

AMERICAN FALLS FISH HATCHERY GETS \$1 MILLION FACELIFT

American Falls fish hatchery, sporting a million-dollar facelift, is back in production and it will be pro-vding "catchable" rainbow trout for Idaho waters next spring, according to Evan Parrish, Department of Fish and Game.

Phase one in the renovation of the 50-year-old facility will support annual production of as many as 150,-

pins and awards they have carned with all of their hard work in the past year. Several skits will be presented and refreshments will be served.

1000 pounds of rainbow, or about 3 fish to the pound, the state hatcheries supervisor said. A catchable-size rainbow starts out at an average nine inches in length when stocked.

This adds 35,000-40,000 pounds of capacity and makes American Falls the department's third largest prothe department's third largest pro-ducer of the resident species," Par-rish added. Other major rainbow hatcheries are at Hagerman, Hayspur and Nampa.

FELINE DISTEMPER

The most prevalent disease in cats and the number one cause of feline deaths is distemper, also commonly called cat plague and cat Feline distemper is caused fever. by a virus. This virus is very resistant and can survive for long periods of time outside the cat's body. Most areas where cats are raised are seeded with the virus.


to the virus, including lions and ti-gers. Dogs are not susceptible to feline distemper. Younger animals tend to be more severely affected by the disease. If a susceptible queen contracts the disease while pregnant, her kittens may become infected by breathing or eating the

ied. Some animals may become infected and show no outward signs of the disease, while in other animals sudden death may occur. In cats that are severely affected a sudden fever along with depression and dehydration is common. Vomiting and dlarrhea may also occur. Untreated cats will usuaily die or recover within a week's time. Cats that do not recover may shed the virus in urine and feces for 3 to 6 months after recovery.
