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Conservation Officers Get New Enforcement Tool

Phony bowhunters could be in deep trouble from now on when they stick an arrow in a bullet hole and claim a legal shot in an archery-only big game season in Idaho. Their story won't wash if a conservation officers shows up with

has also installed signs clearly marking the spots as reserved for handicapped individuals.

"Any vehicle not displaying a handicapped placard or license plate will be cited and towed away," Weaver said.

The department has always enforced the laws regarding handicapped parking, but it is stepping up its enforcement because of recent increased awareness of obstacles facing handicapped persons, Weaver said.

"We will be towing cars because those parking places are for persons with impaired mobility. If they can't park in the spaces designated for them, they have to park a long way away from where they are going, and might be prevented from reaching their destination," Weaver explained.

In addition, the handicapped parking spots are larger than regular parking spaces, allowing persons in wheelchairs to maneuver their chairs in and out of cars and between cars. There is parking for the handicapped in most university parking lots, and on University Avenue near the library he said.

Persons whose cars are towed may reclaim them by calling the Police Department. Handicapped placards can be obtained from the university or from the State of Idaho, and questions on obtaining them can be directed to Tom LaPointe at the UI Information Center, (208) 885-1073.

some gear just issued by the Department of Fish and Game and makes an on-the-spot check.

"We call it a forensics kit and it produces evidence that is admissible in court," says Frank NeSmith, enforcement special operations officer. Just how does it work? That's NeSmith's secret.

The kits are a first for the department, but the techniques involved—both old and new,—have been tested and proved out, according to NeSmith, who trained department officers in their use.

"Bowhunters who believe in the ethics of their ancient sport should have good reason to be pleased with this enforcement rule, he adds.

Citations issued and cases under investigation before the kits were issued this year point up the need for such equipment. One officer made three cases during an earlier archery-only season and 7 other similar violations were reported in one department alone.

"We still have some deer and elk archery seasons to go and we'll keep the forensics kits handy," NeSmith promises.

Another feature in the kit helps determine when the game animal or bird has been killed. "This becomes an effective deterrent against the person who takes some game illegally just before a season opens," NeSmith says. "And still another part of the kit can be used in the field to analyze blood."

He urges those who see any suspected violation of Fish and Game law to call Citizens Against Poaching on a toll-free hotline, 1-800-632-5999. All reports are investigated and a reward of from \$100 to \$500 is offered if a citation is issued.

MARY REED NEW HISTORICAL SOCIETY DIRECTOR

Mary E. Reed has been hired as the new Director of the Latah County Historical Society. Reed, a native Idahoan, has lived in the Palouse for over six years. She has been a volunteer at the Historical Society since 1979, and prior to becoming Director was a member of its Board of Trustees. Reed was hired by the Board at its September meeting after a three-month search for a new Director, and began work on October 1. She replaces Carol Young who left the Society to attend graduate school.

Reed has a Ph. D. in history from the University of California at Berkeley and has been actively engaged in writing Pacific Northwest history for several years. Among local projects she has worked on are an oral history and museum exhibit of Moscow novelist Carol Ryrie Brink; a history of the sternwheeler Jean, currently moored in Lewiston; and a history of the communities of Potlatch, Palouse, Moscow, Pullman, Genesee and Uniontown on a research grant with the National Endowment for the Humanities. She has also worked on regional historical contracts with the Army Corps of Engineers and the Forest Service, and is the author of several articles and monographs on Northwest history.

Reed also brings to her new job many years of administrative and grants-management experience. In hiring a director the Board set as its highest priority the necessity of having someone with strong training in history, combined with administrative skills.

Reed's primary goal for the Society is to "revitalize our historical programs and institute new ones, particularly in communities outside of Moscow. The organization already has a reputation as one of the best historical societies in the region. We need to maintain and improve upon this reputation by offering more and better programs." Among specific services the Society's new Director is interested in are school outreach programs; an on-going speaker's series; traveling exhibits; more publications; presentations to clubs and organizations; and continued emphasis on the collecting and preservation of library and museum materials.

The Historical Society will soon launch its first ever endowment campaign in an effort to stabilize its future funding. "The key to successful fundraising," noted Reed, "is a strong historical program. The thing that distinguishes us from the many other non-profit county organizations also seeking support is our link with the past. If we continue to demonstrate to county residents that we are conscientiously preserving our heritage for future generations, I am sure Latah County residents and businesses will continue to support us. As the county gets ready to cele-

brate its centennial in 1988, it is important that the Society provide the leadership to have a successful celebration."

"I hope people will stop by the museum to give me their ideas," Reed stated. "Only when we know what the community wants will the Historical Society be able to meet the needs of all Latah County residents."

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PART OF SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFIT MAY BE TAXABLE

Starting in 1984, part of the Social Security benefits received by people with substantial other income may be subject to the Federal Income tax. This change in the law was part of the 1983 Social Security amendments which were designed to strengthen the Social Security program for many years into the future.

Up to half of the person's Social Security benefits for 1984, and for later years, will be subject to tax if his or her adjusted gross income for

Federal tax purposes, plus nontaxable interest income and half of the Social Security benefits exceed a base amount.

The base amount is \$25,000 for an individual, \$32,000 for a couple filing a joint return, and zero for a couple filing separate returns. The amount of benefits subject to taxes will be the smaller of:

- One-half of the Social Security benefits, or
- One-half of the amount of the person's combined income—adjusted gross income, nontaxable interest income, and half the Social Security benefit—exceeds the base amount.

Some adjustments in benefit payments may be possible. Any overpayment that person repays during the year can be deducted. Also, any lump sum received can be prorated to the year for which it was paid if that is an advantage.

Any Medicare medical insurance premium deducted must be included in total benefits.

The Internal Revenue Service will provide complete instructions on how to file tax returns. Social Security has a free leaflet which briefly explains about taxing benefits.

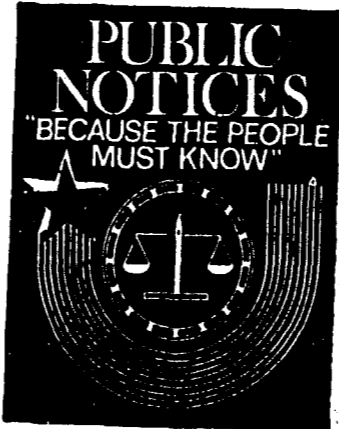


