

Frank P. Souders, a retired mining superintendent from Long Beach, Wa., who has relatives in Kendrick, Wa., who has relatives in Kendrick, died Thursday of a heart attack. ### **Bodies of 2 Young** Women Discovered Near Kendrick

The badly decomposed bodies of two young women were discovered on the lower portion of Bear Ridge Grade near State Highway 3 Monday afternoon approximately 1 mile east of Kendrick. As of Tuesday evening there was still no clue as to the identity of the two bodies, or how

they came to be there. The bodies were discovered Mon-day afternoon by a Kendrick juven-ile who was in the area with some friends. The bodies were approximately fifty feet from the highway. Grass and small bushes were in the area. The young man returned to Kendrick and notified Don Bateman, the Kendrick City Supervisor, who in turn notified the Latah County Sheriff's office. The Sheriff's office responded to the call immediately and has been investigating since that time.

After the initial investigation by the Sheriff's office, the bodies were removed from the scene and taken to Short's Funeral Chapel in Mos-cow. Talking to the Gazette Tues-day morning, Latah County Sheriff Laune Odenborg said, "it's going to take a lot of forensics before we know what happened." Until the remains of the bodies are examined by medical authorities, it will be dif-foult to some close to artimetime the ficult to come close to estimating the time of death, or the cause. Sheriff Odenborg said, "possibly last sum-mer", when asked to give a rough estimate on the time of death. The determination as to the approximate age and the sex of the two was made on the basis of bone size, and a few particles of clothing that still remained on the bodies. The bodies were very close to each other when they were discovered, the Sheriff

said. The bodies will now undergo intensive investigation by medical and law enforcement authorities as the Sheriff's office begins the long, complicated process of finding who the young women were, how they met their deaths, and how the bodies found their way to the rocky banks of Bear Ridge grade.






