General and controlled hunt regulations will be combined in one set of six pages as a convenience for hunters and to save on printing and shipping costs, the conservation information supervisor said. In recent years, separate sets of regulations were printed for general sea-

The department ordered 400,000 copies this year and initial shipments were scheduled for delivery to most license vendors by June 6, Williams said.

Here are the major changes in format for 1983:

-Management unit boundary descriptions will be included but listed separately for general and control-

led hunts. -In controlled hunt listings, the number of permits available will be

shown with season dates. -Instructions for preparation of controlled hunt application cards will be on separate information sheets and they are available at all

license vendor outlets. Controlled hunt application cards will again have a space to voluntarily designate any part of a refund for Citizens Against Poaching if an application is unsuccessful in

the drawing for permits. Regulations specify that applications for controlled hunt permits must be received at the departments headquarters office no later than June 30 or postmarked by that date. The computerized drawing for per-

mits will be conducted August 1. Eligible applicants can try for 7,610 elk permits this year and deer permits total 6,200. Total permits for other species include antelope, 3,213; bighorn sheep, 137; mountain goat, 59; and moose-for Idaho residents only-257.







BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAY-OR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, AS FOL-

SECTION 1. That this ordinance will be known as the Revised Annual Appropriation ordinance.

SECTION 2. That the following sum's of money, or as much thereof as may be authorized by law as may be needed or deemed necessary to defray all expenses and liabilities of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, be, and the same hereby are appropriated for the general and special municipal and corporate purposes and objects of said City, hereinafter specified for the fiscal year commencing on the first day of October, 1982, and ending on the last day of September, 1983.


