

Moscow-In a year when job offers are down and starting salary offers haven't changed much from those of a year ago, University of Idaho graduates attracted salary offers near or above national averages

in most career fields. Charles Woolson, director of the UI Career Planning and Placement Center, said salary offers to UI graduates in the humanities, civil engineering, mining engineering and math exceeded those offered other university graduates both regionally and gradually.

"Our graduates are bright people," he said, and are able to compete well in the job market.

Areas in which UI grads fell begraduates were within 10 percent of those offered regionally and nationally are accounting, social sciences other than humanities, chemical engineering, electrical engineering and mechanical engineering. UI graduates in the biological sciences attracted higher salary offers than those



As of Monday (August 8), the Bonneville count was 107,760 compared to 4,763 on the same day a decade of department record-keeping.


