Zero Temps, Snow, Power Outages Chill the Area

This area shivered under the first real blast of winter Monday and Tuesday as an unexpected cold air mass moved down from Canada Monday afternoon and skid down to well below zero mark in Genesee and the higher elevations Monday night.

Even valley residents felt the bitter cold with unofficial reading of from 8 to 10 above Monday night and early Tuesday morning. Without the warming effect of cloud cover, the temperature didn't rise out to the teens Tuesday and by late Tuesday evening was hovering at slightly above zero in Kendrick.

A snow fall of 4 to 5 inches fell in the early hours Sunday morning and continued intermittently during the day. As the temperatures dropped the snow didn't melt and packed solid on the streets and highways making travel hazardous.

Just to add to the discomfort, the third power outage in less than a week plagued the usually dependable power service in the valley Monday morning, blacking out Kendrick from 7:20 a. m. to just after 8:00 a. m. The power went off last Wednesday afternoon for about an hour and twenty minutes.

Area weather forecasters were predicting another severe snow storm later this week unless a frontal system headed this direction changes course. All of this means that folks in this area won't have to dream of a "White Christmas" — they're going to get the real thing!

Kendrick Falls To Deary 58-34

Foul trouble and unconfident playing by Kendrick and good defense by Deary gave the Mustangs a 58-34 win over the Tigers Saturday night, said Kendrick Coach Brent Monroe.

Kendrick had 26 personal fouls, as well as 2 technical fouls, on an intentional foul call against the Tigers. Deary was able to shoot 41 foul shots, allowing them to take control of the game. Kendrick helped by shooting only 25 percent from the floor and missing some easy shots.

Early in the 3rd quarter, K. H. S. was able to take the lead, but starting guards Troy Hewett and Mark Harris fouled out and the Mustangs took control. Deary had 25 points in a wild 3rd quarter that left them 20 points ahead.

Kendrick was led by Slade Zumhove with 11 points and Mark Harris with 8, but it was not enough as the Tigers fell to 4-2 on the season and 2-2 in league. Deary, led by Derek Jones' 16 points, remains undefeated. The Kendrick JV were able to up their record to 3-1 with a 77-50 win in the first game by Brian Parks with 18 points.

Edd Kent, 94, Retired Monday Accident on School House Hill Am. Ridge Farmer, Seriously Injures Kendrick Man Dies December 19

Edd Kent, an American Ridge resident and farmer for 85 years, died of causes incident to aging Monday, December 19, at Paradise Villa Nursing Home at Moscow. He was 94.



Edd was born August 9, 1889 at Nova Scotia. He moved to Kendrick at age 9 and was raised by his step-father, William Cox, on American Ridge. He farmed there most of his life, retiring in 1963.

On October 5, 1910, he married Emma Morgan at Moscow. She died June 5, 1980.

He was a member of the Elks Lodge, Kendrick Grange No. 413, and enjoyed fishing and playing cards.

Survivors include two daughters, Kathryn Morey and Flo Lyons, both of Kendrick; two sons, Roy of Boise and George of Baldwin Park, Calif.; two sisters, Agnes Telford of Tulare, Calif., and Margaret McDougall of Coeur d'Alene; three brothers, Carroll Cox of Grangeville, Andrew Cox of Kendrick, and Willard Cox of Lewiston; nine grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren and four, great-great-grandchildren. Two brothers, a sister, and a grandchild preceded him in death.

The funeral was held at 11 a. m. Wednesday at Short's Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Ron Palmer officiating. Burial was at the American Ridge Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials be given to the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Fund.

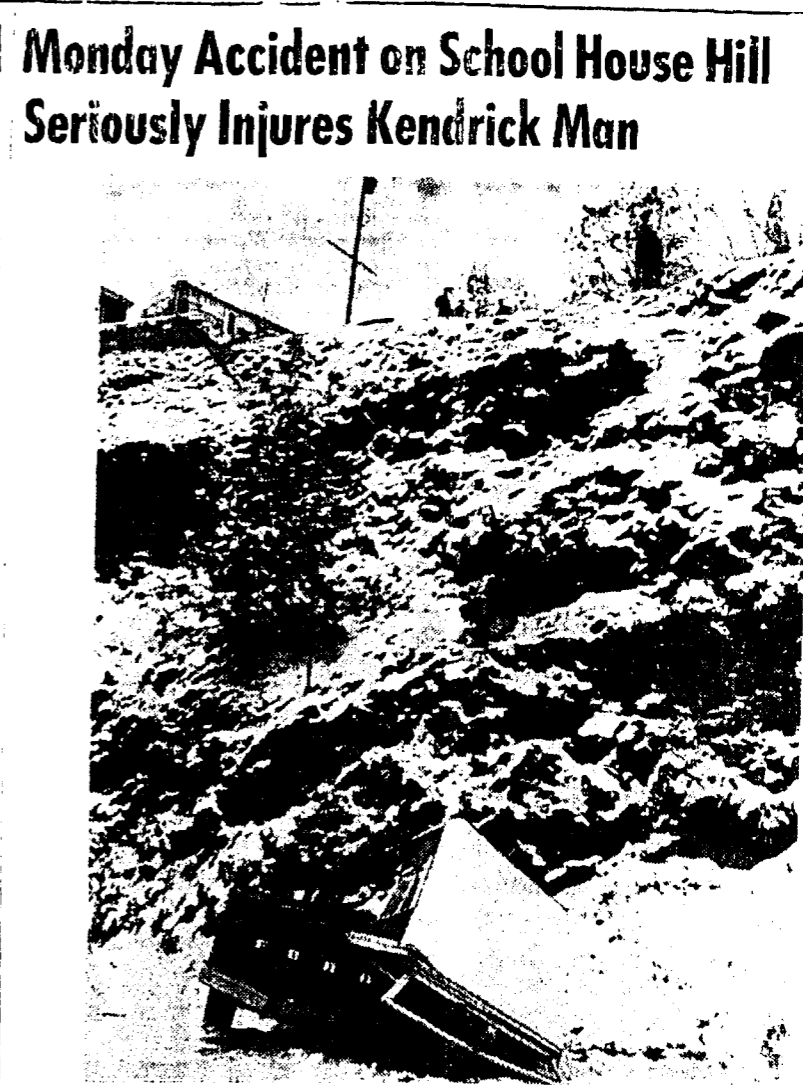

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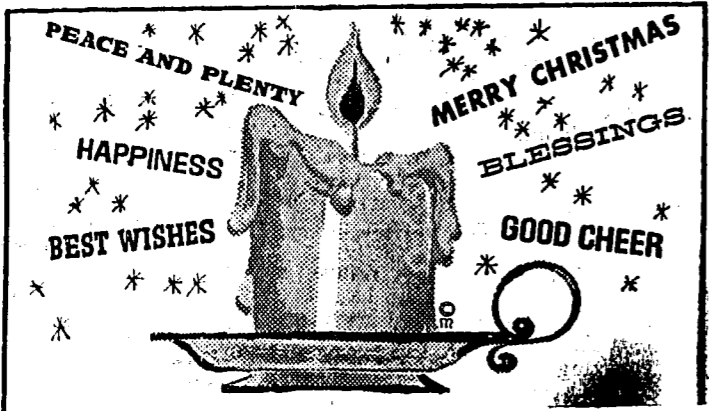

Spring Steelhead Fishing to Open New Year's Day

Spring steelhead fishing opens in Idaho January 1 with regulations designed to provide maximum harvest of a strong run of hatchery-produced fish, particularly along the main Salmon River.

The Fish and Game Commission in approving spring season regulations (December 3) authorized a series of staggered closing dates for the Salmon plus some segments of the Clearwater River.

"If the upstream run is on schedule, anglers can take advantage of an abundant supply of hatchery steelhead before the more limited numbers of wild fish move through" said Herb Pollard Department of Fish & Game.

Management strategy emphasizes protection of the wild steelhead which are hardest hit by mortality at dams along the Columbia and Snake Rivers, the anomalous fishery coordination explained.

The 1983-84 upstream run includes releases of 4.7 million hatchery smolt in 1981 and 4.6 million a year later and the count of 80,000 steelhead at Lower Granite Dam in mid-November indicates excellent survival, Pollard said. He projects a Lower Granite count in the range of 85,000 when the "steelhead year" ends May 31.

Regulations have been amended to include a stretch of the Snake River between Hells canyon and Oxbow Dams and provide more opportunity to catch hatchery steelhead. About 150 fish surplus to hatchery needs were released above Hells Canyon in early December and continuation of the stocking program in that area is a "strong possibility," Pollard said.

Here is a lineup of dates and limits for the Salmon, Snake and Clearwater.

Salmon River—From its mouth up to Mackay Bar pack bridge: January 1—March 15 with limits of 2 daily, 4 in possession and 10 for the season. From Mackay Bar pack bridge up to Long Tom Creek: January 1—April 1, with limits of 2, 4 and 10.

From Long Tom Creek to 400 yds. below the mouth of the Pahsimeroi: January 1—April 15, with 3, 6 and 10 limits. From 100 yards above the mouth of the Pahsimeroi to Basin Creek: January 1—April 30, with 2, 4 and 10 limits. Wild fish, those with dorsal fins higher than 2 1/2 inches, must be released and barbless hooks are required on the Salmon.

Snake River—From the Washington State line at the confluence of the Snake and Clearwater up to Wild Sheep Rapids: January 1—April 30, and the limits are 2, 4 and 10. Barb-

less hooks are required and wild fish must be released between Redbird Creek and Wild Sheep Rapids. Boats are not allowed for 150 yards below Hells Canyon Dam.

Clearwater River—From the posted boundary at the confluence with the Snake up to Clearwater River Bridge: January 1—April 30 and the limits are 2, 4 and 10.

From the Clearwater River Bridge at Orofino up to a posted line at the mouth of the South Fork Clearwater: January 1—April 15, with limits of 1, 1 and 3. Fishing from rafts or boats with motors is prohibited.

North Fork Clearwater—From the mouth up to 100 yards below Dworshak Dam: January 1—April 15 with limits 1 and 3.

Pollard reminded anglers that 1984 fishing licenses, steelhead permits and tags are needed after December 31. Tags must be properly validated and a catch must be recorded on the permit.

The deregulation story.

Why your phone company is changing.



There's been a lot in the news lately about telephone deregulation and how it's going to change the telephone industry. A lot of what you've read or heard may seem confusing or even contradictory. We'd like to clear up some of this confusion and tell you how deregulation is going to affect your phone service and your phone bill.

Most changes unnoticeable
Most of the changes caused by the Federal Communications Commission rulings on deregulation will probably go unnoticed by most customers—at least in the immediate future. We will continue to provide all the usual services—local

calls, telephone directories, long distance, etc.—all with little or no change. You will still be able to rent your phones. But you will also be able to buy them.

More choices

Whether you rent or buy your phones, the price you pay will no longer be determined by regulatory commissions. The charges will be determined by the seller in open competition in the marketplace. There will be some changes coming in the way we charge for repairs, too.

You will also have the choice of setting up your own house wiring and plugging in your phones where you want them. Or you can pay to have the installation work done.

Pricing and subsidies

There will be some changes in your phone bill as costs for services are more realistically priced. Subsidies from long distance revenues will no longer be used to cover under-priced local service. So local rates can be expected to rise

somewhat, while long-distance rates go down. In addition, inflation and the cost of new technology will also cause some increases.

But with all the changes taking place the important thing to remember is this: We'll still be the people who keep you talking—your phone company. And that's one thing that's not going to change.

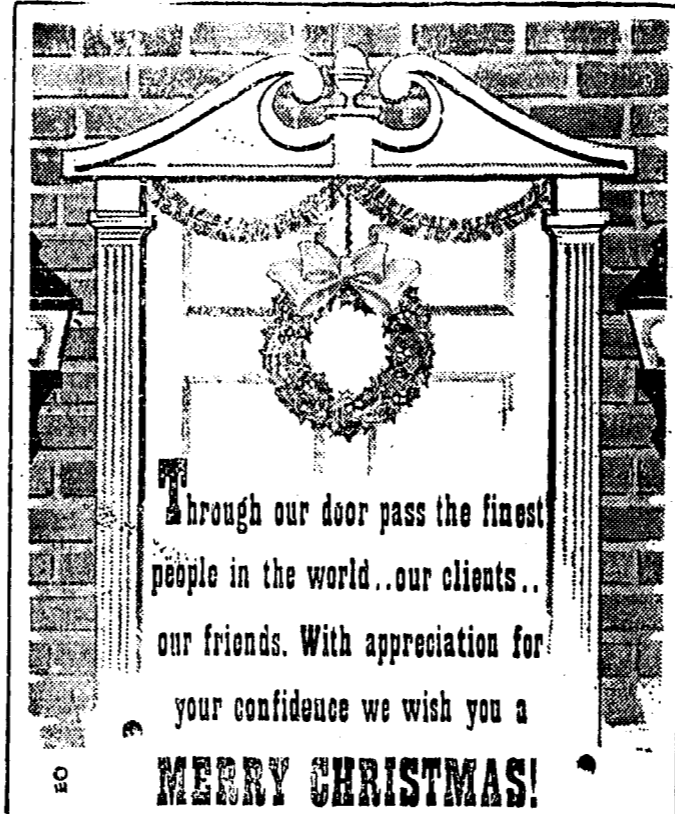

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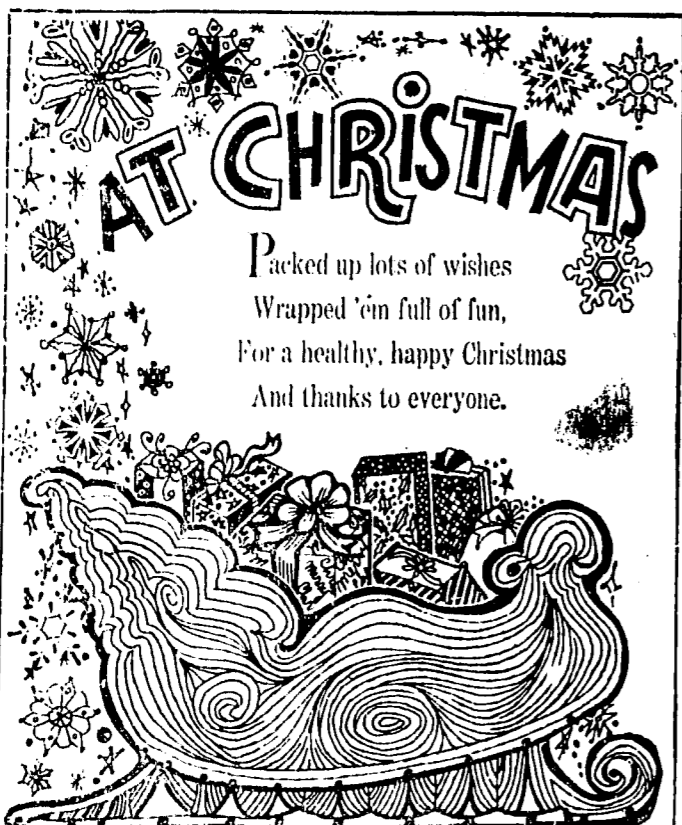

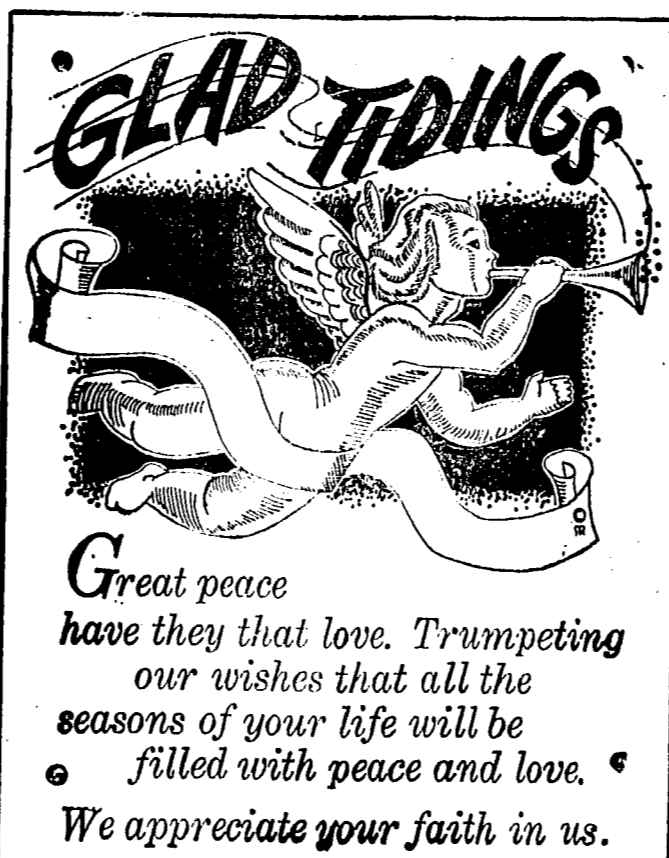
