, her widower and children may receive monthly survivors checks.
