Kendrick's gym was filled to capacity for last Saturday's thriller between the KHS Tigers and the Deary Mustangs. Nearly 600 fans came to see the game between these two White Pine League rivals—and they got their money's worth as Deary escaped from Kendrick with a 54-18 win.

The Tigers, behind by 9 points at the half, came out swinging in the third quarter, finally fighting to within 2 points with less than 3 minutes remaining in the game. Kendrick hung tough, but then Deary went into a stall and score on a field goal. Kendrick gamely fought back, but the Mustangs put it away on 2 last-minute layup shots.

Randy Cannon led Deary with 18 points, but the night's high scorer was Kendrick's Jack Meyer, who was 10 of 16 from the field and who hit 3 of 4 free throws for 23 points. Deary is now undefeated in league play with 12 wins, and are 12-1 on the season, while Kendrick drops to 4-4 and 7-6.

The Kendrick JVs won the first game of the evening, dropping the Deary JVs 60-47. Robert Blair led the Kendrick attack with 14 points while Dallas Vallem added 10.

Tigers Bomb Indians

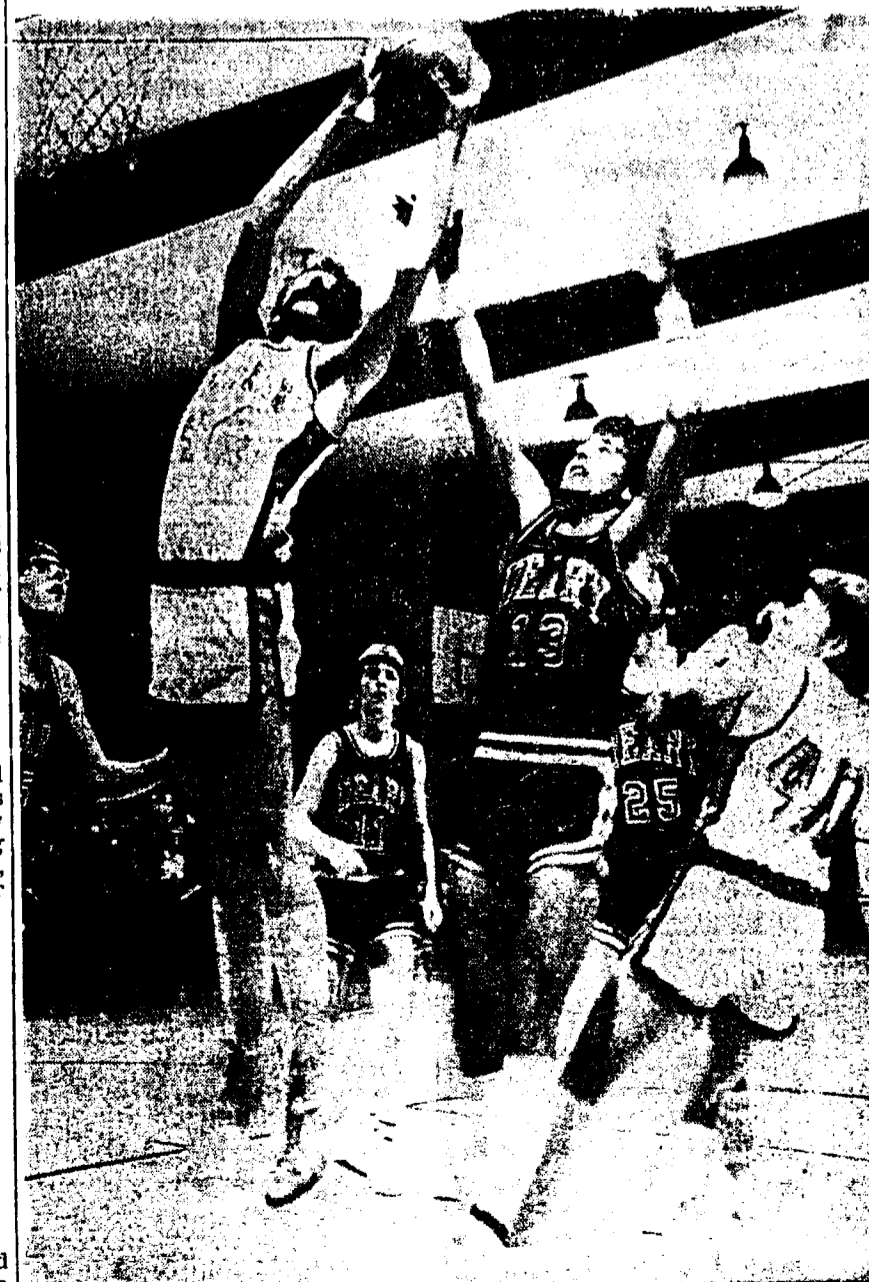

Keeping Highways Open
 While Idaho can't match the record 76 inches of snow that fell in 24 hours at Silver Lake, Colo. in 1921 the beginning of winter, 1983 saw heavy snow, slush, ice, drizzle and drifting snow on many sections of the 5,000-mile state highway system.
 The winter weather also saw the 680-man Idaho Division of Highways maintenance forces out on the road with the battery of snow plows, sanders and other heavy equipment keeping the highways open for travelers.
 Before most people arise in the morning, the maintenance crews will have checked out, fueled and warmed up their equipment ready to head out of 74 maintenance stations located throughout Idaho in large and small towns including out-of-the-way places like Wayan, Carey, Riddle, Bovill, Clark Fork and Leadore.
 Under the general supervision of six Maintenance Superintendent/Engineers located at the Division of Highways District offices at Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston, Boise, Shoshone, Pocatello and Rigby, planning is constantly underway so that snow removal equipment can be assigned to snow areas on the basis of need. In areas of light snowfall, trucks equipped with push plows are usually sufficient while the powerful rotary plows are used in mountainous terrain.
 * In snowmobiling and other winter recreation areas, do not park on the highway right-of-way. Vehicles parked on the right-of-way not only create a serious traffic hazard, but interfere with snow plowing operations which are necessary to keep the road open.
 * In case of a night-time storm, when the highways tend to get slick, going to work earlier in the morning can help you avoid the heavier traffic.

If the roads get icy, slow down and maintain plenty of room between you and the vehicle ahead in case you have to come to a sudden stop.
 Above all, make sure your vehicle is in good winter travel condition. If you are in mountainous areas, tire chains should be carried along with warm blankets and other emergency supplies in the event your vehicle becomes stuck in the snow.
 * And, if you are planning a trip, check on road conditions by calling the Division of Highways District office at Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston, Boise, Shoshone, Pocatello or Rigby.
A Well-Planned Effort
 During a storm on major routes, snow removal operations are carried on continuously until the road is cleared and as necessary to keep traffic moving. Snow removal is limited only to the highway right-of-way and maintenance forces are not allowed to remove snow from approaches leading from the traveled way to private property, either from individuals or commercial enterprises but will handle their operating so as to cause the least inconvenience to the various property owners.
 State personnel will also be of assistance to local authorities in helping to open public road connections to the state highway system—time and manpower permitting.
The Public Can Be Helpful
 While keeping most Idaho highways open and relatively safe during the winter months is a major responsibility requiring considerable logistics, there are several safety measures where the public can be part of the "team" effort.
 * When approaching maintenance vehicles, slow down and give them plenty of room. Blowing snow from plows and rotaries can hamper vision of the equipment operator and there is a good chance he may not be able to see your vehicle.
 * Pass snow removal equipment only when there is sufficient visibility and space to pass.

Coour d'Alene Couple Named conservationists
 Scott and Mary Lou Reed of Coour d'Alene have been named "Conservationists 1983" by Idaho Wildlife magazine.
 "Each has worked for more than 30 years on many conservation fronts and together they have influenced public policy touching almost every Idaho resource," said Pat Ford, executive director of the Idaho Conservation League.
 Ford's comments were included in the article by editor Diane Ronayne in the November-December issue of the Department of Fish and Game publication.

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How Single Parents Can Cut Their Tax Bill

Like so many of the 6.5 million single parents in America, Maria longs for these precious few moments at night when she can relax. At 7 a. m. Maria drops off her son at her mother's house and leaves for the hospital where she works as a

nurse's aide. Then, at 5 p. m., three times a week, she drives 20 miles to a restaurant where she works as a waitress. Maria works two jobs because she needs the extra money to get by. After all, taxes take such a big slice from her income.

But single parents like Maria might be able to strike a better deal with the tax collector than they

realize, says the Idaho Society of CPAs. They should take advantage of the child care tax credit and some often overlooked deductions. In addition, they need to understand how alimony, child custody agreements and child support payments can bring the best possible tax advantages.

For instance, Maria is eligible for a tax credit because she pays her mother to watch her son. In addition, she can cut her tax bill by deduct-

ing the costs of traveling from her job at the hospital to her job at the restaurant. She can get another deduction for buying and cleaning her uniforms for both jobs.

Take a look at how the child care tax credit works. If you must pay someone to care for your child or any other dependents while you are at work, you can reduce your tax bill by the amount of the credit. The credit works on a sliding scale based on your adjusted gross income. For

a parents with two children and an adjusted gross income of \$10,000 or less, the credit could rise to \$1,440.

Expenses that qualify for the credit include baby sitters, housekeepers or a nurse who care for a dependent unable to care for him or herself. The cost of a day care center qualifies and so might a summer camp. You can even include the costs of paying a relative to care for your child as long as the relative is not also your dependent, as in Maria's case.

Divorced people who pay or collect alimony or child support should be sure they are getting the best tax break they can. Alimony payments are taxable as income to the person receiving them and deductible by the person paying them. Child support is neither taxable nor deductible.

Single parents with less than \$10,000 may also benefit from the earned income tax credit. If your income is below \$6,000, you can receive the maximum credit of \$500. On incomes above \$6,000, the credit is reduced by 12.5 percent for the excess over \$6,000.

Another tax saving idea for some one who works two jobs is to deduct the unreimbursed business costs. For instance, Maria can deduct \$644 the cost of commuting 20 miles from her first job to her second job three times a week. This is based on a rate of 20.5 cents per mile. She can also deduct \$200, the cost of buying and cleaning her uniforms for work. If Maria's taxable income before these adjustments was \$11,500, the added deductions would reduce it to 10,660 and cut \$153 from her final tax bill.

Most single parents are divorced or separated, and one of the trickiest questions for them frequently is which spouse claims the exemption on their children.

Generally, the exemption goes to the custodial parents, CPAs say. But there are exceptions. The non-custodial parent gets the \$1,000 exemption if it's provided for in a divorce decree or separation agreement if he or she provides at least \$600 a year in support. The other instance in which the non-custodial parent claims the exemption is when he or she contributes at least \$1,200 a year for support of the child and the custodial parents doesn't

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
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Animal Topics

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FIRST AID IN ANIMALS

First aid in animals can be remarkably similar to first aid in humans. In fact, a good quality first aid kit can be readily used to treat many emergencies in pets and livestock. Many first aid kits come with abbreviated instructions on how to use

the contents properly and these instructions are often applicable to animals. One should however, be very cautious about giving oral medications to animals. Cats, for example, cannot tolerate aspirin very well and should not be given any. The ammonia inhalants commonly found in first aid kits are also best not used on an animal. A comatose animal should not be awakened suddenly with a harsh inhalant and fainting is quite rare in animals. Always approach an injured animal with caution, even if it's one of your own. Accident victims are usually in pain, are confused and

don't know your intentions. Even normally calm and easily handled animals may bite, kick, or scratch under these circumstances. When approaching an injured animal use a soothing voice, move slowly, and try to remain in the animal's view.

The main points of first aid can be remembered by a simple short saying, "It was shocking; Bobby Big Bruce Badly." This help one to remember the tenets of first aid: Breathing, Bleeding, Broken bones, Burns, and shock.

Breathing is the foremost thing to check for. If an animal is not breathing then all other forms of aid will be for naught. Often an animal will breath slowly and deeply and may appear momentarily as not breathing. Checking the gums and tongue for a deep pink color as an indication the animal is getting adequate oxygen. Purplish gums indicate a lack of oxygen and pale gums may be indicative of bleeding or shock.

Bleeding may be external or internal. An animal that is bleeding internally may show few signs until it goes into shock from lack of blood. External bleeding can usually be controlled with the use of firm pressure directly over the bleeding site. Pressure can be applied with gauze pads or clean cloths. Bandage compresses found in first aid kits are excellent pressure dressings. Some animals can break bones and
