Animal Topics H. R. McKelvey, DVMI Happy Thanksgiving. This is the season when turkeys abound, gluttony prevails, and some pets become ill from overindulgence just like their owners. A frequently asked question this time of year is "can I feed my dog or cat turkey bones?" The answer is: no you shouldn't be-cause you may harm your pet if you Turkey bones can shatter into sharp shards when they're eaten. These sharp fragments can lacerate the gums, lodge in the throat, or ev-en perforate the digestive tract. These problems seldom occur when pets eat turkey bones, yet the potential for such problems is always there. This type of problems can occur with fowl bones, including chicken, duck, and pheasant. Bones can also become wedged into the back of the mouth or throat if their shape and size permits. This can happen with any bone, such as beef, pork, or poultry. Large round leg bone slices can occasionally become trapped around a pet's lower In addition to bones, Thanksgiving can present other hazards to ing can present other hazards to pets. For instance, adult animals usually cannot digest milk as well as young animals. Large amounts of milk or cream may cause an adult animal to have a digestive up-set that may lead to diarrhea. Un-accustomed sweets may also upset an animal's digestive tract. If treats and sweets are unavoidable treats and sweets are unavoidable, they should be given in very small portions. A sudden change in diet will upset any animal; therefore, a pet's regular diet should not be with to their daily routine and may get upset when that routine suddenly changes. If pets are used to chil-dren daily then extra company might not be as unsettling as it is for a pet that is used to mostly peace, quiet, and the TV set. Each pet reacts differently, but they will all respond if you will stop occasionally to re-assure them with pets and hugs and let them know you're still thinking let them know you're still thinking of them-regardless of the absence portions of sweets and
