## Camping Accident Injures Jim Bowers's Ankle

Jim Bower of Juliaetta underwent surgery on his ankle Monday evening at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston following an accident while fishing.

Jim's wife, Edna, reported to the Gazette Tuesday that the couple and their grandson had been camping and fishing at Boulder Creek in the Lochsa Wilderness area over the weekend. Then on early Monday afternoon while climbing a bank out of the creek, the dirt and rock gave way plunging Jim back down the bank with several boulders landing on him and wedging his ankles in the rock. While his grandson, Lester, stayed with Jim, Edna hiked out about 3/4 of a mile to a camp site to get help. An ambulance from Kooakia was contacted, then the men went back to look for Jim. They returned some time later reporting they couldn't find anyone so Edna led them back. After removing the rock it was discovered that the ankle in one foot had been dislocated and was protruding from his tennis shoe. One of the men carried Jim out on his back to the camp to wait for the ambulance, that because of faulty C. E. had failed to receive directions and had gone somewhere else. The Search and Rescue team were finally alerted and they and the ambulance arrived about the same time. Jim was taken to Clearwater Hospital then was transferred by their ambulance to St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston where he underwent surgery at about 8:30 p. m. He came through the surgery fine but is expected to be in the hospital for a few days.

## Jay Stout, Former Kendrick Garage Owner, Passes

Jay A. Stout, who owned and operated garages in Kendrick and Lapwai during his life, died Friday afternoon, July 8, at his Lewiston home of infirmities of age. He was 83.

Born Dec. 18, 1899 at Dell Rapids, S. D. to Franklin B. and Gertrude Stout, he lived in Dell Rapids until 1922 and was raised and educated there.

He was a lifetime member of the Lewiston Elks Lodge.

Survivors include a daughter, Elaine Kelly at Denver; a brother Clinton at Clarkston; and a grandson. He was preceded in death by two brothers and three sisters.

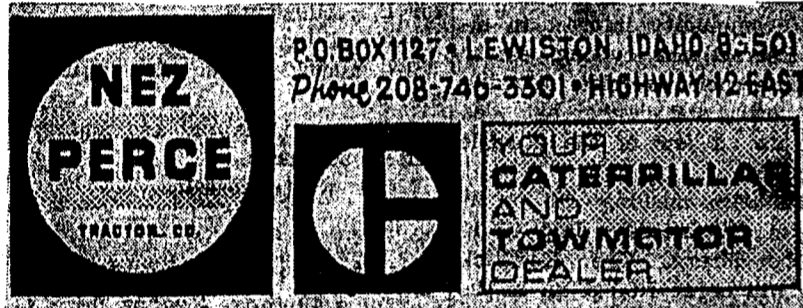

**60-DAY SEASON SET FOR DOVE HUNTING**

Dove Hunters in Idaho will have a 60-day season from September 1 through October 30, following approval by the Fish and Game Commission at its meeting in Idaho Falls, July 8.

The season is 15 days longer than last year, but bag and possession limits are the same—a bag limit of 15, with a 30-bird possession limit after the first day.

Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset and printed regulations, scheduled for delivery in early August, list starting and closing times for each day. Shotguns cannot be loaded with more than three shells.

A migratory game bird hunting stamp is not required.

Most doves are usually out of the state shortly after the season opens,

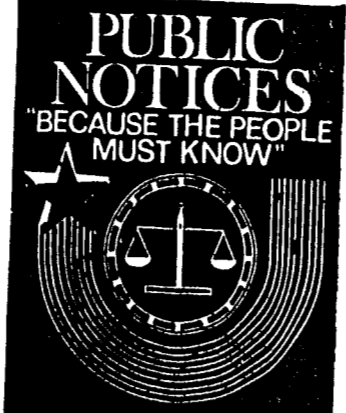

**PERCH CAN BE CLEARED FROM HORSETHIEF**

Check off Horsethief Reservoir as another victim of an illegal fish plant in Idaho.

'Massive numbers' of yellow perch have infested the popular trout fishery in Valley County. As a result, the Fish and Game Commission during its July 8 meeting in Idaho Falls —Authorized the Department of Fish and Game to drain the reservoir and eradicate all fish before re-establishing a trout population.

Removed limits to allow fish salvage in the reservoir, as well as Horsethief Creek and Big Creek from the mouth of Horsethief Creek down to and including Warner Pond. Seines, dip nets and hook-and-line are permitted.

Salvage in the reservoir itself would not be feasible until it was about empty, the commission was told. Regional fishery manager Will Reid said drawdown in the reservoir was to start about July 18.

In its report to the commission, the department said perch were illegally planted in the reservoir in the 1970's and have since formed a "very large and stunted population of virtually no value to anglers."

This has made it all but impossible to maintain plants of fingerling trout and produce a fishery because they either were eaten by the perch or were unable to compete with the warmwater fish that reproduce in prolific numbers.

Nell DeGiulio, assistant fish hatcheries supervisor, said the department had been stocking Horsethief with about 50,000 fingerlings a year until the perch took over.

The commission last April approved a regulation making it unlawful to transport or release live fish and department employees were directed to maintain "intensive patrol and surveillance" to guard against such activity.

Citizens Against Poaching has offered a reward of up to \$250 for information leading to an arrest for such a violation.
