City Elections to be Held in Kendrick, Genesee, Juliaetta Tuesday, November 8

Qualified voters within the city limits of Genesee, Kendrick and Juliaetta will go to the polls next Tuesday, November 8 to vote for candidates for the city councils of these three towns. The polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 p. m. at the three polling places.

Council seats are being contested in both Juliaetta and Genesee, while the two incumbents in Kendrick are unopposed on the ballot. Each of the towns will elect two councilmen for terms of four years.

A special advisory ballot on sidewalks will also be given to Kendrick voters. (See separate story on this page).

Five Candidates In Genesee

Five candidates are appearing on the ballot for the Genesee city election next Tuesday. The terms of councilmen Walter L. Moden and Willis Moser are expiring December 31. Moden, a veteran of 17 years on the council, has declined to seek another term, however, Moser will be seeking re-election for another four years. Moden is a mechanical engineer at the University of Idaho. Moser owns and operates the Genesee Service Station.

Seeking a seat on the Genesee Council for the first time are: Charles L. Wilson, an engineering student at the University of Idaho. Wilson and his family have been residents of Genesee since 1979. His wife, Leslie, is Genesee Postmaster. Robert J. Jacobs, a carpenter, is a life-long Genesee resident and is a former Genesee city supervisor. Ronald Zenner, a farmer, is also a life-long Genesee area resident. David Wagar, an employee of Genesee

Union Warehouse lumber yard is a life-long Genesee resident.

Genesee voters will cast their ballots at the Genesee City Hall on Main Street in the fire hall.

City Clerk Mercedes Roach said Monday that those residents who wish to vote by absentee ballot should contact her as quickly as possible for their ballots.

Three Candidates In Juliaetta

Both incumbents whose terms expire at the end of the year in Juliaetta are seeking re-election to the city council. L. C. Groseclose and Roger Kechter have filed petitions of candidacy and are on the ballot for the Tuesday election. One newcomer is making his first bid for an elective office, as Paul Hutcheson seeks one of the available council seats.

Groseclose, a city council veteran, is a retired Juliaetta Elementary School maintenance man. Kechter is employed with the Kendrick Fire Protection District and works from an office in Deary. Hutcheson is a logger.

Juliaetta voters will cast their ballots between the hours of noon and 8 p. m. at the city hall on Main Street.

No Opposition In Kendrick

Only in Kendrick are the two incumbent councilmen unopposed on the ballot for re-election for another term of four years. Darrel Brocke, of Geo. F. Brocke and Sons, Seedsmen is on the ballot, as is Jerry Brown, manager of the Troy Telephone Co.

Kendrick voters will vote at the Kendrick Fire Hall.

Advisory Ballot on Sidewalks to be Asked of Kendrick Voters Tuesday

When Kendrick voters go to the polls next Tuesday, Nov. 8 to cast their ballots for City Councilmen, they will be given a special "Advisory Ballot" concerning the possible formation of an improvement district to raise funds to repair sidewalks in town.

Kendrick Mayor Wayne Harris said Tuesday evening that the ballot is strictly an advisory ballot and does not commit the voter or the city to anything. It is being used by the city council to determine if there is enough interest to continue to investigate possible ways to get the sidewalks in town improved and repaired.

The mayor and the council have been questioned a number of times by various citizens about repairing some of the sidewalks in town. It is understood that installation, maintenance and repair of the sidewalks is the responsibility of the property owner, but because of possible lack of uniformity and consistency in the private individual handling this work, the city usually handles the job and bills the property owner. Sometimes, also, unless there is a general agreement among the property owners that the work needs to be done, there can be hard feelings

and objections to sidewalk installation and repair.

To avoid creating a situation that citizens might not wish, Mayor Harris and the council have decided to ask Kendrick residents if they would like the city to investigate the possible formation of an improvement district to raise funds to repair existing sidewalks in Kendrick. Residents who vote will be asked if they are "For" or "Against" such an idea. If there appears to be enough interest in the subject, then the council will go ahead and begin looking into the formation of such a district, what the costs would be, who could do the work, when, where, etc. If many "Against" votes appear on the advisory ballots, then the issue will be dropped.

Harris said he wanted to stress that a "For" vote commits neither the city or the voter to anything. All it does is let the council know that there is enough interest in the subject of sidewalk repair for the council to look into the matter a little further. When some of this information is obtained then the council would call a public meeting and let the people know more of the details.

ORDINANCE NO. 215

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, APPROPRIATING SUMS OF MONEY AUTHORIZED BY LAW AND DEEMED NECESSARY TO DEFRAY ALL EXPENSES OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING WITH THE FIRST DAY OF OCTOBER, 1983, FOR ALL GENERAL AND SPECIAL PURPOSES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That this ordinance will be known as the Annual Appropriation Ordinance.

SECTION 2. 

 "Most all of our facilities are designed to withstand an earthquake two or three times stronger than what we had this morning," he said.

Earthquake Center Below Mount Borah

Moscow—The epicenter of the earthquake which shook the Rocky Mountains early Friday morning (Oct. 28) was located 50 miles northeast of Sun Valley just below Mt. Borah (elev., 12,662 ft.), the highest peak in the state of Idaho, according to geologists with the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology on the University of Idaho campus.

The earthquake, which registered at 6.9 on the Richter Scale, originated from a fault line located at 44.1 degrees latitude by 113.9 degrees longitude, reported Dr. Roy Breckenridge, associate professor of hydrogeology at UI and geologist with the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology.

"The epicenter of this earthquake lies slightly east of a huge cluster of historic epicenters," Breckenridge said, noting that a number of faults in the earth's crust run through the area, known as the Lost River Valley. It is along such "fault lines" that earthquakes usually occur.

According to reports from Idaho's states disaster services offices early Friday, three people were killed in the earthquake in central Idaho and roads and buildings in the area sustained some damage.

Dr. Peter Isaacson, an associate professor of geology at UI who recently completed a chart of the underground geology of Idaho for the Bureau, explained that preliminary data on the earthquake suggests that it may have occurred along what is known as a "border fault."

A geologic phenomenon known as "crustal extension" is occurring throughout much of central Idaho, he explained. "There are some mountain ranges that are literally rising straight up out of the crust, and adjacent basins are dropping relative to those," he said.

It is along the border between the rising mountain ranges and the declining basins that such border faults occur, Isaacson explained.

Isaacson emphasized that he can only speculate on the exact nature of the earthquake, or whether it did indeed occur along the border fault that runs near Mount Borah between the Idaho towns of Challis and Mackay. The great distances from the epicenter which is was felt as suggest it may have originated from a

PARVOVIRUS

In late 1978 a new disease of dogs was recognized that causes a severe bloody diarrhea and vomiting. This disease affects only dogs, is worldwide in distribution, and is referred to as Parvovirus.

Canine parvovirus is a very resistant virus and can survive for long periods of time outside the dog's body. The virus is shed in the vomitus and feces and may be shed for about 18 days after recovery from the disease. Older dogs with a mild infection may show no signs of the disease but shed virus in the feces.

Young dogs, especially those 10 to 16 weeks of age, are the most susceptible. Death can occur in puppies 2-4 days after signs of the disease appear. A loose stool may be the only sign in an older dog and they quickly recover.

Signs of the disease can be quite varied. A fluid diarrhea streaked with blood or red with blood is a consistent sign. Vomiting which starts suddenly and remains severe is usually seen. Vomiting and diarrhea produce a rapid and life-threatening dehydration. Affected dogs are often in a state of extreme depression.

Treatment of canine parvovirus is aimed at stopping the vomiting and diarrhea, combating dehydration with fluids, and giving anti-biotics. In severely affected animals that are in a shock-like state treatment may also include steroids.

Prevention of canine parvovirus is accomplished with vaccinations. Two doses of vaccine at 3-4 week intervals in recommended initially, followed by a yearly vaccination program. The final booster shot should be given after the dog reaches 16 weeks of age.

fault deeper beneath the earth's surface.

Isaacson, who spent the summer heading a geologic research team in central Idaho near where the earthquake occurred, noted that the area has received high rainfall in recent months. He speculated that the rainfall may have lubricated the fault zone and triggered the earthquake.

"That, of course, is speculation, but that's the best we can do right now," he said.

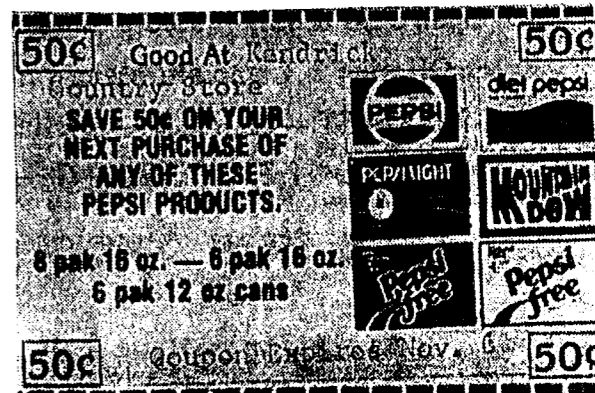


