



New Labels Explain Care of Clothing

the first of the year and will appear inside dresses, skirts, shirts and other garments, Porter said. Labels have been changed in order to cover all aspects of fabric care, she said. "The Federal Trade Commission has developed clearer guidelines for fabric care all aspects of the part of the part

has developed clearer guidelines for fabric care labeling. In the past, consumers sometimes were given information that was incomplete or incorrect," Porter said.

The new labels provide detailed information about washing, drylng, drycleaning, ironing and bleaching. Washing instructions must specify machine or bond tree in the second statement of the second statem

machine or hand wash. If an item cannot be washed in hot water, the correct water temperature must be listed.

Porter said the following points lines: are covered in the new FIC guidelines:

-Care labels must be attached in such a way that you can easily see them before you buy clothing or fabrics.

Drying instructions must state whether the product should be dried by machine or by some other method. If an item cannot be dried at high temperatures, a recommended drying temperature must be stated. -If ironing is needed to preserve the appearance of the item, the label must say so. The label must carry a warning if ironing would harm the fabric. For items that should be ironed at a temperature less than the hottest setting of the iron, the label should specify a temperature restriction. perature setting.

-The label need not mention blea-

ching if all bleaches can be safely used. When necessary, labels should say "no bleach" or "only ono-chlorine bleach."

-For items that should be drycleaned, specific instructions must be noted if all solvents cannot be

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
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
