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
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#### 'Tillikum' Strawberry Stars in Home Gardens

Clifton Anderson Associate Agricultural Editor

Moscow-A. new everbearing strawberry has been developed for home gardeners of the Pacific Northwest. Named "Tillikum", the new variety is intended to be a replacement for the "Quinault" everbearing straw-

Release of the new variety was announced jointly by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the agricultural experiment stations of Washington State University, the University of Idaho and Oregon State University. Tillikum was de-veloped at the Western Washington Research and Extension Center in Puyallup, Washington.

Tillikum has produced twice the yield of Quinault in three years of trials at Puyallup. Because the fruit tends to ripen off the ground on long arching peduncles, Tillikum berries are easy to pick and less subject to rot in wet weather.

During the spring, Tillikum produces a mediante ground form.

duces a moderate crop of small to medium size fruit. An abundant summer crop of medium size fruit is produced from late July into October.

At present, Tillikum is recommended for planting west of the Cascades and is suggested for trial in Idaho, eastern Washington and eastern tern Oregon. Its winter hardiness is unknown, but important data will be available following the present winter. The two previous winters were mild and did not provide an adequate test of hardiness.

Tillikum means "friend" in the language of the Chinook. The new berry is not large enough for commercial plantings, but it appears to be well suited for home gardens.
Plants will be propagated and offered for sale by producers of virusfree certified strawberry plants. The parents of Tillikum are "To-tem," a leading commercial June-
