Richard L. Blewett, Long-time Kendrick Merchant, Claimed by Cancer June 23

Richard L. Blewett, a life-long resident of the Kendrick-Gifford area who owned and operated Blewett's Grocery at Kendrick for 40 years, lost his long battle with cancer and died Thursday afternoon, June 23, at Tri-State Convalescent Center at Clarkston. He was 79 and had lived at Clarkston since 1976.

Blewett was born September 3, 1903 on the family farm near Gifford to John L. and Lily M. Blewett. He lived there throughout his child-

hood, attending Blewett Grade School and graduating from Cullisau High School in 1923.

In 1925, Blewett graduated from the Coyne Electric School at Chicago. He also attended Lewiston Normal School.

In 1933, Blewett moved to Kendrick and opened Blewett's Grocery. He owned and operated the store for 40 years, retiring in 1973. He moved to Clarkston three years later.



Richard was an active member of many civic organizations at Kendrick, including Kendrick Lodge No. 26, A. F. & A. M., Kendrick Grange No. 413, and Kendrick-Julietta Lions club. He was a member of the Kendrick Golden Sunset Senior Citizens and a member and past president of the the Asotin County Gerontology Council. He sang with the Wrinkled Warblers and Asotin County Gerontology Council Choir and was interested in all sports, especially bowling and baseball.

He was a member of the Kendrick Community United Methodist Church.

On July 17, 1934, Blewett married Esther M. Bartlett. She survives him at the family home in Clarkston.

Other survivors include one son, William R. of Kendrick; four brothers, Millford and Pierce of Lewiston, Col. Aaron Blewett of Palm Desert, Calif., and Col. Rex Blewett of Ramona, Calif., and eight sisters, Neta Ruddell, Enid Geidl, Veda Hoduffer and Janet White, all of Lewiston, Miriam Cook of Kendrick, Mabel Stone of San Gabriel, Calif., Arla Geidl of Lenore, and June Stegner of Grangeville and two grandsons, Shad and Ryan Blewett of Kendrick.

One brother, Nye Blewett, preceded him in death.

The funeral was held at 11 a. m. Monday, June 27, at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with the Rev. James Watson of the Kendrick Community United Methodist Church officiating.

Organist was Mrs. Ruth Shind and vocalist was Mrs. Donna Lohman, who sang "The Old Rugged Cross" and "How Great Thou Art". Those in attendance at the service joined in singing the hymn "In the Garden".

Casket bearers were Dell Ruddell, Jack Blewett, Mike Blewett, Gary Geidl, Bob Blewett and David Stegner. Honorary Casket bearers were all those who knew and loved him.

Burial was at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens, Lewiston, Idaho.

The Loss of a Fine Man

If the success of a man's life is measured by the number of friends he leaves behind to mourn his passing, then the life of Richard L. Ble-

wett was rich and fulfilled almost beyond imagination. The chapel from which the last rites of his life were conducted was filled to overflowing by more than 500 people who had come to pay their respects to this good man . . . this good friend. The chapel could not accommodate all who gathered there Monday morning, even with additional seating arranged; and so the people stood on the sides, in the back, in the foyer, and even outside the doors in a final tribute to this farmer and merchant who had touched their lives.

As a man, a friend, and a merchant, Richard lived his life by the finest of Christian virtues. He was always friendly, unfailingly polite and honest in all matters. Hard work was always with Richard. He started the grocery store in the depths of the depression and turned it into a profitable business, mainly on the strength of hard work and dedication by he and his wife, Esther. For many years he ran both the store and the family farm, many times putting hours in at the store after spending a long day in the fields.

And, while hard work was a factor in Richard's successful life, more important, I think, was the respect and friendship he felt for others. He was seldom too busy to talk or visit, and the personal service he and Esther gave in the market are all too rare in these days of speed and modernization.

The same care and concern he gave to his family and his customers, he gave to this community and to his church. Richard Blewett had an abundance of friendship, love and a sense of caring for all he knew and he shared it in great measure. That friendship, love and respect was returned to him by a host of friends who now mourn his passing.

All of his friends were aware of Richard's long battle with cancer and the trial of pain he endured these final few months. The battle is over, the pain is gone and our friend is free. I suppose for many months to come, I will look out the window at about ten to eleven each Sunday morning and expect to see Richard on his way to church . . . I won't see him of course, but he thought that I knew this good man will make my day just a little brighter. Bill

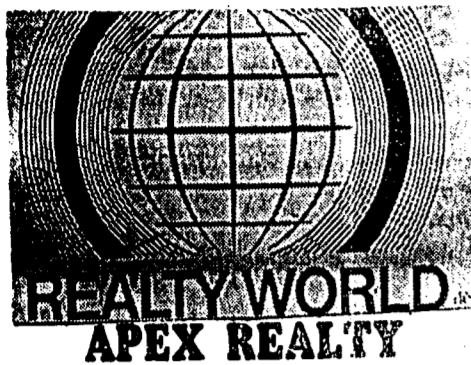

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Old - Fashioned Harvest: "Those Were the Days"

Troy—Harvest time in 1923 was an extremely busy period that left little or no time for recreation.

I began my harvest experience July 5 of that year in Genesee, Idaho. Blanche Bricka was first cook. I was second cook and Arvid Torrell was hired as waterbuck and roustabout for the cookhouse. His principle duties were running errands and driving a truck from the fields back to Genesee for groceries and water.

Our day began at 4 a. m. Hot cereal was always served, along with a variety of hotcakes, French toast, homemade syrup and eggs from day to day. We cooked on a wood stove and coffee was perked in a large granite coffee pot.

We served a forenoon and afternoon lunch. We made cookies and baked pies daily in addition to preparing the usual meals. Supper was served at 7 p. m., so our day rarely ended before 10 p. m. Sleep always came easily.

The cookhouse was a simple and unique mobile unit. Inside were six stationary tables. The benches had hinged seats that served as storage area for dishes, silverware and some

cooking supplies, and seated the 24 men on the threshing crew.

The wagon was screened on the sides to allow air flow, minus the mosquitoes, flies and other insects. Roll-down canvasses were also attached to provide further protection from the elements.

The cookwagon was built on steel wheels and pulled from the fields of Genesee to the breaks of Lewiston by two teams of mules. Lannie Yockey drove the water wagon for the threshing machines which were steam-powered.

The preparation for moving the cookhouse consisted of removing the stovepipe from the cookstove and storing the dishes and supplies in the benches. The cooks held things down during the move in addition to peeling fruits and vegetables for the next meal.

The cookhouse was also utilized as sleeping quarters for the two female cooks. A straw-filled tick was stored under the wagon and was brought in each night and placed by the cookstove. When we were in rattlesnake country, Arvid dragged the tick around with the mules to remove any snakes that might have attached themselves. The men slept outside in large straw stacks. Everyone worked six and often seven days a week. The women had three changes of clothing which were washed on a board daily along with the towels used by the men.

One large galvanized washtub was filled with heated water outside the cookhouse for the men to wash up before each meal.

Charlie Smith owned the threshing equipment and the cookhouse. He paid the crew and cooks at the end of the threshing season.

Blanche earned \$1.50 a day and I earned \$2 a day. This money provided me with the means to buy new clothes, buy my school books and finance my school for the year.

The second week of September the threshing season ended along with a memorable summer.

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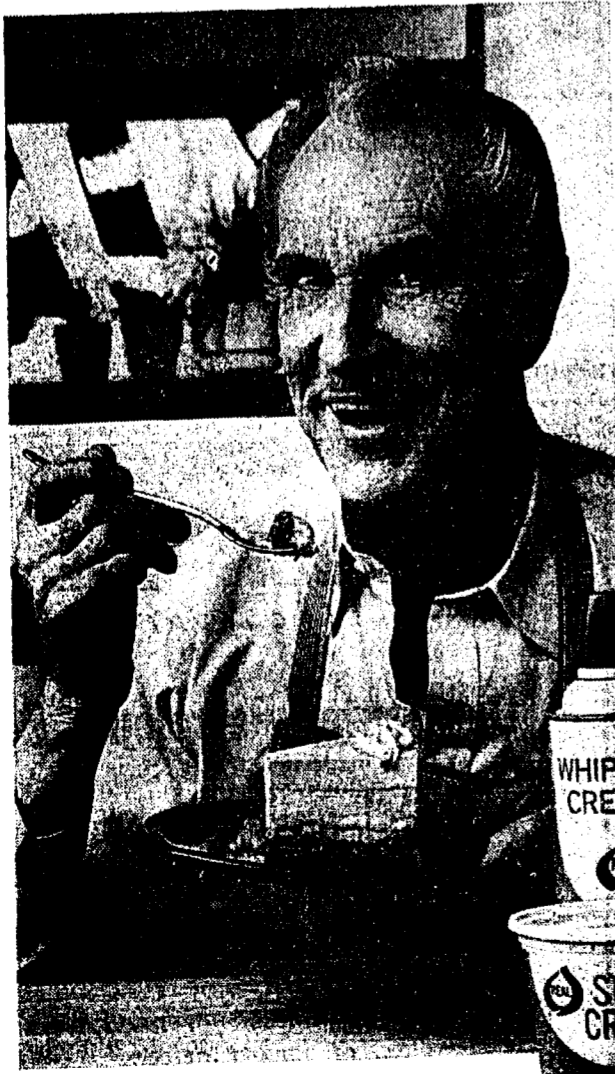

Annual Parks - Platt Picnic Scheduled For Sunday, July 17 at Spalding Park

The annual Platt-Parks pioneer group from Genesee and neighboring communities will gather at Spalding Park on Sunday, July 17, reports Kenneth Platt, group spokesman. The potluck picnic dinner is timed for "around noon."
 Begun in 1972, this old timer's get together has drawn from 35 to 65 attendants in each of the 11 years so far. Originally planned to renew acquaintances of horse-era farm families of the former Grey Eagle and Pine Grove school districts east of Genesee, the celebration now is open to all who knew the two sponsoring families in that period, as well as more recent acquaintances. The time has thinned the ranks of elder members, third and fourth generations descendants continue to hold up the total attendance.
 Both families have members who have traveled widely in foreign countries on either U. S. government or Christian mission assignments. This year there will be exhibits of photos showing scenes of Iran, Korea, Egypt and central African countries, as well as the usual family and farm scenes from the 1915-1930 period. All who come are invited to bring similar reminiscence items. Various Middle East and African artifacts will be on display.
 Growing use of the Spalding Park grounds at this season has made table and seating space crowded. Numerous card tables and folding chairs will be needed and should be marked with owners' names. Several strong backs could be used around 10 a. m. to help move one or more of the heavy park tables into place.
 The usual space along the west side of the picnic area, near the foot bridge has been reserved.
