## The deregulation story.

# Why your phone company is changing.



There's been a news lately about phone deregula-

tion and how it's going to change the telephone industry. A lot of what you've read or heard may seem confusing or even contradictory.

Most of the changes caused by the Federal Communications Commission rulings on deregulation will probably go unnoticed by most customers -at least in the immediate future.

We will continue to provide all the usual services—local

calls, telephone directories, long distance, etc. - all with little or:no change. You will still be able to rent your phones. But you will also be able to buy them.

#### More choices

Whether you rent or buy your phones, the price you pay will no longer be determined by regulatory commissions. The charges will be determined by the seller in open competition in the marketplace. There will be some changes coming in the way we charge for repairs, too.

You will also have the choice of setting up your own house wiring and plugging in your phones where you want them. Or you can pay to have the installation work done.

#### Pricing and subsidies

There will be some changes in your phone bill as costs for services are more realistically priced. Subsidies from long distance revenues will no longer be used to cover underpriced local service. So local rates can be expected to rise

somewhat, while long-distance rates go down. In addition, inflation and the cost of new technology will also cause

some increases. But with all the changes taking place the important thing to remember is this: We'll still be the people who keep you talking-your phone company. And that's one thing that's not




