

It will soon be Easter again; that season of renewal when plants get greener, old animals feel younger, and many young animals produce off spring. Soon we will be seeing advertisements selling baby bunnies, chicks, ducklings, and other small

Many of these small innocent animal babies are bought each year and given to children. Many of these small animals are mistreated abused. Many perish. mistreatment and abuse is usually not intentional; it stems from misunderstanding the needs of baby an-

Take a baby bunny for example, these cute and fluffy infants are en-

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joyable to hold. Quite often, however, they are held too much and not allowed the rest and quiet a young growing animal needs for good health. They can become exhausted from heing squared partial matter. Receives Grant from being squeezed, petted, rubbed, cuddled, and chased. The household **On Crop Dusting** dog and cat will innocently chase them as well.

"Easter" bunnies are trust into an unnatural environment and are shelter, yet quite often little fore-

These problems can be even worse for chicks and ducklings. Both require special diets and both are so fragile that a strong child can innocently squeeze them to death. F&G Commission **Proposes Added** Wilderness Acres

About 1.8 million acres should be added to the proposed Idaho wild-erness bill to protect critical wild-life habitat and provide quality back country hunting and fishing, Fish & Game commission chairman Keith Stonebraker said Tuesday (April 3).

"There is no middle ground that allows protection for the remaining roadless areas included in this proposal," he added.

The commission chairman's statement was prepared for a Washington D. C. hearing on the Idaho Forest Management Act before a subcommittee of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee headed by the bill's sponsor, Senator James McChire, R-Idaho.

Stonebraker pointed out that the commission was recommending 1.2 million acres for wilderness in addition to the 559,000 acres it proposed last year as a result of the "hard release" language in the proposal.
"This new total is essential to pro-

tect carefully selected, high quality wildlife habitats and provide adequate, high quality backcountry experiences to which Idaho hunters and anglers are accustomed and which they expect to see preserved in the future," Stonebraker said.

In its present form, the McClure proposal gives wilderness protection for only 38 percent of the area recommended for wilderness by the commission, "and is insufficient protection for remaining roadless ar eas," he stated.

The commission's earlier recommendation for 559,000 acres was predicated on continuation of the normal Forest Service planning process that provides for future reconsideration of important roadless areas for possible wilderness designation, Stonebraker told the subcommittee on Public Lands and Reserved Wa-

He said commission decisions and positions on wilderness are guided by policies that:

-Recognize and endorse the wilderness concept but reserve judgment on individual wilderness proposals depending upon specific areas and

-Should classify as wilderness those roadless areas with highly signifi-cant fish, wildlife or hunting and fishing values if wilderness gives the best protection for those values. -Provides for diversified, recreational use of fish and wildlife in man-

aging Idaho's wildlife resources.

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

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
