Federal Income Tax Must Have Proper Postage

Taxpayers have an extra day to file their income tax returns this year because the traditional deadline—April 15th—falls on Sunday, Postmasters, Leslie Wilson, Genesee; Don Chrystal, Kendrick, and Betty Helmgartner Juliaetta said, the Postal Service has been notified that the Internal Revenue Service, in compliance with its regulations, will not pay postage due costs for federal income tax returns mailed without postage or bearing insufficient postage. Such mail will be returned to sender.

Tick Season Begins

animals in the lower elevations; a sure harbinger of Spring. There are many kinds of ticks, including wood ticks, moose ticks (that will attach to horses), and even ear ticks. The most common ticks in this area is the wood tick.

Ticks can be classified by the number of hosts they feed on. There are one host, two host, and three host ticks. The common wood tick is a three host tick and feeds on a different host during each stage of its development from larva to nymph to adult. It is interesting to note that larva and nymph stages themselves to small animals such as mice or squirrels and the adult stage attaches to larger animals such as dogs, deer, and man. This is called "gee-whiz" information. It isn't particularly important to know, but whenever you hear it you say "Gee-whiz!"

Unfed wood ticks can live about three years. (Gee-whiz) Female ticks require a blood meal before they can lay their eggs, which they lay after dropping off the host. An engorged female tick is usually surrounded by unengorged male ticks. If you pull a soft, plump tick from your pet look closely for hard, flat and area. Ticks usually attach themselves around the head, neck and shoulders of an animal.

Occasionally a single tick will cause an animal to be paralyzed. This tick paralysis is caused when

This Is Time To Begin Gardening Activities

In even the coldest regions of the West, this month usually marks the beginning of gardening activities. But this year, some areas have experienced one of the most severe winters on record, so spring may be delayed and present unusual challenges reports the April issue of Sunset magazine.

If, for instance, plants are water-logged, break up berms or watering basins or dig a drainage channel to let standing water drain. Check shrubs and trees for cold damage. Prune dead wood; if damage is too serious, replace the plant.

Also watch for signs of diseases, particularly anthracnose (brown blotches on leaves), fireblight (wilted, scorched-looking leaves), root rot, and various types of lawn fungus.

the tick releases a nerve toxin into the skin of an animal. Why an individual tick causes the paralysis and another tick does not is unknown. Removal of the tick usually results in complete recovery in one to three days.

Ticks can also transmit a variety of diseases although this happens rarely. The most famous tick transmitted disease is so called Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

Ticks should be removed carefully to make certain the minuscule head and mouth parts are not left behind. Insecticidal preparations called dips will kill the ticks on an animal and have some residual activity as well. Flea and tick collars help prevent ticks from getting on an animal but they often become too weak to do an adequate job. In heavily infested areas ticks can also attach themselves to areas of the animal that are not protected by a collar.

It is best to check your pet carefully after an outing in the Spring or early summer; daily checks are needed if you live in a problem area. Careful inspection may allow you to remove a tediously tenacious tick before it becomes attached by its mouth parts to your pet, your child, or your skin. (GEE-WHIZ).

Palouse Patchers Planning Annual Quilt Show April 14-15

The Palouse Patchers, an organization of quilting enthusiasts, is busy making final preparations for their annual quilt show. The Fourth Annual Quilt Show will be held April 14 and 15 at the Latah County Fairgrounds in the 4-H building. Hours on Saturday are 10:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. and on Sunday from noon until six.

The Palouse Patchers is a non-profit organization with a membership over sixty. Members are from all over the Palouse area: Moscow, Pullman, Troy, Genesee, and Potlatch. Proceeds from the annual show have made it possible for the group to contribute sizeable annual gifts to the University of Idaho, The Moscow-Latah County Library, the Latah County Historical Society and the 4-H program.

Treat problems early.

According to Sunset's Intermountain Garden Guide, once the preparatory work is completed, gardeners can nursery-shop and begin planting and fertilizing. (In highest elevations, plan the garden, order seeds and get ready for planting in another month or so).

Once snow and ice have melted, attention can be turned to daylilies, (Hemerocallis), the closest thing to foolproof perennials in cold-winter gardens. They are tolerant of most winters, and require only minimum watering during the summer.

They either can be planted new or tuberous roots lifted from the garden last fall can be replanted. Plant them to sun or partial shade and provide fast-draining soil.

Large clumps of arching, sword-like leaves will reach 2 to 4 feet tall. Flowers come in white, yellow, pink, orange, red and combinations. Some varieties will survive winter in the ground, if mulched. To be certain of survival, Sunset recommends lifting clumps in the fall, packing them in sawdust or vermiculite, and storing in a frost-free place.

Now is also a good time to start a variety of hardy vegetables. As soon as the soil can be worked, sow seeds of beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, endive, kohlrabi, lettuce, onions, parsley parsnips, peas potatoes, radishes, spinach, Swiss chard and turnips.

For later planting in flower beds, sow seeds of annuals. Currently available choices include bachelor's buttons, calendula, clarkia, cleome, godetia, linaria, lobelia, marigolds, pansies, petunias, snapdragons, sweet alyssum, verbena, and violas.

Youngsters need early Start in Hunter Education courses

Most Idaho youngsters who plan to obtain a hunting license and apply for controlled hunt permits should consider enrolling in a hunter education course as soon as possible, said Milt Williams, Department of Fish and Game.

All boys and girls under 15 years of age are required to pass an approved course in hunter education before they can purchase a license, Williams explained.

"The deadline for controlled hunt applications is usually around June 30 and those who intend to enroll should allow at least two weeks for classroom instruction and range firing," the hunter education administrator said.

Controlled hunt regulations state that a valid hunting license number must be entered on each application for a permit.

Mandatory hunter education took effect in 1980. Since that time, almost 44,000 students have been certified by volunteer instructors, Williams said. Information about course schedules is available at department regional offices.

University of Idaho Home Economists have scheduled a training session for persons interested in judging at county fairs. The training is scheduled for Tuesday, April 3 at the Brammer Building in Lewiston. The purpose of the training is to provide an opportunity for individuals to learn about the judging process, increase and up-date their subject matter knowledge, and gain experience through practice judging. Those persons who attend the training and want to be considered as a judge for 1984 county fairs will have their names placed on a Judge's List which will be distributed to the Home Economics in Northern Idaho.

Persons who are not interested in judging at county fairs but who are interested in the subject matter training are invited to attend. The morning session begins at 9:00 a. m. and focus' on judging needlework items including quilting, shadow applique, candlewicking, and counted cross stitch. 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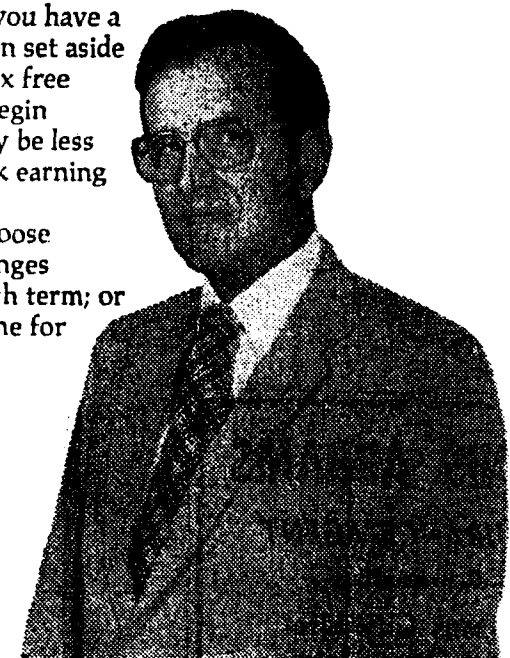
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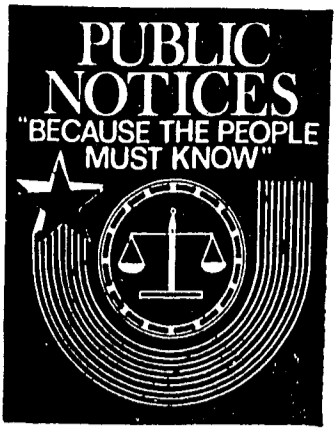

ORDINANCE NO. 598

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 1 OF ORDINANCE NO. 546 REGARDING ISSUANCE OF BEER LICENSES, THE EXPIRATION DATE OF SUCH LICENSES AND TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL PROCEDURES FOR PROCESSING AND ACTING ON APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSES AND FOR TRANSFER OR RENEWAL THEREOF AND FOR THE SUSPENSION AND REVOCATION THEREOF; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

Section 1. Section 3 of Ordinance No. 228 be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

Section 3. (a) License fees in the City of Kendrick for the sale of only bottled or canned beer, as defined in the laws of the State of Idaho, none of which is consumed on the premises, shall not exceed the sum or 25% of the fee provided in paragraph (b) below.

(b) Where the retailer sells for consumption on the premises, draught beer and bottled or canned beer or draught beer only, the license fee shall be \$80.00 per year, and not more than \$200.00.

(c) All licenses shall be granted by the Mayor and Council for a period of one (1) year beginning January 1 and ending December 31. A full year's license fee shall be collected after January 1st.

Section 2. The City Council shall grant or deny applications for licenses and for the transfer or renewal thereof within forty-five (45) days of the time it is filed with the City Clerk.

Section 3. Whenever the City Council denies an application they shall do so in writing which shall include the following:

(a) The statutes, ordinances and standards used in evaluating the application;

(b) The reason for denial, and

(c) The actions, if any, the applicant could take to obtain the license, or the transfer or renewal thereof.

Section 4. In all cases where the City Council is considering applications for license, transfer of license or renewal thereof, a transcribable verbatim record of the proceedings shall be made, and, if the application is denied, said verbatim record of the proceedings shall be kept for a period of not less than six (6) months after the final decision in the matter. Upon written request and within said six (6) months period, any person may have the record transcribed at his expense. The City Council shall also provide for the keeping of the minutes of the proceedings, and the same shall be retained indefinitely or as otherwise provided by law.

Section 5. No license shall be granted until there has been an investigation of all applicants by the investigative law enforcement department or agency engaged by the City Council. The investigation report and recommendation shall be in writing, and if denial of the application is recommended, the writing shall include the three (3) factors set forth in Section 3 above.

Section 6. If the Mayor and City Council determine it advisable to consider the revocation or suspension of a license the licensee shall be afforded a hearing before the City Council in accordance with Section 23-1016 of the Idaho Code, and a transcribable verbatim record and minutes shall be made and retained, subject to transcription, as provided in Section 4 above.

Section 7. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

Wait Awhile If Your Social Security Check Is Late

A person whose Social Security check does not arrive on the day it is expected should wait for two more mail deliveries before contacting the Pullman Social Security office, Ila Andrews, Field Representative, said recently.

This will take care of a good share of delayed checks. If the check still has not arrived after two days, the people at the Pullman office can begin action.

The most common cause of failure to receive a check is failure to report a change of address. Many people fail to notify Social Security when they move, even though they rely on their Social Security checks as their primary source of income.

Some people think it is enough to report their change of address to the post office. The post office, however, will forward mail to the person's new address for just 1 year. After that they will send the check back to the U. S. Treasury.

If a person's check is returned

and the new address provided, it usually takes about 4 or 5 days for a new check to be sent. If the check was not returned, a stop order will be put on it and the matter will be transferred to Washington, D. C. to see if the check has been cashed.

If it has not been cashed, a new check will be sent right away. This process can take up to 3 weeks. If it has been cashed, a new check can not be sent until the person who

cash the check is identified. Even though a person's check is deposited directly into his or her account in a financial institution, he or she should notify Social Security of any change in address.
