ANTI-FREEZE POISONING

Anti-freeze poisoning can affect livestock and pets; however dogs and cats are more commonly affected than other animals. This is due to the fact that pets are more likely to come in contact with drained or spilled antifreeze than are livestock.

Cats are very susceptible to antifreeze poisoning, dogs less so, and a chicken can drink about twice as much as a cat (with the same weight as the chicken) before showing signs of toxicity.

In any animal the mechanism of antifreeze poisoning is the same. Ethylene glycol the major component of common antifreeze coolants, is metabolized in the body and converted to an acid. This acid in turn combines with calcium to form crystals and these crystals lodge in the kidney when the blood is filtered. Kidney blockage and kidney shut-

down will then occur one to three days after an animal ingests ethylene glycol.

Early signs of antifreeze poisoning includes a mild intoxication (staggering, incoordination), occasional vomiting, and depression. Some animals may appear normal again within twelve to fourteen hours only to have a relapse ten to fifteen hours later. The recurrence of signs is more serious and may include vomiting, dehydration, weakness, convulsions and death.

Animals that survive for 2 or 3 days will start showing signs of kidney failure. These animals are often treatable but must be treated over a long period of time. In addition for treatment to be successful, it should be started within 12 hours after ingestion of antifreeze.

Prevention of antifreeze poisoning is simply a matter of not letting animals become exposed to it. If radiators are drained in gravel or antifreeze is spilled, it can be diluted and washed away by using a hose or water bucket. Old antifreeze can be made safe by disposing of it through a drain followed by lots of water. Spills on cement garage floors with out drains should be mopped up.

Christmas Plants Are for Looking, Not for Eating

Moscow—Plants and plant parts commonly used for Christmas decorations have toxic properties, according to Vern McMaster, UI extension associate. He said small children may be poisoned if they eat leaves, nuts or berries that are colorful accent of the holidays.

Decking the halls with wreaths of holly should be done with care, McMaster said. "The red holly berries can cause vomiting and diarrhea if large quantities are eaten. Holly wreaths should be hung well out of the reach of small children," he said.

Mistletoe, another traditional decoration, has foliage and small, white berries that are poisonous. "While kissing under the mistletoe in relatively harmless, people have been poisoned by eating the berries or drinking tea brewed from the berries. The plant should be pinned high, out of reach of curious children," McMaster said.

Poinsettia, a popular foliage plant, also has poisonous properties he said. Christmas wreaths sometimes include horsechestnuts. The brown nuts are poisonous and should not be used for decorations, McMaster said. "When horsechestnuts are mixed with walnuts and filberts, your wreath becomes a roulette wheel of poisonous and edible nuts. This could be dangerous," said Y. C. Bernsotthevics.

In case of poisoning, call your physician immediately, McMaster said. The doctor will want to know the name of the plant. If the name is unknown, a good description will be needed.

"If a physician cannot be contacted, take the victim to the nearest hospital or clinic. Take along the plant for identification," he said.

If poisoning occurs, emergency information is available from the Idaho Emergency Medical Center. The center can provide information on proper therapy and may be able to aid in the identification of the plant. The telephone number for the center is 800.632-8000.

—Plan to eat a better breakfast. If you're not having breakfast, change that habit!

—Cut down on high-calories, high-fat coffee breaks. Limit the amount of caffeine you consume. Reduce your intake of salt.

—Eat more fruits. Substitute low-fat milk for high fat. Consume more breads and cereals and increase the amount of whole-grain foods in your diet.

Because your habits have been developing for years, Swanson does not recommend that you try to change them all at once. "Be realistic! Make changes gradually. If you make one significant dietary and exercise per month, you will painlessly acquire better habits in 1984," Swanson said.

"You'll be rewarding yourself by making these changes. Every day, be sure to remember that you're making an investment in your present and future well being," she said.

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Take New Approach Toward Diet and Exercise for new Year

Moscow—For people who made, but could not keep, 1983 New Year's resolutions regarding diet and exercise, a UI nutritionist suggests a "painless" way to acquire better habits in '84. Marilyn Swanson, food and nutrition specialist for the UI Cooperative Extension Service, believes "making changes should be an interesting challenge rather than a dreaded task."

Swanson calls her new approach to nutrition "newtrition." To try out this approach, you don't need exercise equipment or special dietary foods. It will be helpful to have a notebook. Here, you can record your slow-but-steady progress in controlling your weight and achieving better health.

According to Swanson, the first step is to record carefully all the food you consume during a three-day period. Also write down the amount of exercise you had.

"If you're going to change your current lifestyle habits it's best to

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Teens Seek Alternatives To High-Priced Gift Items

Moscow — Instead of panicking, teenagers who have little or no money to spend on gifts should be planning their Christmas gift projects now, according to Dr. Betty Turner, UI extension family economics specialist.

"Most teenagers are able to dream up and produce creative, inexpensive alternatives to highpriced gift items. Many are already working on projects. Those who haven't started yet should make some realistic decisions. What are you going to do? When will you start and when will you finish? Get organized and set some deadlines," Turner said. Careful management of time is essential for persons who make their own gifts she said. "Anyone is more comfortable working with a detailed plan. Make a time management chart showing when you intend to work on your project. Then you can see immediately if your idea will work or not," Turner said.

With a relatively small investment in time and materials, teenagers can produce home-baked cakes and cookies that will be popular gifts, she pointed out. Woodworking and knitting projects also provide excellent gifts, she said. Teens can pledge their future services as gifts the extension specialist said. The promise to babysit at the convenience of the gift recipient, is a much-appreciated gift, Turner said. She also mentioned weekly visits and companionship with old people, snow shoveling, repair of electrical appliances, chauffeuring and running errands as examples of the services that might be pledged. "Family and friends will appreciate your gift of your talents and skills. Make clear how many hours of your time you are pledging. You could write your promise on an attractive handmade card," she said.

Futures Market For White Wheat may Open in Spring

Moscow — White wheat producers will have an opportunity to engage in hedging if a futures market for their wheat is established next spring. Neil Meyer extension economist for the UI College of Agriculture said the Minneapolis Grain Exchange has asked the Commodity Futures Trading Commission to approve a proposed white wheat futures contract.

"The marketing options of white wheat producers will be increased if this contract is approved. Producers will again gain the right to hedge—to buy or sell white wheat futures as a protection against price shifts," Meyer said.

Trading in white wheat futures could begin as early as April 1, 1984. In the proposed contract, shipping certificates are included as a delivery mechanism. A shipping certificate is an agreement to load grain within a specified time period.

In an earlier proposal, the Minneapolis Grain Exchange designated warehouse receipts as the delivery mechanism. Because government officials expressed concern regarding the amount of delivery space for white wheat in Pacific Northwest warehouses, the grain exchange modified its proposal.

"Use of shopping certificates is expected to give warehousemen of the Pacific Northwest more flexibility when participating in delivery of white wheat," Meyer said.
