Lewiston Woman Killed by Falling Tree in Three Bear Area Saturday

A 28-year-old Lewiston woman, Paula Terry Hogan, was killed instantly Saturday afternoon, October 1 when she was struck by a falling tree that had been cut by a family for wood.

Mrs. Hogan was riding a three-wheeled motorcycle when she was struck and killed instantly by the tree as it fell across the road, according to a sheriff's report. The accident occurred on the north side of Dyvorshak Reservoir about 1 p. m. on Alderman Ridge near Three Bear Creek. Reports indicated she was with her husband and another couple.

The body was brought to the Kendrick Fire Hall until preliminary investigations were completed and later taken to Lewiston.

John E. Dickinson, 77, Passes Sept. 24

John Edward Dickinson, 77, a retired logger and sheepherder died at 9:10 p. m. Saturday, September 24, at St. Joseph's Hospital of complications of a stroke suffered about 6 months ago.

He had lived at Lewiston until recently when he moved to Juliaetta to be near his daughter and son-in-law.

He was born Dec. 5, 1905 at Brigham City, Utah, the son of Andrew Burt and Elvera Dickinson. He lived at Brigham City until 1918 and attended school there. He served in the U. S. Army in the Philippines from 1925 to 1927, then lived in various places, including Portland, Ore., where he worked in the shipyards.

He married Opal I. Taylor in 1944 at Portland. They moved to Lewiston the following year and he worked for H. Hood as a shepherd and for Sutton Savage.

Survivors include his wife, Opal I. Dickinson; and a daughter, Opal Lohman, both of Juliaetta; a sister, Elizabeth Young of Salem, Ore., two brothers, Claude Dickinson of Seattle and Dave Dickinson of Pampa, Texas and four grandchildren. A sister and brother preceded him in death.

A graveside service was conducted at 2 p. m. Thursday at Normal Hill cemetery with the Rev. Robert L. Compton of the Orchards Community Church officiating. The family suggests that any memorials be made to the Diabetes Foundation in care of Mountain View Funeral Home of Lewiston which was in charge of funeral arrangements.

Mattie Wright, 105, Lifelong Resident of Area, Dies Sept. 26

Mattie Wright, who spent all 105 years of her life in this region, died Monday night, September 26 at the Paradise Villa Nursing Home, Moscow, where she had lived since 1975.

Mrs. Wright slipped into a coma on Monday. She celebrated her 105th birthday at the home May 25.

She was the widow of Harry S. Wright who died at the age of 92 in 1908. They were 1895 homesteaders on the Nezperce Prairie when it was opened for settlement. Wright also operated a sawmill and a grist mill and worked at the North Idaho Indian Agency at Lapwai.

Mrs. Wright was born May 25, 1878 at Mayview, a Garfield County farming area high above the Snake River. Her parents were Jasper and Louise Mills, among the earliest settlers in Garfield County.

She came to the Lewiston area as a young woman and was courted separately at church socials and picnics for one year before marrying Wright Sept. 29, 1895. She was 17 and he was 19.

They went immediately to the Nezperce Prairie to file a homestead. They lived in a tent on their land before building a home.

Mr. and Mrs. Wright observed their 72nd wedding anniversary before his death July 18, 1968.

After two years on the homestead they moved to Dublin, the old Lewis Co. settlement to operate a grist mill, and later to Juliaetta and then to Southwick, where they ran a sawmill. The sawmill, Mrs. Wright recalled in an interview several years ago, burned down twice, and was rebuilt twice.

They went into semi-retirement in 1933 and moved to Clarkston. They moved to Lewiston a few years later. She continued living there until 1975 when she moved to Moscow.

Until she moved Mrs. Wright raised a large garden.

She is survived by a son, Louis A. Wright of Juliaetta; a daughter, Louise Young of Redding, Ca.; four grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren, and 21 great-great-grandchildren.

A graveside service was held on Thursday at Normal Hill Cemetery with the Rev. Samuel Stedman of Victory Tabernacle Church officiating.

J-K Area Needs New Surplus Commodities Distributor; Recipient Guidelines Change

Mrs. Kathy Groseclose, who has served as coordinator for the surplus commodities distribution in the area, announced this week that she will no longer be able to serve in that capacity, and is looking for a new coordinator. Mrs. Groseclose said new responsibilities do not allow her to continue in this job.

She said she wished to thank all the volunteers who have helped her continue to distribute as long as she has. Anyone interested in the commodities distributor position should contact the Lewiston Food Bank at 746-USA (746-8732). The distribution van is scheduled to deliver Oct. commodities to this area Oct. 19, so please contact them as soon as possible, if you are interested.

Changes In Program
Mrs. Groseclose said there are some new requirements and changes taking place in the October distribution.

First, the Valley Food Bank in Lewiston has organized a distribution van to transport all the various districts' commodities to them. This will enable all the seven districts to be more uniform about the dates they distribute. This will also eliminate the individual districts having to arrange their own pick ups of the commodities.

Second, the state is going to become more uniform regarding the recipient guidelines.

Coordinators will be required to ask for verification of residency and income per household. Recipients may not receive commodities in October if this requirement is not met.

1. Acceptable Proof of Residency: Tax Records, rent receipt, utilities bill light bill, phone bill, post office rent receipt) with the recipient's name and address on it.

2. Acceptable Proof of Income: (for all members of household).

Wage statement, copy of Soc. Sec. check (if you have direct deposit, the bank has a form you can ask them to fill out) IRS acct. Statement (for self-employed) Income statement from food stamp office, Fuel assistance statement from CAA, AFDC card.

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Fish and Game violations cost offenders \$122,000

Fish and game law violators paid more than \$122,000 in fines and forfeitures and about \$58,999 in mandatory civil penalties during fiscal year 1983, according to a Department of Fish and Game report.

The total for civil penalties was about \$7,000 more than the amount assessed the previous year, but fines and forfeitures were down approximately \$21,000 from FY 82 at the time of the current report.


Under Idaho law, the state treasurer distributes 45 percent of fines and forfeitures among general school funds in counties with department-owned lands. Another 22.5 percent goes to school funds in counties where violations occurred and the district court fund gets 22.5 percent.

Other allocations include five percent for the search and rescue fund and the remaining five percent for the state general fund. Money from civil penalties goes in the fish and game fund.

By law, a magistrate must order reimbursement of \$1,000 for the illegal killing, possession or waste of a moose, bighorn sheep, mountain goat or caribou. The penalty for elk is \$500; for deer antelope wild turkey, whistling swan, sturgeon is \$200; and chinook salmon, \$100.

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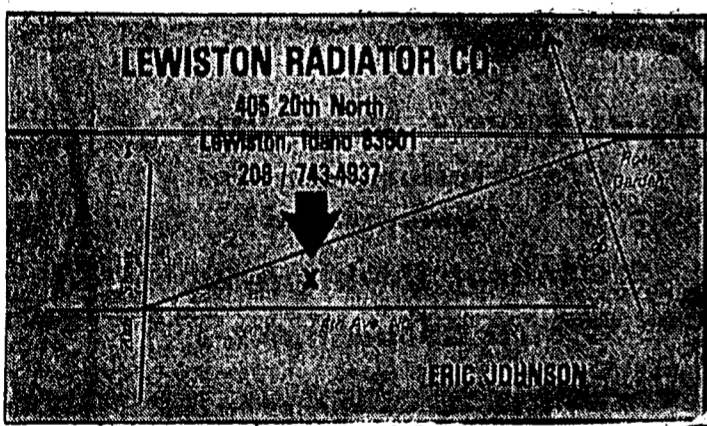
