New Juliaetta Bakery Begins Marketing Products

A new bakery in Juliaetta began to market its products this week in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area. The bakery is part of a new complex being constructed in Juliaetta by Jack and Carolyn Brown of that city.

"Granny's Pantry" is part of a small building created by Mr. and Mrs. Brown when they acquired and began remodeling the old Sundowners Coach building from Mrs. Brown's father, Orville Skaggs.

The building is being completely re-modeled with space for a bakery, restaurant, and several other shops. At least one other business will be installed when the work is completed on the structure. The building will also house Carolyn's "Little Brown Jug" an antique shop.

"The outside of the building will have a mansard-type roof with a stucco and rock front. Arched windows will give the building an attractive appearance.

Carolyn said Monday that while the bakery is not in full operation yet, some of its products are now being sold at the Juliaetta Market and Phil's Food City in Kendrick. She said once the equipment is completely installed and operating at full capacity, she is hopeful that the bakery would be able to sell its goods in Deary, Bovill and other nearby towns.

Carolyn stressed the fact that all of the bakery products as well as the restaurant, when it begins operation will be using "scratch" products. That is, very little, if any, of the food sold will be frozen or pre-prepared. The baker is Barbara Hagen of Helmer, who was a baker at the Rosauer Store in Moscow for 6 years.

Baked goods are also available directly from the bakery itself.

Once it is in operation, the restaurant part of "Granny's Pantry" will offer a complete menu featuring both meals and short orders and daily and weekly specials are also being planned for. A wide variety of ice cream and fountain service is also planned. No beer, wine or liquor will be served.

Elvina Polunsky will be main cook at the new restaurant. Others assisting with the cooking will be Lori Brocke, Mrs. Brown's daughter, and Rose Brocke. Mrs. Brown will manage both the restaurant and bakery.

The interior of the restaurant will be done in an old fashioned and antique motif. In addition to the usual breakfast, lunch and dinner menu, an extensive salad bar is planned and also crepes and quiche specialties items will be available.

Carolyn said she just couldn't set a definite opening date because her schedule depends on the completion of the re-modeling and when the new equipment arrives and is installed.

The major work left to be done consists of placing the beige natural stone slabs on the outside of the front.

The building, located on the North side of Main Street was built next to Culpepper's Clothing Co. and is the second Kendrick business firm to build or remodel on that side of the street this year. Earlier, Snyder's Home Center remodeled the old theatre building. Cameron Youth Recovering After Combine Accident

Jed Denner, the 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Denner, was reported to be in satisfactory condition and recovering well Tuesday night following a combine accident early Monday morning in the Cameron area that could have proved fatal.

The accident occurred at approximately 8:10 a. m. Monday, his father said. Jed was standing on the header of an N6-Gleaner combine and was washing the front window of the machine when his father, Bob, started the combine, not knowing it was in gear. The forward movement of the combine knocked the young man down into the moving header that swept him down under where the retractable finger of the header auger, a three-quarter inch diameter shaft approximately 6 to 8 inches long was driven its full length into the left side of his body. Bob immediately extracted Jed from the machine and rushed him to Kendrick where he was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston by the J-K ambulance.

Although the young man had been completely impaled by the large, blunt metal shaft that entered his left side between the last two ribs, exploratory surgery at the hospital revealed that all vital parts of his body had been missed by the metal object. Only his spleen had been slightly touched.

Bob said Tuesday evening that Jed is listed as being in "real good condition." Bob added that Jed should be able to return home Thursday or Friday.

Hopeful Kendrick HS Tigers Prepare For Football Opener Against Deary Friday

A hopeful coach Terry Webb and his Kendrick High School Tigers are preparing for the opening of the 1983 football season Friday evening, Sept. 2 as they host the Deary Mustangs. Game time is 7:00 p. m.

Coach Webb and his team are aiming to turn the football fortunes of the Tigers around this season after two disastrous years for the KHS team. The Tigers teams have not won a football game in two seasons—last year they went 0-8.

Talking with some of the players before the season starts it is apparent that Webb has instilled a spirit of enthusiasm and optimism in his squad. Also adding to the up-beat atmosphere around the Tiger gridiron is the return of 14 lettermen from last year's young team, including seven starters from the 1982 squad.

"We're going to be showing the single-wing formation," Coach Webb said Tuesday morning, "but actually we'll multi offensive formation".

Starting the Deary game Friday night, offensively, will be running backs Galen Browning and Wayne Deeds; quarterback Troy Huett and

Slade Zumhove in the flanker spot. Deeds, a 215 pound senior was switched to the back field this year by Webb.

On the line, offensively, will be Jack Meyer, as tight end; John Bryant as split end; Ted Denner, center; Corey Cooper, right guard; Tony Henson, left tackle; Tom Gibbins, right tackle and Tom Woods, left guard.

On defense Robert Westfeld and Del Renfrow will replace Gibbins and Woods, Webb said.

Coach Webb was cautiously optimistic about the team and its chances this year. "We hope to get things going again," he said. Webb had 31 boys turn out for football this season, the largest number in several years.

This is Webb's first year as a football coach. He is going into his third year at Kendrick High. Last year Webb was assistant basketball coach and co-coach of the track team. He replaces Brian Pendleton.

September 9 the Tigers will be at Timberline and then will return home for a Sept. 14 game with the Potlatch Loggers.

Young, Small Genesee HS Bulldogs

Open Football Season Friday Against Lewiston JV

With only two starters back from last year's team, Coach Darin Munden will send his 1984 version of the Genesee High School Bulldogs out on the field Friday evening, Sept. 2 to open the football season against the Lewiston J. V.'s. Game time is 7:30.

This will be the first time in 29 years Genesee High School will put a varsity football team into action that has not been coached by Ozzie Kanikkeberg. The last time was in 1954 when the Bulldogs were coached by Bill Bietz. In 1955 Kanikkeberg came over from Troy High School and has coached and taught at GHS since then, compiling one of the best win-loss records and earning the reputation as one of the most respected coaches in the state, and the Northwest.

Last semester, Kanikkeberg accepted the position of principal at Genesee High and the added responsibility forced him to turn over his football coaching duties to his assistant Daren Munden. Munden has been at Genesee for the past 2 years, coming up from Kendrick High School when he coached football and was the English instructor.

This year Munden faces a re-building task with the Bulldogs. The team lost 9 starters—both offensively and defensively—from last year's team. Only running back Ricky Ves-

tal and center Eric Hanson are back from the 1982 squad that had a 6-win 3-loss overall record. The Bulldogs were 4-2 in league play and finished in second place.

"We have no size to speak of this year," Munden said Tuesday morning. "We're going to have to play well together as a team if we're going to do any good".

Junior Sammy Smith will handle the quarterbacking job for the Bulldogs this year. Smith will be taking over from Doug Stout who was lost to the team through graduation. Rounding out the backfield will be Felgenbutz and Kenny Reynolds as the running back and Aaron Zenner as the split back.

On the line with veteran center Eric Hanson will be Bob Wilson, Terry and Brad Flodin, Roger Kinyon and Dave Cvanca.

Munden estimated that his starting line would average about 105 pounds and his back field would be about 150 pounds.

Forty-one players turned out for football this year at GHS. Ten of these earned letters last season. There are six seniors on the squad.

Asked whether he would be using a running or passing type of attack this season, Munden said, "I don't know for sure, but we'll be doing whatever we can do."

A news release from the National Hunting and Fishing Committee pointed out that NHF Day "helps to ensure a healthy future for hunting, fishing and the outdoors."

"Through exhibits and displays at NHF Day programs, nonsportsmen can learn about the need to conserve our natural and wildlife resources and how hunters and anglers make important contributions to America's conservation efforts."

NHF Day is supported by more than 40 of the nation's leading conservation organizations, including the Izaak Walton League and National Wildlife Federation. Each year, more than 2,000 separate NHF Day activities are attended by more than 10 million persons, the release stated.

DEVELOPMENTAL PRE-SCHOOL OFFERS SERVICES TO CHILDREN

Moscow—The University of Idaho Developmental Preschool is offering educational services to children with special needs as well as to those who are normal in development.

Gina Moody, classroom supervisor for the pre-school said the school is open and free to children who are handicapped or developmentally delayed, with a fee of \$65 per month for those who have no special needs.

She said classroom activities include adaptive physical education, social interaction, pre-academic skills, communication and self-care. All ages from birth to five years of age are accepted as space and the needs of the children allow.

Children enrolled in the pre-school are given periodic assessments and work under individually prepared programs.

She said parents who would like to have their child assessed to determine his or her rate of development may request an appointment by calling 885-6159.

Assessments will be given the week of August 22-26 and through the fall and spring semester by appointment.

Students to be enrolled in the pre-school will be registered August 24 from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Classroom activities begin at 9 a. m. August 29. Space is limited in the pre-school.

NEW REGULATIONS PROTECT SNAKE RIVER STEELHEAD

Lewiston—Idaho steelhead fishermen need to be aware of a couple of important regulation changes for the coming fall steelhead season that opens September 1. Barbless hooks will be required on both the Snake and Salmon Rivers, and any steelhead with a dorsal (back) fin higher than 2 1/4 inches must be returned to the water on either of these streams. Single, double or treble hooks are legal, and anglers may use artificial lures or bait. Idaho Fish and Game Department offices and some license vendors have available special cards for measuring the dorsal fin.

Steelheaders who fished the upper Salmon River last season are familiar with the fin and barbless hook regulations, which were imposed to protect wild steelhead while providing maximum harvest of hatchery-produced fish. The Fish and Game Commission decided at its August 9 meeting to extend the restrictions to the Snake River this fall to increase protection of dwindling wild steelhead stocks. Hatchery-reared steelhead in the Snake and the Salmon can be distinguished from wild fish by their shorter dorsal fins. Because barbless hooks are easier to remove, they minimize injury to wild steelhead that are caught and then released.

Anglers who intend to fish both the Snake and Clearwater Rivers this year should note a difference in tackle restrictions between the two streams. Ordinary barbed hooks will be legal on the Clearwater when the season opens October 15. Boaters who start the day fishing on that river, then move around the corner into the Snake need to change to barbless hooks before wetting a line in the restricted waters.

A special catch-and-release season on the Clearwater, which is currently running and will close at the beginning of the regular catch-and-keep season, adds another wrinkle to the fall steelhead fishing experience for two-river anglers. Through October 14, a tackle regulation is in effect on the Clearwater that restricts fishermen to single barbless hooks on artificial lures and flies. The multiple barbless hooks and bait that will be legal in the Snake River are prohibited on the Clearwater during the early catch-and-release period.

Fall 1983 steelhead regulations

'83 BIRD SEASONS UP FOR APPROVAL

Uniform pheasant seasons and bag limits in eastern and south central Idaho were among proposed changes to be considered by the Fish and Game Commission when it was to set 1983 upland game and waterfowl regulations during its meeting in Boise, August 18 and 19.

Sessions were to be conducted in the Department of Fish and Game headquarters building, 600 S. Walnut Street, with a public hearing scheduled for August 18, starting at 7:30 p. m.

Furbearer and trapping regulations for 1983-85 fur management plan for public review also were on the agenda.

Subject to approval by the commission, pheasant seasons will run from October 8 through November 2 in northern Idaho and October 22 through December 4 in the remainder of the state.

Pheasant hunting areas 3 and 4 both will have proposed limits of two roosters for the first five days of the season and then would go to bag and possession limits of 3 and 6, said Dick Norell, state game bird manager. Limits in area 2 remain unchanged from last year.

Sage Grouse—September 17 through 25 in southwestern and south central Idaho. Other closing dates would be September 30 in Southeastern Idaho and October 7 in the north central area.

A proposed change would cut the

limits from 3 and 6 to 2 and 4 in the southeastern area. The department has recommended a closure in western Washington County to protect sharp-tailed grouse and closures in seven south central counties where populations are extremely low or nonexistent, Norell said.

Hungarian partridge, chukar and quail—September 17 through December 31 throughout most of the state. The usual January segment of the season would be eliminated this year.

Forest grouse—September 17 through November 27, except for a September 15 opener in backcountry game management units.

Major proposed changes in waterfowl seasons include expansions of the Minidoka-Cassia goose closure to ease reproduction problems and the Flagerman goose closure to reduce the harvest to local birds which which Norell said have been hit fairly hard the past two seasons.

The Lake Lowell closure area also would be broadened to reduce losses from crippling, Norell said.

Duck seasons open October 1 with a January 1 closure recommended for northern Idaho and January 8 for the remainder of the state.

Recommended goose seasons are October 1 through January 1 in the north and October 8 through January 1 in areas to the south, except for an October 22-January 1 season in some parts of the magic valley.

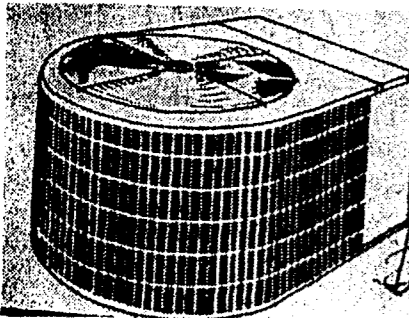

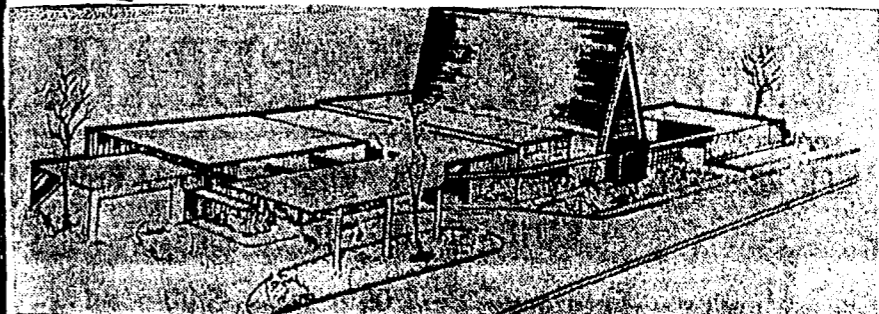

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. For the school officials to determine eligibility the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct. Households are required to report increase in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decrease in household size. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy, (Supt. George Crawford) will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dis-

satisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Jack Spangler for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure. If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above. In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information. The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data. In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

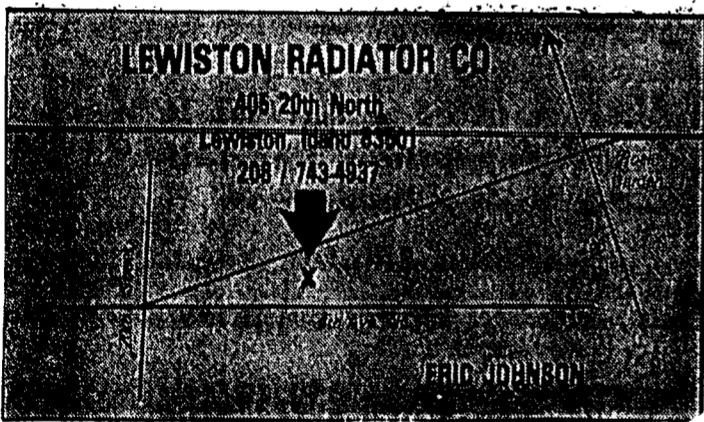

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct. Households are required to report increase in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy, (Supt. George Crawford) will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dis-

satisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Jack Spangler for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above. In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information. The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.
