Two Local Youth Attend National FHA-HERO Convention in Washington

Lucinda Groseclose, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Groseclose of Juliaetta, and Vicki Renfrow, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Renfrow of Kendrick, attended the recent National FHA/HERO (Future Homemakers of America/Home Economics Related Occupations) Convention at the Sheraton Washington Hotel in Washington, D. C.

The two K. H. S. students were among 1500 other students attending the annual leadership meeting July 10-14. At the national meeting they were involved in a number of leadership training sessions including an opinion poll and student-led evaluation of the issues members felt FHA'ers should address as a national youth leadership organization.

The five-day meeting centered around the student developed theme "New Beginnings . . . Daring to Discover". During the week, delegates had a choice of over 60 hours of leadership workshops to attend. Topical sessions addressed issues such as drug and alcohol abuse, family relations, handicap awareness, jobs and careers, and peer pressure.

Highlighting the meeting was the dedication of Future Homemakers of America's National Headquarters and Leadership Center, located in Reston, Virginia. Bands, a carnival atmosphere, ribbon cutting ceremonies (Vicki was one of the ribbon cutters), and tours of the building helped delegates celebrate the conclusion of a two-year, nation-wide fund-raising effort in which members raised almost one million dollars toward building the center. (Idaho members raised \$7500.)

One of the national projects of the organizations is entitled "Families and Futures". Lucinda was the representative chosen from Idaho to work on that project. Lucinda attended special workshops and activities which focused on families, family relations, child abuse, and teenage pregnancy.

On the final day of the convention, an east coast television program asked members of FHA to appear on a TV talk show entitled, "Morning Break". Vicki was among the panel that got to go on TV and speak on issues that affect teens, and their importance.

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Depredation Problems
Cost \$129,000 in '82

Dealing with troublesome wildlife cost the Department of Fish and Game about \$129,000 in 1982 — an increase of 132 percent over 1981, according to the agency's annual depredation report.

Expenditures for supplies and miscellaneous field services showed the sharpest increase from about \$12,800 in 1981 to more than \$49,000 last year.

Other costs contributing to the total included those for employee's time, about \$67,000, and transportation, \$12,760.

Beaver, as usual, produced the highest number of damage complaints. The report listed 202 problem calls, which cost \$22,800. Deer and pheasant each accounted for 18 percent of the total complaints.

Other reported depredations involved wildlife that included elk, bear, antelope, cougar, and waterfowl—and coyotes, skunks and weasels.

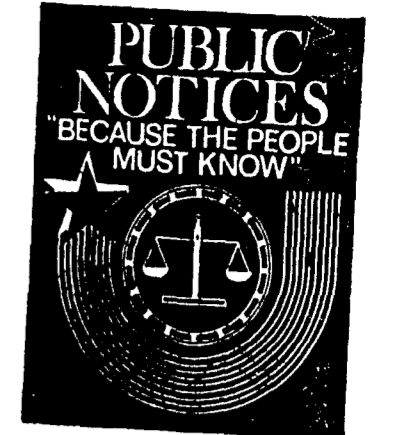
Department to Auction Surplus Vehicles, Equipment

WILDERNESS CLASSIFICATION NEEDED TO GUARD FISH, WILDLIFE VALUES

Wilderness classification—if it is the best alternative—should be applied to any national forest roadless areas in Idaho with "highly significant" fish and wildlife values, according to Department of Fish and Game director Jerry M. Conley.

Department recommendations for areas to be included in a state wilderness bill are based on Fish and Game Commission policy that calls for such designation if it is needed to protect those values, Conley said. Senator James McClure of Idaho is drafting a state wilderness bill involving Forest Service land and hearings are to be conducted in four cities starting August 9 in Boise. Others will be in Idaho Falls, August 11; Coeur d'Alene, August 16; and Lewiston, August 17.

The Subcommittee on Public Lands and Reserve Water of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee has scheduled the hearings. McClure is committee chairman.

Conley said the basic questions to be answered in a state wilderness bill are:

—How much of the 6.5 million acres of Forest Service roadless area, in parcels of 5,000 acres or more, will be added to existing wilderness.

—What lands will be released for multiple use.

—What lands should perhaps be given more study.

The director emphasized the need to include the Kelly Creek watershed in Clearwater County as wilderness. "We have noted strong public support for preserving this nationally acclaimed, blue ribbon trout stream," he said. Two roadless areas critical to watershed protection for Kelly Creek are presently excluded in a Forest Service proposal for wilderness classification, Conley noted.

"Our recommendations generally follow those we listed during the Rare II process in 1979, except that we have not included those areas added in the River of No Return Wilderness," he said.

"We also have omitted the Canyon Creek portion of the Mallard-Larkin area in northern Idaho where the department is considering a land exchange with Burlington Northern, Inc.," Conley added.

DONATIONS FOR NONGAME MADE IN MEMORY OF 18-YEAR- OLD

A personal tragedy for a family in northern Idaho has resulted in donations of almost \$600 to the Fish and Game Trust Account in memory of an 18-year-old son lost in a traffic accident.

"Such generosity reaffirms my belief that many people can display a compassion for wild animals, large and small," said Martel Morache, Department of Fish and Game.

The parents in a letter to the department said their son's first love was trapping, hunting and fishing, but he had "a great love for all wildlife," game and nongame.

"They asked that donations in memory of their son be used for the department's new, nongame wildlife program," Morache said. He is the state nongame manager.

"The department is very proud that the family, on behalf of their son, chose to acknowledge our work," he added. "Through July, donations have totaled nearly \$600."

Idaho law has established the trust account and authorized the department director to receive, on behalf of the department, any money or real or personal property "donated, bequeathed, devised or conditionally granted."

Funds received directly or realized from the sale of such property are deposited in the trust account and they may be earmarked by the donor for a specific program, Morache said.

"Arrangement for any type of donation to the trust account can be initiated by a telephone call to a department office," he added.
