Frank P. Souders, a retired mining superintendent from Long Beach, Wa., who has relatives in Kendrick, died Thursday of a heart attack.

He is survived by two brothers, Marion and Burton, both of Kendrick and a sister, Ida Greenwood of Juliaetta; a son, Arnold of Lake Oswego, Ore.; 3 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren. Three brothers, George, Marvin and Elmer preceded him in death.

He was born June 9, 1902, at Burke, Idaho, to Frank and Grace Souders. The family moved to the Crescent area in 1905 where he resided until he joined the M. Marines in 1918.

Souders married Lillian Russell at Lewiston on Dec. 5, 1922. She died Oct. 13, 1973.

He worked for some 20 years at Kellogg's Bunker Hill mine as superintendent of refining. From 1949 to 1952, Souders was superintendent for Bradley Antimony Mining Co. at Stibnite, Idaho. He then worked as superintendent of refining at Henderson, Nev., for two years, retiring in 1959 at Hanna Nickel Smelting at Riddle, Ore. Souders lived at Ocean Park, Wa., from 1969 to the present.

A member of the IOOF Samaritan Lodge 129 at Kellogg and past chief patriarch, Souders was living at the Ocean View Convalescent Center at Long Beach, Wa., when he suffered the heart attack.

Bodies of 2 Young Women Discovered Near Kendrick

The badly decomposed bodies of two young women were discovered on the lower portion of Bear Ridge Grade near State Highway 31 Monday afternoon approximately 1 mile east of Kendrick. As of Tuesday evening there was still no clue as to the identity of the two bodies, or how they came to be there.

The bodies were discovered Monday afternoon by a Kendrick juvenile who was in the area with some friends. The bodies were approximately fifty feet from the highway. Grass and small bushes were in the area. The young man returned to Kendrick and notified Don Bateman, the Kendrick City Supervisor, who in turn notified the Latah County Sheriff's office. The Sheriff's office responded to the call immediately and has been investigating since that time.

After the initial investigation by the Sheriff's office, the bodies were removed from the scene and taken to Short's Funeral Chapel in Moscow. Talking to the Gazette Tuesday morning, Latah County Sheriff Laune Odenborg said, "It's going to take a lot of forensics before we know what happened." Until the remains of the bodies are examined by medical authorities, it will be difficult to come close to estimating the time of death, or the cause. Sheriff Odenborg said, "possibly last summer," when asked to give a rough estimate on the time of death. The determination as to the approximate age and the sex of the two was made on the basis of bone size, and a few particles of clothing that still remained on the bodies. The bodies were very close to each other when they were discovered, the Sheriff said.

The bodies will now undergo intensive investigation by medical and law enforcement authorities as the Sheriff's office begins the long, complicated process of finding who the young women were, how they met their deaths, and how the bodies found their way to the rocky banks of Bear Ridge grade.

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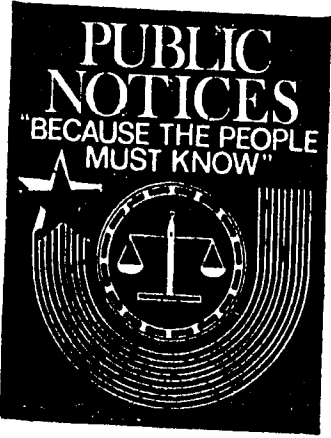
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ORDINANCE NO. 275

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE FIVE, CHAPTER EIGHT, SECTION THREE, OF THE CITY CODE OF GENESEE, IDAHO, BY PROVIDING FOR THE PRO-RATING OF THE LICENSE FOR A LICENSE TO SELL LIQUOR BY THE DRINK AND BY PROVIDING A PROCEDURE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF A LICENSE ON A PRO-RATED BASIS AND AMENDING TITLE FIVE, CHAPTER EIGHT, SECTION FIVE, BY PROVIDING FOR THE TRANSFER OF LICENSES TO SELL LIQUOR BY THE DRINK AND BY PROVIDING A FEE FOR THE TRANSFER OF LICENSES TO SELL LIQUOR BY THE DRINK AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. That Section 5-8-3 of the City Code of Genesee be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

5-8-3. LICENSE FEE: Each license issued under the provisions

of this Code shall pay an annual license fee to the Clerk in the sum of Two Hundred Twenty Five Dollars (\$225.00) per annum.

Provided that any licensee who operates for only a portion of a year may have his license fee prorated from the date he commences operation to the end of the calendar year, but in no event for less than six (6) months.

In the event a licensee who was previously issued a license on a prorated basis under the provisions hereof desires to have such license renewed for the same period for the next succeeding year, he shall file his intention to so apply for such license with the Clerk, accompanied by the fee required for the issuance of such license on or before December 31st of the preceding year. The license fees herein provided for are exclusive and in addition to other fees chargeable by the City.

SECTION 2. That Section 5-8-5 of the City Code of Genesee be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

5-8-5. FORM OF LICENSE - AUTHORITY - EXPIRATION - LIMITATIONS: (1) Every license issued under this Chapter shall set forth the name of the person to whom issued, the location by street and number, or other definite designation, of the premises, and such other information as the Clerk shall deem necessary. If issued to a partnership, the names of the persons constituting such partnership shall be set forth. If issued to a corporation or association, the names of the principal officers and the governing board shall be set forth. Such license shall be signed by the licensee and prominently displayed in the place of business at all times. Every license issued under the provisions of this chapter is separate and distinct and no person except the licensee therein named, except as herein otherwise provided, shall exercise any of the privileges granted thereunder. Every license issued under this Chapter shall constitute a personal privilege subject to being denied, revoked, or cancelled for its abuse. It shall not be alienable or assignable and may be transferred only through the procedures herein described. All licenses shall expire at 1:00 o'clock a. m. on January 1st of the following year and shall be subject to renewal upon proper application. Renewal applicants for liquor by the drink licenses accompanied by the required fee must be filed with the clerk on or before January 1st of the following year, provided, however, any licensee holding a valid license who fails to file an application for renewal of his current license on or before January 1st of the following year shall have a grace period of an additional thirty-one (31) days in which to file an application for renewal of his license and during which time he shall not be permitted to sell or dispense liquor by the drink at retail. No person shall be granted more than one (1) license in any city for any one (1) year; and no partnership, association or corporation holding a license under this act shall have a member, officer, or stockholder any person who has any financial interest of any kind in, or is a member of, another partnership or association or an officer of another corporation holding a license in the same city for the same year; provided that this section shall not prevent any person, firm or corporation, owning two (2) or more buildings on connected property in a city from making application for and receiving licenses permitting the sale of liquor by the drink in such building.

Upon receipt of such an application, the City Council shall make the same determinations with respect to the transferee as are required under this Chapter and if the City Council shall determine that all of the conditions required of a licensee under this Chapter have been met by the proposed transferee by said license shall be endorsed over to the proposed transferee by said licensee for the remainder of the period for which such license has been issued and the Clerk shall note approval of the Council thereon upon such license.

(a) The transfer of a license between husband and wife in the event of a property division; or
 (b) The transfer of a license to a receiver, trustee in bankruptcy or similar person or officer; or
 (c) The transfer of a license to the heirs or personal representative of the estate in the event of the death of the licensee; or
 (d) The transfer of a license arising out of the dissolution of a partnership where the license is transferred to one or more of the partners; or
 (e) The transfer of a license within a family whether an individual, partnership or corporation.

(4) The controlling interest in the stock ownership of a corporate licensee shall not be, directly or indirectly, sold, transferred, or hypothecated unless the licensee be a corporation, the stock of which is listed on a stock exchange in Idaho, or in the city of New York, state of New York, or which is required by law to file periodic reports with the securities and exchange commission. Provided however, that in the event of the transfer of more than twenty-five percent (25%) of the authorized and issued stock of the corporation, it shall create a rebuttable presumption that such transfer constitutes a transfer of the controlling interest in such corporation.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE: This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law of the State of Idaho.

ORDINANCE NO. 276

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER TWO, SECTION TWO, OF THE CITY CODE OF GENESEE, IDAHO, BY CHANGING THE DEFINITION OF HOME OCCUPATION AND AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER TWO, SECTION THREE BY CHANGING THE CONDITIONS WHICH A HOME OCCUPATION MUST MEET IN ORDER TO CONSTITUTE A PERMITTED ACCESSORY USE IN THE RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT (R) AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. That Section 10-2-2 of the City Code of Genesee be, and the same hereby is, amended to read immediately following the definition of Gross Flood Area (GFA) as follows:

10-2-2. HOME OCCUPATION: Any use of a dwelling, conducted solely by a member or members of the household residing therein, which is incidental or subordinate to the main use of the building for dwelling purposes; which utilizes not more than twenty five percent (25%) of the floor space of the dwelling, which does not generate vehicular parking or nonresidential traffic to an extent significantly greater than would normally result from residential occupancy; and which does not produce

or constitute objectionable or harmful substances or conditions, or other nuisances.

SECTION 2. That Section 10-5-3 of the City Code of Genesee be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

10-5-3. HOME OCCUPATIONS: A home occupation shall be allowed as a permitted accessory use provided the following conditions are met:

- (a) such use must be carried on by the inhabitants living there and no others;
- (b) such use must be clearly incidental and secondary to the use of the dwelling for dwelling purposes and must not change the residential character thereof;
- (c) the total area used for such purposes may not exceed twenty five percent (25%) of the floor area of the user's dwelling unit;
- (d) there shall be no permanent and substantial change in the outside appearance of the building or premises other than accessory buildings which comply with the provisions of Section 10-5-4;
- (e) No equipment or process shall be used in such home occupation which creates any glare, fumes, odors or other objectionable conditions (see definitions) detectable to the normal senses of the lot.
- (f) the traffic generated by such home occupation shall not be significantly greater in volume than would be normally be expected in a residential neighborhood.
- (g) under no circumstances shall any of the following be considered a home occupation: antique shop, barber shop, beauty parlor, wig-styling clinic, mortuary, nursing home, restaurant, veterinarians' clinic or dancing studio.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE: This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law of the State of Idaho.

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
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
