

## Norla S. Callison, Retired American Ridge Farmer, Community Leader, Passes July 1

Norla Samuel Callison, 80, a lifelong Kendrick resident and farmer, died at his home at 11 p. m. Friday, July 1.

He was born May 9, 1903, at Kendrick to Benjamin E. and Minnie May Callison. He farmed all his life on the land homesteaded by his grandfather and farmed by his father, and now being farmed by his son, Robert.



He married Mabel Weaver at Lenore, Idaho, on October 14, 1934. She is a retired teacher and survives her husband at their home.

He was a member of the Kendrick Methodist Church, Masons, Scottish Rite, Shriners, Latah County Fair Board, lifetime member of the Elks, Eastern Star, charter member of the Kendrick Grange, Clearwater Power board of directors for 40 years, active 4-H worker, also served several years on the Kendrick School board and also on the United Methodist Church council board.

He liked fishing and hunting. He and his wife were the Grand Marshalls of the 1982 Locust Blossom Festival at Kendrick.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by a son, Robert, of Kendrick; a daughter, Nancy Lee Nye of Juliaetta; a sister, Ernestine Benschoter of Kendrick and five grandchildren. Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Thursday at Kendrick Methodist Church with the Rev. Jim Watson officiating. Burial will be at Kendrick City Cemetery.

## Don L. Jones, 62, Genesee Native, Victim of Cancer

Donald Lawrence Jones, 62, grandson of early-day Genesee settlers, died of cancer Tuesday evening, June 28 at Good Samaritan Nursing Center in Moscow. He had been a patient there one week. He had been in failing health for about six months.



Jones grew up in a hunting family, the son of the late Frank "Cowboy" Jones and Nellie Young Jones.

He was an enthusiastic hunter of both small and large game and also enjoyed trapshooting. He was a member of the National Rifle Association and the Amateur Trapshooting Association, the Lewiston and Troy-Deary gun clubs, the National Farmers Organization, of which he was a past county president; also a member of Genesee Union Whse. Co. and Moscow Elks Lodge.

Jones also helped organize the Clarkston Grain Terminal and was chairman of its board of directors until the facility was sold to United Grain Co. several years ago.

Jones was born January 24, 1921, on his parents' farm in the Pine Grove area northeast of Genesee. He attended the Pine Grove country school and graduated from Genesee High School in 1940. He was employed on a neighboring farm before going to an aircraft fabrication school in Inglewood, Calif., in 1941.

He was hired by Douglas Aircraft Co., December 8, 1941, the day after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. He was employed there until entering the U. S. Air Corps in May, 1944. He was stationed in Miami Beach Fla., and then in Guam, where he earned his private first class stripe. He was discharged in February, 1946, and returned to the family farm the following month.

He was associated with his brother in the Jones Brothers farming enterprise until about five years ago when his brother retired. He had operated the family farm since then.

He was stricken with cancer 18 months ago and had received treatment since that time, most recently traveling to Manila, the Philippines, to visit native healers.

Jones was married to Loris Jean Cain, April 11, 1943, in Long Beach, Calif. She survives at the family home. Also surviving are one son, Howard, of Genesee; three daughters, Lynée Wicks of Kaminah; Donna Jones of Lake Oswego, Ore., and Dorothy Abrams of Moscow; one brother, Glen Jones of Genesee; one sister, Luzena Chilson of Clarkston, and eight grandchildren. A sister, Hazel Hannah, died in 1981.

A memorial service was held at 2 p. m. Saturday at Short's Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Jerry Jones, pastor of the Seventh Day Adventist Church officiating. Organist Judy Schoepsling, Vocalists Sharon Jones, David and Mary Abbott.

The body was cremated and the ashes interred later in the Pine Grove Cemetery, near the Jones home.

The family suggests memorials to the Genesee Ambulance Fund or to the Good Samaritan Hospice program.

## Jim Reece Retires as Kendrick Route 1 Rural Mail Carrier July 2

"Gone Fishin'" is the sign on the Jim Reece mailbox at Cavendish. Jim completed 29½ years as a rural letter carrier July 2 and now plans to spend his time "resting, fishing, camping and playing with the grandkids."

However, first task for this "retired mailman" is to make hay for the 35 head of cattle in the cow-calf operation he runs with his brother, Bill, as "Reece Bros." Jim plans to continue in the cattle business for a time.

The grandchildren are Curtis, 15, and Todd, 10, sons of Kathy and Lowell Stuehnenberg of Mt. Lake Terrace, Wash., and Michelle, 3, and Almee, 11 months, daughters of Vicki and Chris Johnson of Ritzville, Wash.

Jim and his wife, Juanita, have always raised a large vegetable garden with Juanita canning much of the surplus to help their two daughters and their families. Her cooking and crafting abilities are famous throughout the area.

Jim began carrying mail January 11, 1954, and his route consisted of 19.3 miles around Southwick. He operated out of the Southwick Post Office.

On February 1, 1954, he was given the Star Route formerly operated by Rolin Armitage, so Jim purchased a Jeep and went to Park in eastern Latah County. He had to cross Boulder Creek Canyon and his route increased to 60 miles. After three years of this, Park was dropped from his route to be served from Deary and Jim "just went to Buck Weaver's place."

This route continued until Sept. 30, 1972, when the Southwick post-office was closed and Reece was transferred to Kendrick. At this time all the routes were changed and Reece picked up the Cavendish and North Teakcan area and American Ridge, for a total of 71 miles. Small segments were added until the route presently has 82 miles with approximately 150 boxes.

During all this time, the couple has lived in Cavendish and from 1948 to about 1955 operated from their home, the telephone switchboard connecting four farmer lines with the central office in Orofino. In 1955 the switchboard was moved to the Cavendish store and later General Telephone took over the system, installing dial telephones, integrating the area into the Orofino exchange.

Jim has never missed a day of mail carrying because of weather, and has driven many kinds of vehicle as his "mail car." These included Ford, Chevrolet, Renault, Rambler, Volkswagen, and the current 4-wheel drive Subaru. This is Jim's third Subaru and he calls it "the only car" for a mail carrier.

Jim has enjoyed watching the children on his route grow up and

seeing how they turn out. He has always been especially interested in children and likes to have them around. He has seen lots of wild life on his routes and once saw a cougar in Boulder Creek Canyon.

There are five families left of those he originally served in 1954, and he has served with three postmasters—Edith Wells at Southwick, and Bob Magnuson and Don Chrystal at Kendrick. Despite some "weird addresses" he has usually managed to put the mail in the right box.

Jim and Juanita have especially enjoyed the association and the people they met at the National Rural Letter Carrier Assn. meetings. They attended three national conventions and many state and district conferences. They were at a district meeting in Coeur d'Alene when Mt. St. Helens erupted. They made it as far as Potlatch and the Virgil Beckner home before giving up the fight with ash laden air.

Traffic accidents have been few during Jim's tenure. Once a man drove in front of Jim's Renault, resulting in a collision, and one slick day his silver Subaru ended up in a thorn bush. There was \$1200 damage to the body of the car, but not to Jim's body or the mail.

During the time Jim carried mail, first class postage rose from 3c to 20c. There are a lot fewer houses per mile now than when he started, as many burned down or were torn down as farms were consolidated. This makes it longer between stops.

"On the south road from Cavendish to Southwick there used to be 8 or 10e houses where now there are only four. There are not many new houses," Reece said.

When he started, none of his route was oiled while now over half the route is oiled road—42 miles. He has always worked a six-day week and during the 29-plus years, he has had six substitutes.

Both Jim and Juanita has held offices in the Idaho Rural Letter Carrier Assn. Jim is a past district president and Juanita has served as Auxiliary District President and State President.

Jim was born at Teakcan where he attended school at Cavendish and Southwick. He served three years in the Army in Europe during World War 11. He is an active member of the Kendrick VFW and Masonic lodges.

He recalls the strange and wonderful things he has found in mail boxes other than outgoing mail.

"Just the other day I had to clean out a bird's nest. It doesn't take them long to get one built. I've also found bees nests."

Both Jim and Juanita will miss the goodies that mysteriously appear in the box just before the mailman arrives at Christmas time.

"I have enjoyed the associations with people on the route and I will miss them," Jim said.

## Potlatch Telephone Co. to Initiate 'O-Plus' Dialing Service for J-K Area

Improved direct dialing long distance service will begin for Potlatch Telephone customers with the advent of "O-Plus" dialing.

This service will go into effect for Juliaetta subscribers (who are with 276 prefix) on July 18th, and for Kendrick (those having 289 prefix) on August 8th.

Customers will be able to place person-to-person, collect, third number billing, calling card and time and charge calls faster and more efficiently with the "O-Plus" system.

When placing a call of these types within the state-wide 208 area code,

customers will dial "O" plus the number. Outside the 208 area code customers will dial "O" plus the area code and then the regular seven-digit number. An operator will come on the line before the call is completed to obtain billing information. "O-Plus" dialing lessens the amount of time the customer must wait for an operator, and also improves billing accuracy.

REPAIR SERVICE and TIME OF DAY will no longer be handled through the operator.

For non-emergency repair customers will call the business office, 289-5701. Calls made outside the regular business hours will be answered by a recording, allowing the customer to leave a recorded message.

EMERGENCIES SUCH AS FIRE, POLICE CALLS, ETC, MAY STILL BE REPORTED BY DIALING "O" AND GIVING THE NECESSARY INFORMATION TO THE OPERATOR.

In the near future TIME OF DAY will be obtained by using a customer-dialed number, of which customers will be notified when it is available.

PLEASE TAKE NOTE THAT THIS WILL AFFECT JULIAETTA SUBSCRIBERS ON JULY 18th AND KENDRICK SUBSCRIBERS ON AUGUST 8th.

## Commission Sets Openers For '83 Pheasant Season

The Fish and Game Commission during its May meeting in Boise set October 8 as opening day for the 1983 pheasant season in northern Idaho and October 27 in the southern part of the state.

September 17 is the opener for Hungarian partridge, chukar, quail and grouse, with September 15 the starting day for forest grouse in management units where general deer and elk seasons are open.

Commissioners ruled against the traditional early chukar season on portions of the Middle Fork and main Salmon Rivers because of the scarcity of the birds in those areas.

In other action the commission: —Made permanent its earlier order prohibiting the transport of fish eggs or live game fish. —Amended its regulation on transport or importation of undesirable wildlife to include crustaceans. —Closed fishing for smallmouth or largemouth bass in Hayden Lake—where smallmouth bass are being introduced for the first time—to establish a fishable population of smallmouth. —Opened Camas Creek on south central Idaho from its headquarters down to the Macon Flat Bridge Road, excluding all tributaries, to year around fishing because of the numbers of fish moving over the Mormon Reservoir spillway.

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**Notice to Persons Authorized To Perform Marriage Ceremonies in Idaho**

Legislation passed by the 1983 Legislature requires all persons authorized by Section 32-303, Idaho Code, to perform a marriage ceremony shall register their name and address with the county recorder in the county in which they reside, or may hereafter establish a residence, or perform a marriage ceremony, before performing any such ceremony in this state.

All persons authorized to perform marriage are required to register, even if previously registered with the local Registrars of Vital Statistics.

Affidavit forms for such registration are available of each county recorder or from the State Registrar of Vital Statistics, 450 W. State St., Boise, Idaho 83720.

**Get Plants Back on Track**

By now, woody plants that are going to survive have developed healthy new growth. Sunset's Inter-mountain Garden Guide urges gardeners to act now to get plants back on track by removing dead branches that haven't leafed out yet. After new growth has unfurled, apply a complete fertilizer, mulch with a thick layer of compost or other organic matter. Water as necessary.

After all this, if some plants still lack new growth, chances are they are seriously injured or dead and should be removed.

If you replanted annuals or vegetables, you can give them extra warmth that will help boost growth by covering seedlings with the tops of plastic jugs or by plastic sheeting stretched over a wood frame. But take care to remove the protective covers before plants get too hot.

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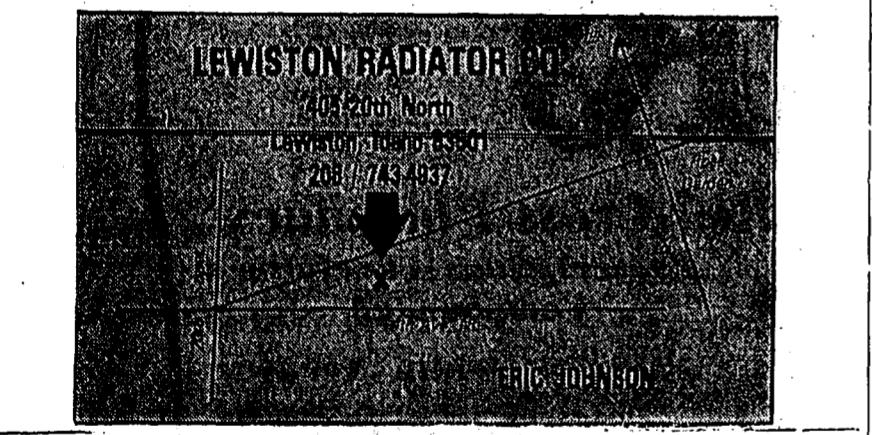

**Farmers Suffer From U. S. Deficit, Economist Says**

Moscow—One of the major problems limiting exports of Pacific Northwest wheat is the federal government's fiscal deficit, according to Neil Meyer, extension economist for the University of Idaho College of Agriculture.

"As long as the U. S. government has high deficit spending, we're going to have high interest rates. This will limit exports of wheat and other agricultural commodities because foreign buyers will be unable to buy U. S. dollars at a favorable rate," Meyer said.

"Wheat exports are an important mainstay of the Pacific Northwest economy, the University of Idaho economist said. "The region's wheat is grown for export. In Idaho, almost 90 percent of "our wheat crop is exported," he pointed out.

"Foreign customers will go shopping for wheat in Australia, Argentina and Canada when they cannot

afford to buy U. S. wheat, Meyer said. Customers are being lost because foreign exchange rates are affected by U. S. fiscal deficits, he said.

Meyer said the following chain of events is set into motion when the U. S. government goes further into debt:

—A fiscal deficit must be covered by government loans. In 1981, the federal government was the principal borrower in the U. S. financial market—borrowing at high interest rates, almost 79 percent of the total savings in the U. S.

—When interest rates are high, foreigners want dollars so they can invest in U. S. securities. They go out and buy them, bidding up the price and making the U. S. dollar "strong." As a result, the foreign exchange rate increases. Foreign customers who wish to purchase U. S. wheat are unable to buy dollars at a reasonable price.

—Loss of customers and sales depresses the U. S. wheat market. The price of U. S. wheat goes down and U. S. surplus stocks build up.

U. S. fiscal deficit and the strong U. S. dollars adversely affect our wheat producers. Any producer will know this is true if he will reflect about the price of wheat in 1979 or 1980 compared to what it is now," Meyer said.

Meyer said the University of Idaho College of Agriculture has issued a publication, CIS 695, "Monetary and Fiscal Effects of U. S. Exports." Copies may be obtained at county officers of the UI Cooperative Extension Service. (Note: Neil Meyer's telephone no. at the UI is 885-6335.)

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**1982 Steelhead Harvest Rated Best in 12 Years**

An estimated harvest of 20,350 steelhead in 1982 looks like the best Idaho season in 12 years, according to the Department of Fish & Game. Preliminary results from the annual survey of steelhead anglers also showed that last year's catch

topped 1981 by more than 50 percent and success rates increased. The total catch in 1970 was 20,500. "In 1981, about 19,000 steelhead permit holders caught an estimated 13,000 fish. Last year, some 21,700 anglers—2,700 more than a year earlier—harvested almost 7,400 more steelhead than in 1981," said Herb Pollard, anadromous fishing

coordinator. Estimated steelhead catch on the Salmon River last year was 10,375, with another 7,560 taken from the Clearwater River and 2,415 from the Snake River, Pollard said. "Anglers in Idaho benefited from an upstream run that was the best in 10 years, with a count of almost 2,300 steelhead at Lower Granite

Dam," he added. Lower Granite is the last dam the fish must traverse to enter Idaho waters. Pollard said the strong return was the result of effective downstream transportation, excellent water conditions for upstream passage and a successful passage program, combined with survival of more wild fish.

Flowers come in shades of white, pink, orange, rose, lavender and purple. Sunset Magazine recommends 'Bright Eyes', 'Caroline Vandenburg', 'Miss Lingard', 'Sharfire' and 'Marlborough'. Leave plants in nursery containers on the patio or deck until blooming is over. Then transplant them into garden soil amended with organic matter. Plant in full sun to minimize late-season mildew. Water at least every two weeks during dry spells. Mulch to conserve soil moisture.

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**Social Security Payment Cost-of-Living Adjustment Delayed**

The automatic Social Security benefit increase based on the cost of living, previously effective each July, will be delayed for 6 months, to January 1984, because of a recent law designed to strengthen the Social Security system, Ila Andrews, Social Security field representative in Pullman, said recently.

The purpose of the delay is to save the system money and help it regain its financial strength. Largely because of economic conditions in recent years, Social Security has had an increasingly severe financial problem.

The changes in the law are designed to meet the problem both in the near-term and into the years after

2000. Other changes provide additional income to the system. They include:

The Social Security tax rate increase scheduled under previous law for 1985 will go into effect in 1984. The new 1984 rate will be 7.0 percent each for employees and employers up from the previous rate of 6.7 percent. But, employees will receive a tax credit against 1984 taxes of 0.3 percent, which will be given when taxes are deducted from wages. In effect, 1984 employee taxes will remain at the level set under previous law.

Also, part of the tax rate increase scheduled for 1990 will go into effect in 1988.

Starting in 1984, the Social Security self-employment tax rate will be equal to the combined employee-employer tax on wages. This will be 14.0 percent for 1984. Previously the rate for self-employed people was about 1 1/2 times the employee rate.

Under the new law, self-employed people will receive a self-employment tax credit of 2.7 percent of self-employment income for 1984; 2.3 percent for 1985, and 2.0 percent for 1986-89. After 1989, these credits will be replaced with deductions designed to treat the self-employed in much the same manner as employees and employers are treated for Social Security and income tax purposes.
