**Geneva Stedman, 78, Passes October 5**

Geneva Queen Stedman, 78, a long-time Kendrick area resident, died of a heart attack at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, October 5, at her Lewiston home at 3820 21st Street.

She and her husband Fred Orel Stedman, had operated ranches in the Kendrick area. They came to Lewiston, for a second time, in 1972, to live.

She was born June 16, 1905, to Samuel and Nellie Stanton at Ressel, Idaho. She lived on a homestead, on the Nez Perce Reservation until 1909.

She lived on a ranch near Kendrick from 1909 to 1926, then at Lewiston the next two years then back at Kendrick in 1928-29, at Cosmopolis, Wash., the next two years and in Kendrick again from 1930 to 1972. She graduated from Kendrick High School in 1923.

She was a member of the Victory Tabernacle Church of Clarkston since 1972 and a member of the Kendrick Assembly of God from 1943 until 1972. She served in various church capacities, including Sunday school superintendent and teacher and president and secretary-treasurer of the organization.

She and Stedman were married Sept. 4, 1927, at Kendrick, and he survives at the family home.

Other survivors include a daughter, Barbara J. Comyn of Seattle; a son, the Rev. Samuel N. Stedman of Lewiston; 10 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Two brothers and a sister preceded her in death.

The funeral was held at 10 a. m. Saturday at the Victory Tabernacle Church at Clarkston with the Rev. E. J. Robinson officiating. Burial was at Kendrick Cemetery with Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in charge. Memorials may be given to the Victory Tabernacle Church.

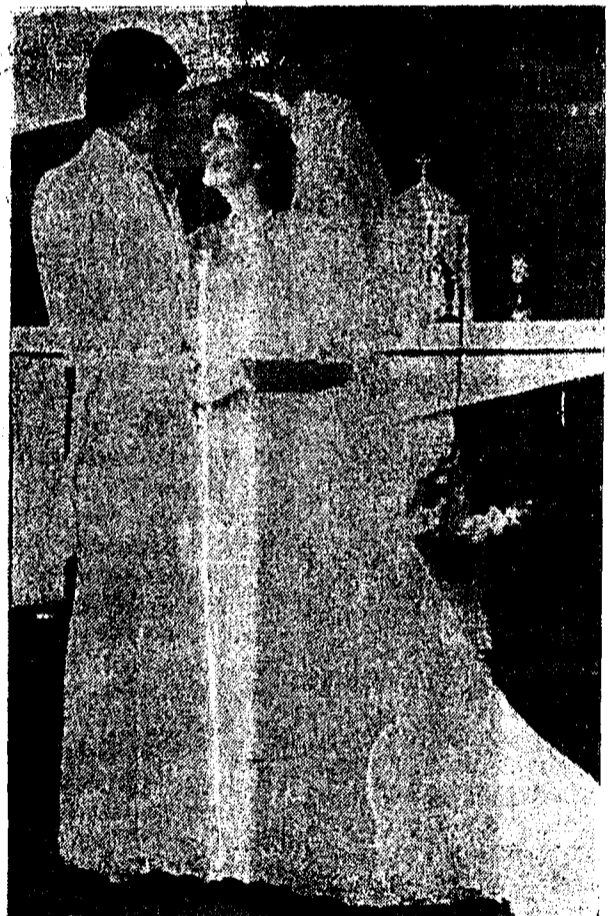

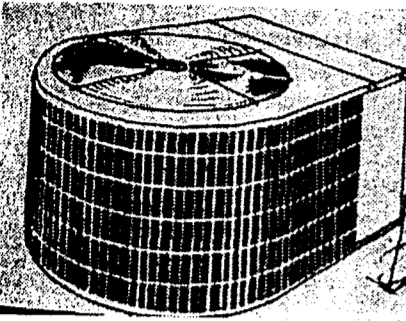
