The annual school board elections of the Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 will be held next Tuesday, May 15. This year's election will be for two trustees representing zones 2 and 3. In Idaho, trustee terms are for 3 years. Polls will be open from 1 to 7:00 P. M. at Kendrick High School for Zone 2 and Juliaetta Elementary School for Zone 3.

Zone 2 is that geographic area that encompasses most of Kendrick City Limits for those people living east of the Troy road and Sperry Grade Road. Zone 3 is that portion of Juliaetta that is north of School House hill and Fix Ridge Road as well north and east of Depot Road as it jogs one block on the Main Street of Juliaetta. Zone 3 also serves that portion of Kendrick that is west of Troy Road and Sperry Grade Road. Both of the incumbents in Zone 3, Buddy Henson and in Zone 2, Joyce Clemenhagen, refiled for election. A meeting of the board of trustees to canvass the votes will be held following the closing of the polls.

Ida M. Lyons, 95, a long-time resident of the Gold Hill area, Kendrick, Idaho, passed away Saturday, May 5, 1984, of causes incident to aging. Mrs. Lyons was a resident of the Latah Care Center at Moscow, Idaho at the time of her passing.



Ida May Sturdevant was born September 18, 1888, in Newton County, Missouri, and came west to the Gold Hill area with her parents, Joseph and Julietta Sturdevant, in 1904. After moving to Burnt Ridge near Troy, Idaho and then to Moscow. She was united in marriage to Frank C. Lyons of Linden, Idaho, on March 18, 1911. The couple built a new home on the farm, a home which they occupied until the death of Mr. Lyons in 1955. Ida continued to live on the farm until poor health forced her to move to the Care Center.

BASS REGULATIONS RESTRICTED TO REBUILD POPULATIONS

Bass regulations are restricted on some Idaho waters this year and anglers should carefully check the rules to avoid overlimits and fish that are either too long or too short.

"Granted, these special regulations are somewhat complex, but they are meant to cut down on overharvest, protect spawners and rebuild populations," said Virgil Moore, the Department of Fish and Game's manager of resident fisheries.

In fishing Area 1 in the printed regulations—the northern Idaho Panhandle—the general bass limit is 5 a day, with none under 12 inches and two over 17 inches. In all other fishing areas, the general daily limit is 10, with only 3 over 17 inches.

But here are the exceptions: Area 1—Anderson, Elsie and Thompson Lakes: January 1—June 30, catch-and-release only. July 1—December 31, 5 bass, with none under 14 inches and only 2 over 17 inches.

Avondale and Smith Lakes and Mission Slough: 5, with only 2 over 17 inches. The 12-inch minimum does not apply. Area 4—Lucky Peak and Paddock Reservoirs and Lake Lowell: 5, with none under 12 inches and only 2 over 1 inches.

Area 5—C. J. Strike Reservoir: 5, with none under 12 inches and only 12 over 17 inches. Hagerman Wildlife Management area; 2 bass daily.

Steelhead Smolts Moved To Hells Canyon

The Department of Fish and Game Idaho Power Company and the Army Corps of Engineers have teamed up as they did a year ago to move thousands of steelhead smolts from Niagara Springs Hatchery to below Hells Canyon Dam during an unusually high Snake River flow.

Spill at Hells Canyon was cut off five hours April 30 and again May 2 while the smolt were planted. Heavy spill builds high nitrogen content that can seriously affect the small fish, according to assistant hatcheries manager, Neil DeGiullo.

Once the fish are in the water and on their way downstream, they are pushed along when the flow resumes, DeGiullo said.

Six fish transport trucks made the eight-hour run on each of the two days to haul a total of about 400,000 smolts that average six inches in length each.

Niagara Spring Hatchery is financed by Idaho Power and operated by department employees.

 Thursday, May 10, 7 p. m. Lewiston—Idaho Department of Fish and Game office: 1540 Warner Avenue in the Lewiston Orchards.
 Orofino—VFW Hall, 360 Michigan Street.
 Friday, May 11 7 p. m. Moscow—Community Center, 3rd and Washington Streets.
 Grangeville: Smokejumper's loft, at the Grangeville airport.
 Public comments on the season recommendations will be recorded at the hearings for submission to the Idaho Fish and Game Commission prior to its meeting May 17 and 18 in Boise. At that session the commission will set fall seasons for elk, deer and other big game species.
 According to wildlife manager Sam McNeill, the department will not recommend any major changes in the regulations this year. "We had a fairly mild winter in northern Idaho and elk and deer herds showed good survival," he said. "Because of this, there is no need to make drastic adjustments in the seasons." McNeill noted that increase in controlled hunt permits may be proposed in areas where crop or range depredation has occurred as a result of elk or deer herds concentrating on private land. "Our elk numbers in particular have been expanding steadily over the past few years, and sometimes this creates conflict with human activities," he said.
 Printed copies of the 1984 Idaho Big Game Regulations will become available in early June at Department of Fish and Game offices and businesses where hunting and fishing licenses are sold.

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Animal Topics

H. R. McKelvey, DVM

Things are finally starting to get green around here. Isn't it amazing what plants can do with very little sunshine. In addition to all the grass, trees, and flowers growing there are also some poisonous plants beginning to show.

There are many varieties of poisonous plants that effect livestock and examples of these plants can be found in almost any area that livestock graze, however, livestock will become poisoned by these plants only under very specific conditions. For example, some poisonous plants are very unpalatable and livestock will avoid eating them unless no other foliage is available. In many plants only certain parts of the plant are toxic so livestock must eat that portion of the plant to become poisoned. Some plants have to be eaten in relatively large quantities over a long period of time to be toxic.

Animals can eat small quantities of many toxic plants and show very little if any clinical signs. Below normal weight gains and loss of vigor has been attributed to ingestion of toxic plants even though these claims are hard to substantiate.

A poisonous plant that causes problems in the spring is Low Larkspur. Low Larkspur is an attractive plant that has a blue to purplish flower that belongs to the buttercup family. Low Larkspur grows early in the spring and is most poisonous when it first starts to grow.

Cattle, horses, and sheep can be poisoned by low larkspur but cattle are the most susceptible. Cattle will sometimes feed on larkspur even when plenty of good grass is available. Low Larkspur is often one of the first plants to grow well after the snow melts.

Signs of poisoning can be very variable depending on the susceptibility of the animal, how much toxic material was eaten, and how soon the animal is seen after ingesting the material. In the case of low lark spur and cattle the usual sign is a dead and bloated cow. Evidence of larkspur having been eaten is needed to confirm a diagnosis.

Low Larkspur was used in this article because it is a good example of a poisonous plant that is most dangerous in the spring. As the season progresses other plants become dangerous. Exposure of livestock to poisonous plants is common throughout the year but actual poisonings from these plants is relatively uncommon.

SOME GAME TAG FEES INCREASED TO FUND EMERGENCY FEEDING

Following Idaho's worst winter on record for big game, fees for deer, elk and antelope tags were increased \$1.50 each by the 1984 legislature, with the revenue earmarked for emergency winter feeding and depredation control.

At the peak of the 1983-84 winter emergency, about 16,500 deer, 6,000 elk and 500 antelope were on emergency rations in southern Idaho. The Department of Fish and Game has estimated costs at more than \$525,000 for feeding and depredation problems.

A \$300,000 supplemental appropriation added to the department's budget for fiscal year 1984 and at least \$90,000 in voluntary contributions helped offset the unforeseen expenses.

The increases, effective May 1, apply to resident and nonresident tags and they are expected to raise about \$350,000 a year, according to the department. If the fund goes above \$400,000, the department director may use the excess for big game winter rehabilitation.

Other legislation approved this year gives the director authority to order special, limited hunts to deal with big game animals damaging crops or property.

The department may also issue permits to allow landowners or their authorized agents to take furbearers—primarily beaver—found to be damaging property.

A bill to increase steelhead and salmon permits to \$5 each from \$2 was returned to committee, although it was amended to a \$1 increase. It was intended to finance more public access areas and boat ramps and strengthen management efforts to hold steelhead numbers at strong levels and help restore Idaho salmon runs.

She is the author of Trails of the Sawtooth and White Cloud Mountains and Trails of Western Idaho.

A bicycle orientation and clinic for the Bike Treks will be held Wednesday at 7 p.m. in the Law Library Conference Room of the Idaho Supreme Court Building, 451 W. State Street, Boise. Items on the agenda include an overview of the Treks, a discussion and demonstration of equipment and hints on getting in shape. The meeting is free and open to the public.

The Trek program has two primary purposes: To provide opportunities aimed at minimizing environmental impact and improving the quality of life through actual field experiences, and to raise funds for the Lung Association's environmental programs. 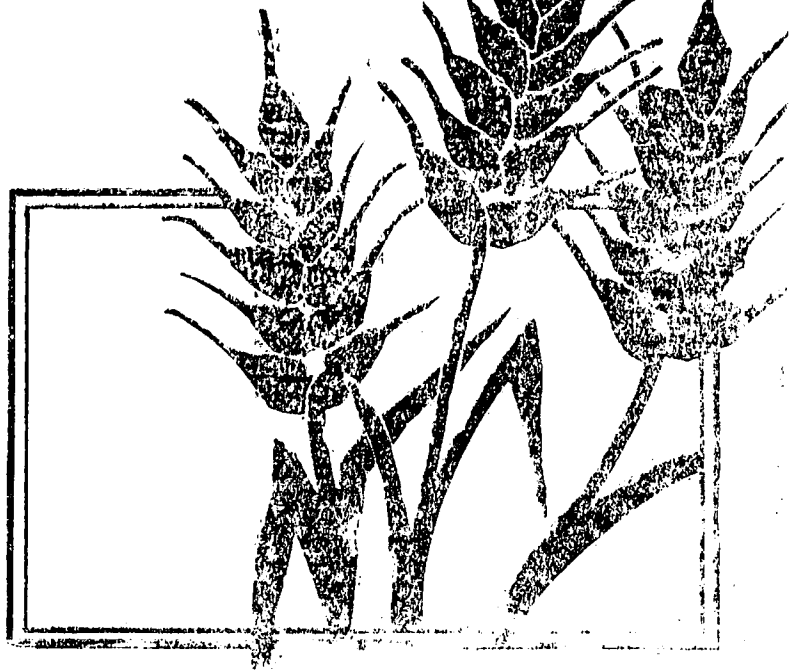
Covers of the March-April and September-October 1983 issues were cited for individual achievement in the IAF's annual creative awards competition. The March-April cov-
