Animal Topics

Ringworm Ringworm is caused by a fungal infection of the skin and will affect many animals including dogs, cats, horses, cattle, sheep, and swine. The flungi that cause ringworm can be transmitted to other species such as dogs to sheep. Most human ringworm infections are probably gained from contact with infected animals. Ringworm occurs most common-

ly when animals are congregated together. Ringworm on cattle in this area is usually seen in the winter and often disappears without treatment in the

also been reported during the sum- tive service May 4. mer months. Spread of ringworm can come from direct contact with infected such as horse blankets, bedding, or

grooming aids that have been on infected animals. Ringworm can affect animals of any age, but is more common in young animals. Humans appear to be less susceptible to ringworm after puberty. This is thought to be so because the skin becomes more acid-

ic in man after puberty.
"Classic" ringworm lesions are circular areas of hair loss with stubbled hair, scaling, crusting, and some times redness. Ringworm lesions usually don't itch unless they become infected with bacteria. lesions occur mainly around head, neck, and shoulders.

Spontaneous recovery is common in individual animals but there are also a wide variety of treatments for ringworms. For humans and small animals there are now some oral preparations in pill form that have been successful in treating ringworm. There are also a number of topical ointment and solutions that help in the treatment of ringworm. Isolating affected animals in starting a treatment regimen for them is a good way to help prevent the spread of ringworm.

Diagnosis of ringworm in large

animals is often made simply observing the location and appearance of lesions. In small animals ringworm can minic some other skin disease so skin scrapings and attempts to grow samples in a lab are of-ten used. In addition, some ringworm lesions in small animals will fluoresce under black light and this is sometimes used as a diagnostic




