

School News— Of Genesee

Elementary school conferences were scheduled Nov. 11, 1983. There was no school for students so that parents could come for conferences. Since there are so many working parents, one of the ideas being considered by the staff is starting conferences at noon and carrying them through into late afternoon and evening. This would allow those who work to make the conferences with their children's teachers. The school would appreciate any feedback people might have regarding this proposed change. If you have any input please contact the school. This change is proposed for the second conference date, March 30, 1984.

High school teachers were given the opportunity to visit schools in the area on Nov. 11, 1983. Classes were cancelled for students for the day so teachers could have an in-service day. Teachers visited schools from Lapwai to Coeur d'Alene and reported back to the school the outcome of their visits. Most of the visits revealed two things: one, some new idea or interesting approach they could bring back and use in their own classes, and two, that things are not so bad here at home. This is the second year the high school staff has made visits to other schools and the opportunity has been valuable to both teachers and the school program.

The introduction of microcomputers into the school is having its ups and downs. In the high school Miss Schlader teaches the computer class. Even with the addition of more microcomputers, student access is limited because of the small number of microcomputers. Something helpful to the school is the growing number of students that now have computers at home, they are able to practice at home rather than wait for time on the computer at school. In the elementary classes students and teachers are learning how the computer works. Students are learning key boarding skills, as well as computer literacy and familiarization.

Thanksgiving vacation is only a week away. Parents are reminded that school will be released on Nov. 23, 1983 at 1:25 p. m. Classes will resume as usual on Monday, Nov. 28. The school district is soliciting questionnaires from patrons regarding how the school is performing in certain areas. These were sent out with the last newsletter. It would be appreciated if more patrons would complete and return the questionnaire to the school.

Genesee Trustees Attend Conference
The Genesee Jt. School Dist. No. 282 board of trustees attended the annual Idaho School Board Association convention held in Coeur d'Alene, Id., Nov. 10-12, 1983. Board Chairman Jack Spangler; Vice-Chm., Martin Stout; Treasurer, Glen Baumgartner, and board members, Carolyn Wilson and Gene Esser attended the three-day meeting. The agenda for the convention included topics currently of interest to board members. Merit pay for teachers was the feature of the first general session followed by clinics which included workshops on teach-

er competency, school finance, policy development, Idaho Proficiency Tests, school counselor, and negotiations.

The second general session dealt with current issues at the state level regarding funding, proposed changes in the law, and what some of the new policies from the State Board of Education will mean to the local schools. Following the general meetings individual clinics were available from which board members could choose.

The remainder of the convention centered around resolutions that the state trustees would like their executive director to work for this coming legislative session. The resolutions deal with concerns that directly affect schools. By acting as a group the trustees are better able to influence the interests of the school state wide.

The annual convention ends up being an important meeting for trustees to attend. It is the one time during the past year that they can receive training to better serve their district patrons, as well as be better informed about financial and legal issues confronting schools. When you consider that board members are unpaid, and many have to use individual vacation to attend to school business, we are fortunate in having people in our community willing to give of their time and efforts to serve our school.

TREES FOR SALE BY UI NURSERY

Moscow—Trees, trees, trees, thousands of trees, are being offered for sale this fall by the UI College of Forestry Nursery.

According to Kipp Kilpatrick, graduate student in forestry, and communications the nursery is offering more than 100,000 containerized conifer seedlings: some, 85,000 containerized hardwood seedlings and 90,000 hybrid poplar and golden willow cuttings.

David Wenny, superintendent-manager of the nursery, said last year the nursery provided 64,000 containerized trees for the public to purchase. It plans to have more and a greater variety of species, available next year.

Conifers available include Douglas fir, blue spruce and grand fir, and the available hardwoods include locust, honey locust, American plum, Russian Olive and Siberian elm.

Next year, the nursery plans to add Norway Spruce and Austrian pine to its offering of windbreak trees and white pine for reforestation.

Anyone in Idaho needing seedlings for purposes of reforestation, windbreak plantings, Christmas tree farming and energy farming may order the seedlings through their county extension office or from the UI College of Forestry.

The seedlings are offered as a public service to all residents of the state in Idaho. They are shipped directly to the purchaser via UPS. Orders are accepted for from 100 to 5,000 trees.

The seedlings are in small containers and average about six inches tall.

Wenny said hybrid poplar and golden willow were excellent trees for energy farming and short rotation firewood.

"Hybrid poplar can be five to seven inches in diameter in just five years. When harvested, it will re-sprout without having to be replanted," he said.

Kilpatrick said hybrid poplar "will produce more BTUS per acre per year than other traditional firewood species such as Douglas fir and larch and even more than oak and walnut."

However, poplar burns fast and isn't a good wood for holding an all night fire, he noted.

SPECIAL ELK HUNT SET FOR PORTION OF UNIT 11A

Lewiston—Idaho Elk hunters who are unsuccessful during the fall season may get a second chance at bagging an elk if their names are drawn for a special series of hunts set to start November 19 in a portion of Big Game Management Unit 11A. The 7-day, either-sex elk hunts, intended to thin a large herd that has been damaging farm crops in the area, will run consecutively, with 20 hunters selected each week from a list of 500 applicants. The weekly hunts will continue until approximately 150 elk have been harvested, possibly through March 2, 1984.

Only Idaho residents who have current Idaho hunting licenses and have not harvested elk this year may apply for the special elk hunts. To be considered in the drawing scheduled for November 9, hunters must submit a three-by-five card to the Department of Fish and Game office 1540 Warner Avenue in Lewiston by November 7 with the following information: name, address, phone number (home and work), hunting license number and signature. No fee is required at the time of the application.

Following the drawing a list of 500 names will be established in the order drawn. The Department will then begin calling applicants, working from the top of the list until 20 have been contacted who want to participate in a hunt. A hunter in this group must present his current Idaho hunting license and unused 1983 elk tag to the Lewiston or Coeur d'Alene Fish and Game office or the Boise headquarters office to purchase a special, elk depredation controlled hunt permit. The permit fee is \$5.50.

Hunt 211A-1, first in the series, will run from November 19 through November 25; then a few days prior to the close of this hunt, a second group of 20 hunters will be contacted to make up hunt 211A-2, set to run November 26 through December 3. A total of 15 one-week elk hunts is scheduled to occur in this manner. However, hunters drawn in the initial group of 500 are not assured an opportunity to take part in a hunt. To prevent over harvest of the herd, the Department may cancel remaining hunts prior to the close of the controlled hunt period whenever it determines that the crop-damage problem has been alleviated.

Applicants who are drawn for hunts scheduled in 1984 must purchase 1984 hunting licenses and elk tags to participate. Note: Idaho law states that no persons may harvest more than one elk during any
