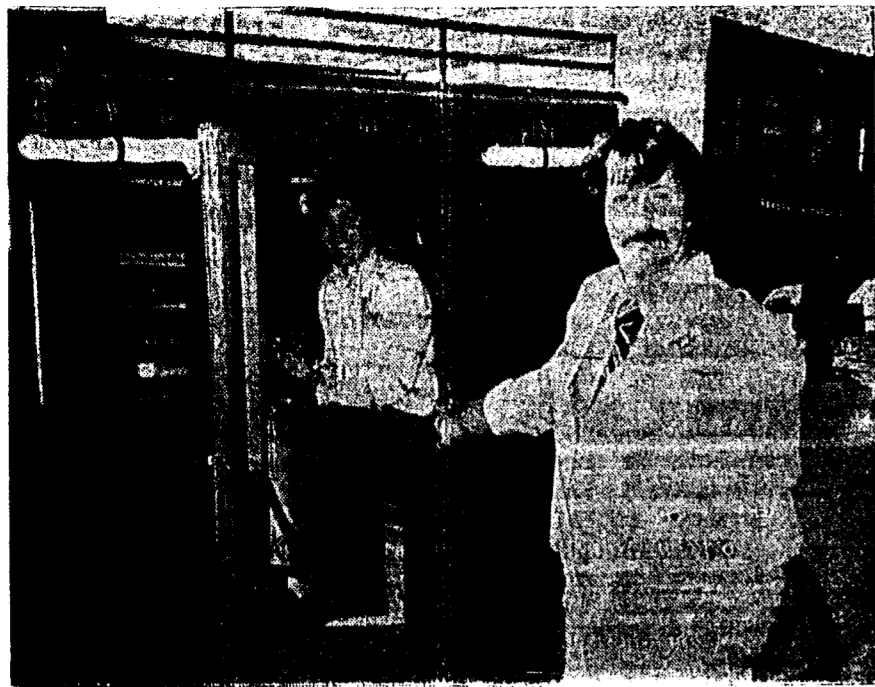


Colwell-Osborn Wedding in Deary Oct. 15

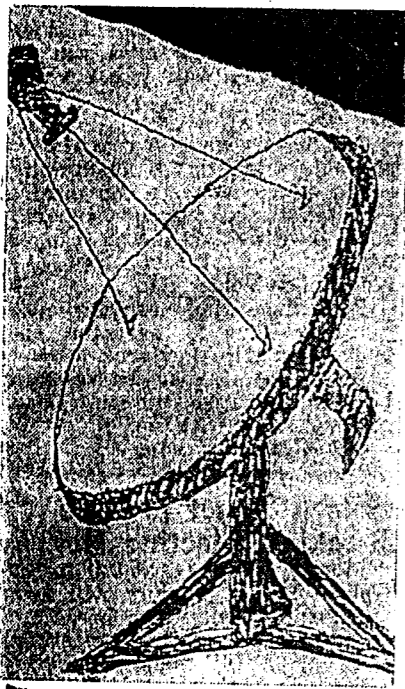

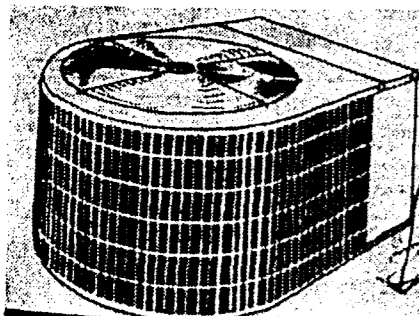

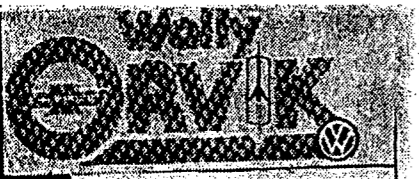
