The Board of Trustees met at their regular meeting on Monday, October 10, 1983. Items on the agenda included approval of Hayden, Ross, Plicher, and Jones Accounting Firm to perform the 1984 school district audit, establish an account with the Bank of Troy for the purpose of securing a bank card, provide locks on all the doors of the 1912 portion of the school. A policy was adopted on employee use of sick leave while eligible for workmans compensation. The Trustee State Convention which will be held in Coeur d'Alene November 10-12, 1983 will be attended by all board members.

Job Partnership Training Act Can Help Unemployment Problem
Finding jobs for young people and for adults that lack some necessary job skills to be competitive in today's job market is the thrust of a new program now available through the Moscow Job Service office.

The Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA), which became effective on October 1, 1983, is designed to create jobs around a particular applicant's existing qualifications, while providing a training ground for the development of new skills.

An employer who can create a new job for an eligible participant, or fit such an individual into an existing position, can be reimbursed for half the person's salary during a specified training period. In some cases the employer may be eligible for an additional tax credit as well.

To be eligible for the program, a person must either fall between the ages of 16 and 21 or be an economically disadvantaged adult who is in need of training. The need for training is based partially on the length of time an individual has been without work.

Funding for the JTPA program comes from a federal government block grant allocated to the state and re-allocated through the Idaho Private Industry Council. Moscow Job Service will be able to place 17 young people and 15 eligible adults in Latah County, contingent on the availability of employers who are willing to participate in the program.

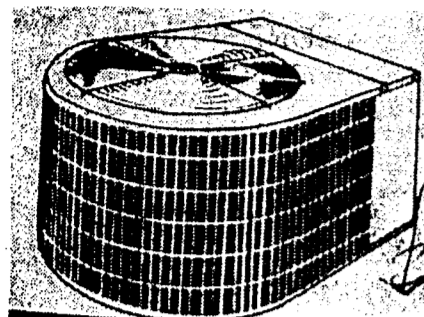

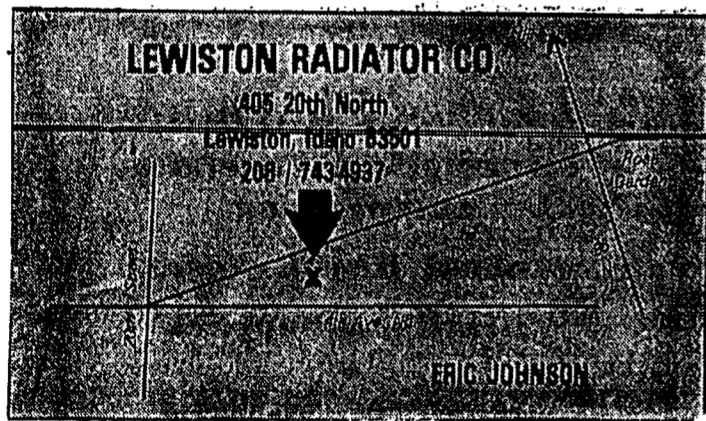
