Free and Reduced Price Milk and Lunch Policy Explained by Kendrick School District No. 283

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 today announced its policy for free and reduced meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch program. Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party. The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct. Households are required to report increase in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy, Eldon Taylor, Superintendent, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Luther Parks, School Board Chairman, Kendrick, Idaho 83537—Phone 289-3431, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information. The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

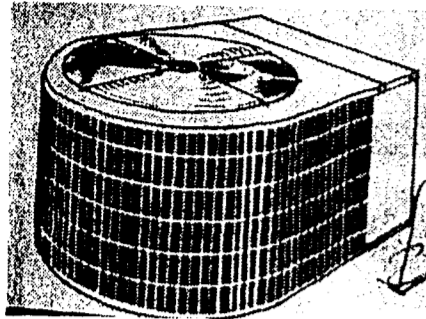

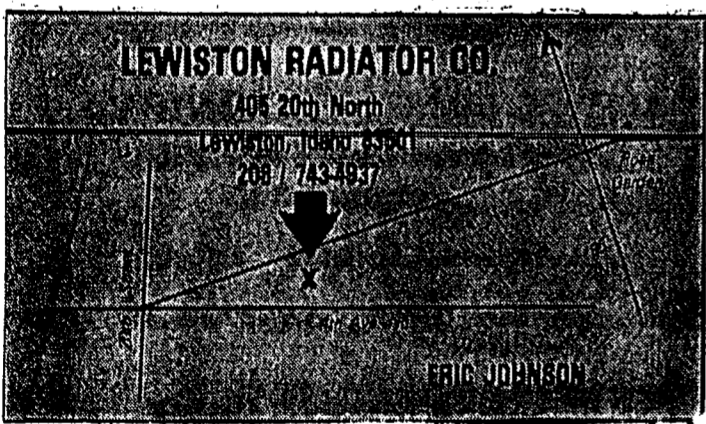
