Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church was the setting for a lovely wedding on Saturday, June 4, at 7:00 p. m. when Gina Rae Whiting and Randall Phillip Crosby exchanged their marriage vows.

She is the daughter of James and Gladys Whiting, Southwick, and he is the son of Phillip and JoAnn Crosby, Lewiston.

The bride approached the altar on the arm of her father, Rev. Theo. Meske, who had married the bride's parents, performed the double ring ceremony.

The altar was beautifully decorated with a huge bouquet of lavender, pink and white flowers with a large pink bow. The arrangement was made in a butter bowl on a high stand, which was used by the bride's great grandmother, Mrs. Ida Silflow and also by her grandmother, Mrs. Emma Silflow. Complimenting the altar bouquet were two sets of candelabra on each side with floral arrangements and bows. To complete the setting, the pews were decorated with lavender and white bows, and the three unity candles were placed on the altar. All of the flower arrangements and bouquets were designed and made by Mrs. Joyce Brammer, Kendrick, and Mrs. Barbara Hepler, Clarkston.

The bride chose to wear her mother's wedding dress. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER TWO OF SECTION TWO, BY ADDING A DEFINITION OF MINI-STORAGE WAREHOUSE AND AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER FOUR, SECTION ONE (B) BY ADDING TO OR RENUMBERING THE FOLLOWING USES IN THE COMMERCIAL DISTRICTS C1 AND C2: MINI STORAGE WAREHOUSE, SINGLE FAMILY DWELLING, MODULAR AND MOBILE HOME, TWO-FAMILY DWELLINGS, DAY CARE CENTER, AND AMUSEMENT ARCADE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO.

SECTION 1: That Section 10-2-2 of the City Code of Genesee be, and the same hereby is, amended by adding thereto immediately following the definition of "Lot of Record" the following:

MINI-STORAGE WAREHOUSE—A structure designed for the purpose of renting space to others for the storage of property and operated as a commercial business. Storage shall be within an enclosed building with interior space compartmentalized into individual units of rental space.

SECTION 2: That Section 10-4-1 (B) of the City Code of Genesee be, and the same hereby is, amended to read immediately following "(43) Accessory buildings and uses" as follows:
(44) Mini-storage
(45) Single-family dwellings
(46) Modular and mobile homes
(47) Two-family dwellings
(48) Day care center
(49) Amusement arcade

SECTION 3. Effective Date.
This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law of the State of Idaho.

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Licensing moratorium in 2 Bear management areas

Idaho Outfitters and Guides directors have lifted the organization's licensing moratorium in bear management areas 2 and 3—both with relatively limited access—according to Bob Salter, the Fish and Game Commission representative on the

board. Directors also endorsed the Department of Fish and Game's long-range management plans for bear and mountain lion and agreed to continue the moratorium on the remaining three bear management areas, Salter said.

"The moratorium on licensing in areas 1, 4 and 5, will continue until

December 31, 1985, when we will continue or modify our action after an evaluation of management direction," he added.

December 31, 1985, marks the end of the initial five-year plan for the species.

With the moratorium lifted on areas 2 and 3, the Outfitters and Guides License Board can consider ap-

plications to service hunting parties in those areas, Salter explained.

The management plan states that because of limited access and comparatively light harvests, bear populations in areas 2 and 3 tend to be self-regulating and there are many older bears. The areas lie generally along the Idaho-Montana border and down into north central Idaho.

UI Scientists Find Mutations Don't Improve on Nature

A new process to improve the Russet Burbank potato through genetic mutation proved unsuccessful in Idaho research, with all 341 possible competitors discarded in favor of the original.

Between 1978 and 1981, scientists Joseph Pavek and Dennis Corsini compared the field performance of clones developed by James Shepard of Kansas State University through regeneration of protoplasts.

Pavek and Corsini, with the USDA Agricultural Research Service, are based at the University of Idaho Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Aberdeen and are affiliate faculty members of the UI. They conducted the research at Kimberly and Aberdeen and are publishing a paper describing their results.

"The Russet Burbank has withstood the test of time," said Pavek, a plant breeder. "When you start messing with the delicate genetic interaction that already exists and gives the Russet Burbank the characteristics it is known for, you don't come up with anything beneficial. You just change one thing in there, and it looks like it's bound to upset the fine interaction of all those genes."

Pavek compared improving a potato to variety through genetic mutation

Management objectives for the 2 areas include providing opportunity for "quality" hunting and perhaps more liberal limits in some game management units.

Area 1, with easier access, shows an overharvest of some bear populations and controlled hunts and reduced limits are possibilities, the plan states.

Area 4, principally in eastern and part of south central Idaho, takes in livestock country. Seasons are closed in area 5, "because there are essentially no bears in those management units."

Regeneration of protoplasts involves separating leaf cells, stripping them of their walls, placing them on a growth medium and allowing them to multiply into masses called calli. After being placed on still other growth media, the cells of these calli begin to differentiate and develop into plants.

When Pavek and Corsini screened the 341 clones in 1978, they found considerable variation in leaflet shape and type, vine size and type, and susceptibility to verticillium wilt which causes early dying.

"All sorts of mutations occurred in this process and we were hoping that some of these mutations would be beneficial," said Pavek.

More than 50 percent of the clones produced smaller plants than the control Russet Burbanks and about 20 percent were late maturing. Many of the tubers were short and blocky, long and thin, or knobby and rough, and 3 percent had white skin.

Fifty-two of the best appearing vines and tubers were grown again in 1979. None yielded better than the Russet Burbank and 34 of the significantly poorer ones were discarded.

Research with the remaining 18 was repeated in 1980, with none exceeding the control and 15 discarded.

In 1981, the last three again failed to improve on the Russet Burbank.

While some of the clones continued to prove more resistant to verticillium wilt after three years of testing, Pavek said none of them actually yielded more U. S. No. 1's than the Russet Burbank.

"They were superior in resistance to early dying, but that was not linked to better yield."

He said the clones that offered one or more advantages over the Russet Burbank didn't carry along enough of the regular plant characteristics of that potato to give it a run for its money. Pavek called the advantages "interesting, but not economically useful."

"We felt we could get a better potato, but we didn't," he said.

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Social Security Benefits Improve For Women

The new Social Security amendments go a long way towards closing the gap in the protection the Social Security program provides women. Although the provisions are not based on sex, they are aimed at situations generally encountered by women as retired or disabled widows and divorced spouses. These type of benefits are paid on the earnings of a retired, disabled, or deceased worker. Men are more likely to collect benefits on their own earnings rather than as widowers or husbands.

A major change provides for the continuation of benefits to disabled

widows or widowers who remarry before age 60, just as it has been for widows or widowers who remarry at age 60 or older. Under prior law, disabled widows or widowers, who may receive benefits as early as age 50, had their benefits terminated upon remarriage at any age. The change is effective for benefits payable after December 1983.

Another change increases the benefit levels for disabled widows and widowers 50-59. Now, the rate ranges from 50 to 71.5 percent of the worker's benefits depending on the person's age. All disabled widows and widowers will receive 71 and a half percent of the workers' benefit. This provision is also effective for benefits payable after December 1983.

Beginning January 1985, divorced persons will be able to get retirement benefits at age 62 on their former spouse's earnings if he or she is eligible for benefits regardless of whether the former spouse retires or applies for benefits, as was required under prior law. The

applicant must have been divorced for at least 2 years, and the marriage must have lasted at least ten years.

Yet another change will apply to people who are affected by the government pension offset. The offset causes a reduction in Social Security spouse's or surviving spouse's benefits for people who receive a pension based on their own work for a Federal, State, or local government which is not covered by Social Security. Under the change, two-thirds of the pension will be applied against the Social Security benefit for people who first become eligible for a government pension after June 1983.

Currently, the Social Security spouse's benefit is reduced dollar for dollar by the amount of the pension. For the affected group, the spouse's benefit will be reduced \$2 for every \$3 of the pension.

Finally, a provision has the effect of generally increasing the benefits of widows and widowers who apply for benefits on the earnings of a spouse who died before reaching 62. The change updates the earnings levels by indexing the earnings to increases in general wages up to 2 years before the application for benefits or 2 years before the deceased spouse would have turned age 62, whichever is latest. The new method of computing benefits will be used only where it results in a higher benefit. The provision is effective for widows and widowers newly eligible after December 1984.

As I indicated, the great majority of those affected by these changes are women. However, the benefits are available to both men and women so everybody should take the time to become more familiar with them. For more information, call the Social Security office.

New Weed Killer Flexibility to Wheat Farmers

Wheat farmers now have a longer application time period for weed killer treatments in cereal grain production without fear of crop injury by the spray itself.

A new crop protection compound "Glean" weed killer, promises good weed control when applied anytime from crop planting to the boot stage. In contrast, most weed killers now in use have to be sprayed within a narrow stage of crop growth. Otherwise, the chemical can injure the crop.

The weed killer, developed by the Du Pont Company, has been extensively field tested in every major wheat producing state. Common and hard-to-control weeds can be controlled or suppressed with one-half ounce or less per acre of "Glean." In addition, the dry flowable formulation makes it easy to measure by the farmer.

Test results thus far indicate that the chemical controls many yield-robbing weeds when applied pre-emergence (before plants come up) or post-emergence (after plants have emerged). At recommended rates, "Glean" has wide margin of safety to wheat even when applied up to the boot stage of crop growth. The chemical is registered for weed control to reduce tillage in fallow ground weed management.

Varying weather conditions, another deterrent to present spraying practices, doesn't seem to curtail the effectiveness of "Glean." Rainfall for instance can wash away many weed killers that control weeds by contact action. This new compound, however, works even if it rains right after spraying because the chemical has both contact and soil action. If rain washes it off weeds, the moisture carries the chemical into the soil where it is taken up through the root system to kill weeds. Also, if the weather turns cold or dry after application, "Glean" remains in the soil for an extended period of time to control weeds when growing conditions improve.

"Glean" controls or suppresses over 50 economically important broad-leaf weeds and grasses.

Fish Watchers for Fun Are Joining the Pros

Fishery biologists who have been snorkeling and scuba diving for years as part of a day's work are finding some folks in the water these days who are fish watchers just for the fun of it.

"Some of the wet suits floating in Idaho's rivers and lakes are packed full of everyday folks rather than

professional biologists," report Jack Griffith and Kent Ball.

They are co-authors of "Here's (Blub, Blub) Lookin' at You, which appears in the May-June issue of "Idaho Wildlife," the Department of Fish and Game magazine. Griffith is an associate professor of biology at Idaho State University and Ball is a senior fishery research biologist with the department.

A good example of a fish watcher for fun, according to the writers, is Bruce Howard of Lewiston. He has been snorkeling for seven years and now he takes his wife and son along on at least a half-dozen combination snorkeling and fishing trips a year.

Howard is quoted as saying his family has some goals that remain to be filled—among them to observe the territorial sparring between different sizes and species of trout and to see what those large cruising trout are eating in a high mountain lake.

Griffith and Ball describes the equipment needed, safety practices that are a must and diving techniques that produce good fish watching results.

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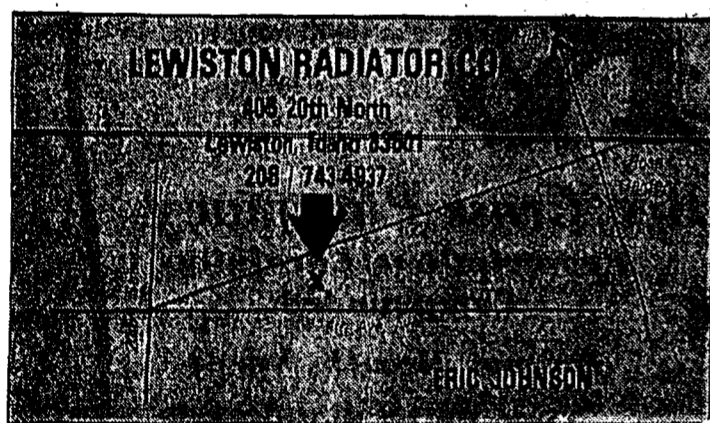
