Kendrick picked up its points in the fourth quarter on a pass from Troy Huett to Jack Meyers in a play covering 19 yards and then Huett returned a Spartan punt 45 yards for the final KHS scoring.

School Board Viewed Improvements

The regular meeting of the Kendrick Jt. School District Board of Trustees was held Thursday evening, September 8. Board members took a tour of the Juliaetta Elementary School and Kendrick High School to see the summer capital outlay improvements. The second and sixth grade classrooms had sinks installed over the summer which completes the sink project for each elementary classroom that was started last summer. Four classrooms, the library and two offices as well as the stairwell and basement hallway were painted over the summer at the elementary school. The high school had the concrete of the front sidewalk replaced as well as the kitchen and several hallways repainted.

Wayne Rush, the vocational agriculture teacher, gave the staff report. He covered the course offerings for the classroom and shop of Vo Ag. I, II, III, and IV. Likewise, he covered the course offerings in the junior high shop mini course where the seventh and eighth grade girls and boys are rotated through the shop each nine weeks. Furthermore, he discussed the numbers of FFA animals being entered into the Latah County Fair.

Under old business, the board approved a revision in the early graduation policy that had been discussed at an earlier meeting. Under new business the board hired William Wilson as the Cedar Ridge bus driver, Mary Lou Taylor as the temporary secondary special education aide, and Grace Konen as a first grade classroom aide. The time of the first grade aide position was lengthened from 2 hours to 3 hours. Two inter-district agreement requests were approved for elementary school students. The board also reviewed the 1983 district SRA test scores.

Genesee Blanks Moscow JVs 14-0

A rugged Genesee Bulldog defense gave up only 4 yards on the ground and just 63 through the air Saturday afternoon as the GHS team defeated the Moscow JV squad 14-0 on the GHS gridiron.

It was the second win of the young season for Coach Daren Munden and his Bulldogs.

Bulldogs Rick Mahini, Terry Flodin, Ken Reynolds and Sam Smith all were praised for their defensive efforts.

After a scoreless first half, Genesee drove 44-yards for the first scoring of the contest. Bulldog quarterback Sam Smith hit a 36 yard pass to Eric Feigenbutz that went down to the Moscow 1 yard line where Rick Vestal punched it over.

In the final quarter Sam Smith intercepted a Moscow pass on the Moscow 27 yard line and took it in for the score.

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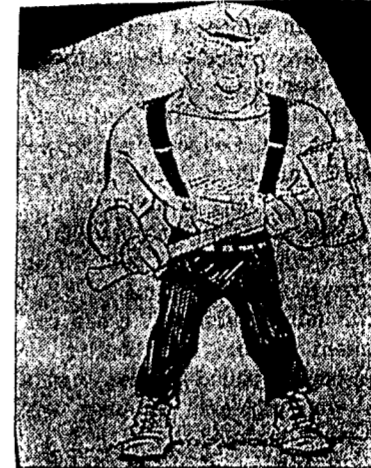

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Many Idaho homes will soon be crawling with company

Twin Falls, Idaho— Idaho homeowners can expect a certain amount of company this fall—of the six-legged variety.

Robert L. Stoltz, entomologist with the UI Cooperative Extension Service at Twin Falls, says that shorter day length and cooler evenings are signaling insects that "it's time to find a warm spot to spend the winter—just like us."

Into our homes will creep an assortment of elm leaf beetles, box-elder bugs, ground beetles, root weevils, wolf spiders, jumping spiders and other insects.

"Ninety-nine percent of them won't be harmful or cause problems," said Stoltz. "They'll just be a nuisance. They'll overwinter somewhere in the house then move out again in the spring."

But such unwelcome visitors as black widow spiders, wasps, clover mites, bedbugs and carpet beetles

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can pose hazards to comfort, health or food supplies.

Black widow spiders, always present in Idaho towns and around homes rarely bite people, said Stoltz—probably because we're so aware of them.

Bedbugs, residents of swallows nests during the summer, can move indoors in the fall. They feed on humans, and their bites are irritating.

Carpet beetle adults, which feed on flowers in the summertime, crawl into stored cereal products or animal textiles to lay their eggs. They can contaminate food and chew carpets and clothing.

Panic is rarely justified when these visitors are spotted, Stoltz said. He recommends an inhospitable rolled-up newspaper or shoe as a solution to most of the problems. The more humane approach for the kind hearted or squeamish—is to pitch the insect outside. An aerosol spray can be aimed at individual wasps, bees or spiders.

Stoltz noted that most wasps that move indoors during the fall are queens, destroying one queen will eliminate an entire nest the following year.

Because clover mites leave behind a red dye when squashed, Stoltz said it's best to spray them first and then vacuum them up.

Cereal products intended to be kept for long periods should be stored in sealed cans or other airtight containers.

Firewood should be brought into the home no more than four days before use to avoid infestations of forest beetles.

Stoltz recommends through weatherizing—sealing, caulking and screening—to avoid insect movement into the home.

Homeowners may also use a residual spray on shrubbery close to their homes any time during September or early October in inhibit migration. These sprays should be applied in a 6- to 8-foot wide band all around the house, 2 feet up from the foundation, and around windows and doors.

U. of I. Fraternity pledges in state

Commission amends Bear regulations

The Fish and Game Commission has amended 1983-84 black bear regulations to clarify a provision regarding the use of dogs in management unit 45 east of Mountain Home.

According to the amendment, it will be unlawful to use dogs from April 1 through May 31, 1984. Printed regulations made it unlawful to use dogs, except during the April 1—May 31 period.

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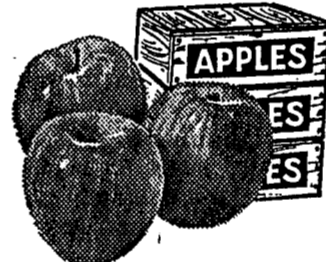
