## JoAnn Helbling, 22, Dies of Injuries From Car Accident

JoAnn M. Helbling, 22, died Wednesday at Deaconess Hospital in Spokane of injuries received in a car accident the day before she was to be married.

The accident occurred July 29 on the way to the airport in Spokane, when she and her fiancé, Cliff Hemingway, were going to meet his mother. They were thrown from the car. She was kept in intensive care at Deaconess. He was also taken to Deaconess, then later transported to the Fairchild Air Force Base hospital. He has since been released.

JoAnn joined the U. S. Navy two and a half years ago. She was stationed at Rota in Spain, where she worked as a computer technician. She held the rank of petty officer, third class.

She was born July 20, 1961, in Lewiston to Teddy and James Helbling of Genesee. She graduated from Genesee High School in 1980. She was a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Genesee.

In addition to her parents, survivors include three brothers, James Jr., of Cotter, Iowa; Jerry of Lewiston and Arthur of Genesee; seven sisters Mary Cahoon of Kennewick, Wa.; Kathleen Helbling of Stamford, Conn.; Bobbie Blankenship of Clarkston; Margaret Aarhus, of Yakima, Wa.; Lorry Wright of Kamiah, Martha Helbling of Moscow and Patty Helbling of Asotin; and her grandmother, Mrs. Frank D. Kinnison of Honolulu.

A rosary was said at 7:30 p. m. Friday at St. Mary's in Genesee. Funeral services were at the church at 10 a. m. Saturday with Father Edward Cope officiating. Burial in St. Mary's Cemetery.

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**ILLEGAL POSSESSION OF 4 ELK BRINGS STIFF FINE, PENALTY**

Civil penalties totaling \$2,000 and a \$300 fine have been levied against a resident of the Salmon area for unlawful possession of two cow elk and two calves.

Magistrate Arthur A. Wright also ordered suspension of Orville Baird's hunting and fishing privileges for the maximum three years following the defendant's guilty plea, according to Seventh District Court records.

Idaho law requires reimbursement of \$500 to the Department of Fish and Game for each elk illegally killed, possessed or wasted. The misdemeanor crime also calls for a fine of at least \$25 or not more than \$300 upon conviction, plus suspension of hunting, fishing or trapping privi-

leges for not less than a year. Conservation officers Al Nicholas, Russ Kozarek and Trent Nyhart were the investigators.

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**U of I Grads Attract Competitive Salaries**

Moscow—In a year when job offers are down and starting salary offers haven't changed much from those of a year ago, University of Idaho graduates attracted salary offers near or above national averages in most career fields.

Charles Woolson, director of the UI Career Planning and Placement Center, said salary offers to UI graduates in the humanities, civil engineering, mining engineering and math exceeded those offered other university graduates both regionally and gradually.

"Our graduates are bright people," he said, and are able to compete well in the job market.

Areas in which UI grads fell below graduates were within 10 percent of those offered regionally and nationally are accounting, social sciences other than humanities, chemical engineering, electrical engineering and mechanical engineering. UI graduates in the biological sciences attracted higher salary offers than those

from regional schools and were within 10 percent of the national average. UI geological engineers equalled the regional average and were within 10 percent of the national average.

Areas in which UI grads fell behind in salary offers were general business, marketing and distribution, agricultural science and computer science. These figures are all from a College Placement Council salary survey. According to that report, graduates in the humanities, nationwide, received salary offers with the greatest percentage increase over those offered a year ago. At an average starting salary of \$1,380 per month, nationwide, graduates in that field were paid 7.6 percent more than last year's.

The report also noted that the number of offers to engineers declined for the second consecutive year, probably reflecting the tendency for graduates to accept offers earlier than in the past, Woolson said, more than a smaller number of jobs to be filled.

Chemical engineers received the second highest average starting salary offer nationally, he said, at 2,248 per month. Even so, it was down 1.2 percent from a year ago.

He said at UI this year, not quite all of the chemical engineering graduates were placed in their field, as apposed to a year ago, when all of them were.

On the whole, though, Woolson said UI graduates fared well, attracting good offers, with most of them accepting offers in their fields.

**Fall Steelhead Season To Open September 1**

Fall steelhead fishing on the Salmon and Snake rivers opens Sept. 1 with prospects for a season at least equal to 1982—the best in 12 years.

The Fish and Game Commission during its special meeting in Boise Tuesday (August 9) also approved an October 15 opener for a catch-and-keep season on the Clearwater River system.

Steelhead counts at Bonneville Dam, the first of eight such barriers on the Columbia and Snake Rivers, are running ahead of last year, said John Coon, anadromous fishery manager for the Department of Fish and Game.

As of Monday (August 8), the Bonneville count was 107,760 compared to 4,763 on the same day a year ago. The 1982 upstream migration to Idaho was the best in a decade of department record-keeping.

Fish now crossing Bonneville make up the "A" run—those that return to the Salmon and Snake, Coon said. Counts of the Clearwater steelhead in the "B" run start August 26, he explained.

Lower Granite is the last dam the fish must transverse to enter Idaho waters. The August 8 count at Lower Granite was 3,633, about 300 ahead of the same day last year.

The bulk of the Idaho-bound "A" run will be reaching Lower Granite about mid-September, Coon said.

"Regulations that year are generally designed to provide maximum harvest of hatchery stocks and protect wild, native steelhead," Coon said.

Here is a summary of the regulations:

Salmon River—From its mouth up to Basin Creek about 8 miles below Stanley, September 1 through December 31 with a daily limit of 2; possession limit, 4; and season limit, and 3.

10. Steelhead with dorsal fins higher than 2 1/4 inches—wild fish—must be released and barbless hooks are required.

Snake River—From the Idaho-Washington line at the confluence of the Snake and Clearwater up to Hells Canyon Dam; September 1 through December 31, with limits of 2, 4 and 10. Fishing from boats is prohibited for 150 yards downstream from the dam.

Anglers can keep steelhead with dorsal fins higher than 2 1/4 inches only between the Snake-Clearwater confluence and the mouth of Redbird Creek from November 15 through December 31.

The dorsal fin restriction also does not apply for the full season from Hells Canyon Dam to Wild Sheep Rapids, six miles downstream. Otherwise, only steelhead with dorsal fins shorter than 2 1/4 inches can be taken and barbless hooks are required.

Clearwater River—From its confluence with the Snake at Lewiston up to the Clearwater River bridge at Orofino: October 15 through December 31. Limits: 2, 4 and 10.

From the bridge at Orofino up to the posted line at the mouth of the South Fork Clearwater: October 15 through December 31. Limits: 1, 1 and 3, with no rafts or boats with motors allowed.

North Fork, from its mouth up to 100 yards below Dworshak Dam: October 15 through December 31. Limits: 2, 4, and 10. Fishing is prohibited from the shoreline around Dworshak National Hatchery and fishing from a boat is prohibited between the mouth of the North Fork and the Ahsahka highway bridge.

South Fork from its mouth up to the Mt. Idaho bridge: October 15 through December 31. Limits: 1, 1
