

ldaho Water Users Claims Total 7,732

Boise-Idaho water users filed after June 30, 1983. Maybe these program which ended June 30, according to A. Kenneth Dunn, director, Idaho Department of Water Re-2,545, were filed in the last month

In addition, 10,391 applications for permits to appropriate water were filed in the five-year period, with 1,182 filed in June alone. Applications cover groundwater rights developed after March 25, 1963, or surface water rights developed after May 20, 1971. Claims can be filed on water uses established prior to these dates.

The legislature passed the law requiring the recording of all unrecorded water rights for three reasons, Dunn said. First, a water right filed with the Department of Water Resources becomes a matter of written record. Documentation is easin a water right adjudication process. Second, the state will have a wise use of the resource.

Most of the 2,545 claims filed in June, 1983, were from the western region, south of Grangeville, north of the Nevada border, and east of water rights claims were taken in this area alone, Dunn said.

"We expected the most filings in the northern and in the eastern part of the state," the director said. "However, in Coeur d'Alene, 576 rights were recorded, with 600 accepted in Idaho Falls. In Twin Falls staff took 344 classes." Water resources officials had es-

timated that 34,000 water rights were unrecorded when the program began in 1978. When asked about the approximate difference of 26,000 claims between the estimate and the actual claims filed, Dunn offered several explanations.

"First, in spite of all the publicity and advertising we did, many water users who have expanded use under a recorded water right were unaware of the need to file a claim for the additional use. Second, perhaps many people knew about the program and also were aware that the Idaho Legislature this year extended the program another two years. with the financial penalty for filing after June 30, 1983. Mayber these water users felt they could better afford the higher filing fee later, while they could not really afford the \$30 fee now."

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

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
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

A family softball game in the park is typical summertime fun. There goes Johnny, slipping over the clover to catch a fly ball.

"Ouch Ow. A bee just stung me." Everyone hurries to help. bee left a stinger; it's gently scrapan ice pack is put together and Johnny is told to rest awhile. Usually, that's all the first aid that a victim of an insect sting needs. But for those who are highly sensitive to the venom of bees, wasps, hornets and yellow jackets, a sting may cause an allergic reaction that requires prompt medical attention or even the use of life-sustaining equipment,

Perhaps the best source if immediate help when a sting brings on an allergic reaction is the emergency sting treatment kit. The treatment kit isn't a substitute for professional, medical care; it simply relieves allergy symptoms until the victim can be taken to a doctor or a hospital. Nor is the kit intended for all sting situations; it's used only for treating an allergic reaction during an emergency. The distinction here, is between local reactions, like Johnny's which, affect only the area around the sting site, and severe allergic reactions, which can interfere with one or more of the body's lifesustaining functions, such as breath-

> Most sting treatment kits contain drugs that relieve allergy symptoms oms epinephrine, in a syringe ready for injection, and ephedrine and antihistamines, which are taken by mouth. You'll need a doctor's prescription to obtain a kit, and the doctor will tell you how to use it and how the drugs that it contains work to improve breathing and inhibit the allergic reaction. A tourniquet will be supplied, too, with instructions for applying it that should be followed carefully, to avoid impairing blood circulation.

Other items that you might add to the kit are tweezers or a razor blade, for scraping away the stinger (squeezing or pulling may cause the venom sac at the end of the stinger to release more venom); a second tourniquet, in case of multiple stings; alcohol swabs or towelettes, for cleansing the sting site; and coins for summoning help at a pay telephone. Think about buying more than one kit-maybe a kit for the right to reject any or all bids or your home, one for the office and rapid use when you need it.
