Murriel A. Cook, 75, Claimed by Attack

Services for Murriel A. Cook, a homemaker at Lewiston and Lenore known for her needlework were conducted at 11 a. m. Sept. 15, at the Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston, with the Rev. Arlie T. Whybark officiating.

Mrs. Cook was stricken with an apparent heart attack Sunday, Sept. 11, while at the Lewiston Roundup, and died at St. Joseph's Hospital, where she was taken by ambulance. She and her husband, Lloyd J. Cook, farmed at Lenore for more than 30 years, and then moved to Lewiston in 1957. Her husband died on August 16.

She had won numerous ribbons at county fairs for her needlework, and was a member of the Willing Workers Club at Lenore, and an honorary member of the Orchards Hobby Club. She also was a member of the Lewis-Clark Creative Workshop Cooperative.

She had cooked for many years for Bible school and for conferences at the United Brethren Church at Cream Ridge, near Lenore. She enjoyed gardening and growing flowers, and loved to ride horses and to hunt and fish.

She was born March 6, 1908, at Clarkston to Adolph and Sarah Onstott. The family resided at Clarkston until 1915, and then at Kendrick. She attended school at Kendrick and then married Cook on October 5, 1924, at Lewiston. They made their home at Lenore.

Survivors include two sons, Clarence of Lenore and Donald of Lewiston; three daughters, Vivian Ward of Sunnyside, Wash., and Dorothy Springer and Kathleen Dallas, both of Lewiston; two brothers Manning Onstott of Kendrick and Oscar Onstott of Pocatello; one sister, Marjorie Hansen of Spokane; 19 grandchildren and 26 great-grandchildren.

The family suggests any memorial contributions be made to the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children at Spokane, or to the charity of choice.

Burial was at Normal Hill Cemetery.

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Hunters—Take Note of Regulation Changes

HUNTER'S REMINDER: There are several items in the 1983 Idaho Big Game Regulations worth reviewing before going afield this fall.

1. The boundary between Big Game Management Units 8 and 8A was changed earlier this year. Two

that runs from Ahsahka northwest two units are now divided by a line through Kendrick, Deary, Harvard, and Polatch. A more detailed description of the unit boundaries can be found in the regulations.

2. Elk hunters participating in the general season of Units 10, 12, 15 and 16 or hunting in controlled hunts 208-1, 208-2 or 2010-A must

keep lower the jaw with the carcass when transporting elk from the field. There is no mandatory check-in of the jaws.

3. Deer hunters participating in the general, either-sex deer season running October 19 through October 23 in Unit 11 should be aware that only a small portion of that unit is open. As described in the regula-

tions, the open area is that portion south and west of Tanmany Creek and Waha Road to the 21 Ranch and north of the county road from the 21 Ranch to Craig Mountain Wildlife Management Area land.

4. A special regulations in effect during controlled deer hunts and general deer seasons that are restricted to white-tailed or mule deer

only requires hunters to leave the fully-haired tail attached to the carcass while in transit. This provides positive identification of species in the event of a game check by the conservation officer.

5. Bear hunters should note a mandatory check-in regulation in effect this season that requires all bear skulls to be presented to Department of Fish and Game personnel for inspection and removal of a small premolar tooth.


6. Resident big game hunters who take mountain loan incidentally while pursuing deer or elk during firearms deer or elk seasons are now required to purchase mountain lion tags before going afield. This marks a change from previous years, when deer and elk hunters were not required to purchase tags to take mountain lion.

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
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

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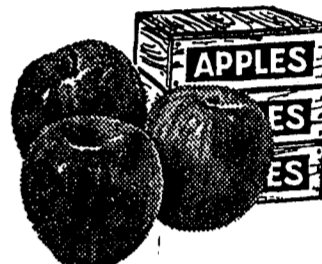
