Tree Pruning to be Topic at Kendrick Council Meeting

Two tree pruning specialists will give a slide presentation and discuss proper pruning methods at the Kendrick City Council meeting at 7 p. m. Tuesday, May 1 in the Kendrick Fire Hall.

Herman Ward of Lewiston, a former city forester at Boise and Arthur Partridge of Moscow, a forest resources professor at the University of Idaho, will discuss the do's and don'ts of pruning trees along the street and in the parks.

Ward and Partridge will tour the Kendrick Park and Main Street before the meeting. They will provide suggestions for improving the looks and care of the city trees.

Effective and attractive methods for pruning to avoid powerlines and telephone lines will also be discussed. The current regulations and possible modification of city policies for cutting or pruning trees will be considered.

Partridge is one of the authors of the UI Cooperative Extension Service manual on, "How to Prune Deciduous Trees."

Mrs. McKeever was born November 15, 1901 at Pittsburg, Kan. She moved to Spokane later that year and lived there until moving to Kendrick in 1915.

While her husband was attending dental school at Portland, Mrs. McKeever worked for the Meier-Frank Department Store in that city. Dr. McKeever opened his practice at Kendrick, June 15, 1923.

Mrs. McKeever was a 58-year member and past matron of Canyon Chapter Order of the Eastern Star at Kendrick and a member of the Daughters of the Nile.

She and McKeever were married July 11, 1921, at Coeur d'Alene.

In addition to her husband, she is survived by two daughters, Chloe E. Hardy, of Boise, and Paula M. Daugherty of La Mesa, Calif.; four grandchildren, and two great grandchildren.

The body was cremated. No funeral was held. Vassar-Rawls was in charge.

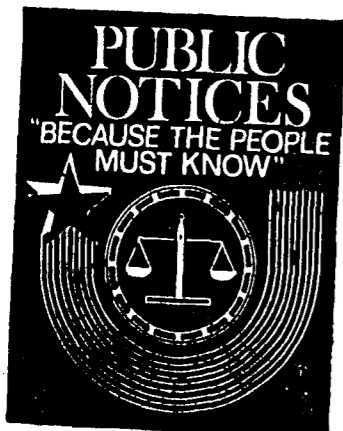
