Two roadless areas critical to watershed protection for Kelly Creek are presently excluded in a Forest Service proposal for wilderness classification, Conley noted.

"Our recommendations generally follow those we listed during the Rare II process in 1979, except that we have not included those areas added in the River of No Return are: Wilderness," he said.

"We also have omitted the Canyon Creek portion of the Mallard-Larkin area in northern Idaho where the department is considering a land exchange with Burlington Northern, Inc.," Conley added.
