

Kendrick to Form Tree Committee

Kendrick residents decided to form a committee to study the care of street and park trees following a meeting May 1 in the city.

The tree committee will consider establishing local guidelines and regulations to improve the care of trees in the city. Recommendations for replacing existing trees with species best suited for specific locations will also be developed.

The tree committee will examine:

1. home and business owner's responsibility for street trees.
2. any existing tree ordinances.
3. possible licensing of tree trimmers and 'tree trimmers' examination.
4. kinds of trees adaptable for street planting.
5. acceptable pruning methods.
6. proper spacing of trees.
7. other municipalities that have established ordinances for street and park tree care.

The tree committee will survey the wishes of the community and consult with the Cooperative Extension Service. They will also conduct tree education programs.

New Sidewalk For North Side of Kendrick Main St.

Work began this week on the installation of new sidewalks on the North side of Main Street in Kendrick from the old post office building down to the Fraternal Temple building. Much of the old sidewalk was in poor condition from age and heaving due to the pressure of tree roots from the locust trees. The locust will also be removed from the block and new trees planted in concrete containers which will be installed.

With the removal of the old trees, it will be possible to eliminate the space that existed between the curb of the street and the sidewalks. The additional space will be used for a wider street.

The city is paying for the expense of removing the old sidewalks and the trees. The expense of installation of the sidewalks will be met by the property owners.

City Supervisor Don Bateman said Tuesday evening the work will be completed by the May 26 Locust Blossom Festival. Dale Taylor Construction is doing the work.

Hazel M. Ouse, 92, Passes May 10

Hazel M. Ouse, 92, a resident of Good Samaritan Village since late 1979, died in the hospice room there Thursday morning. She had been in a nursing center patient since March.

Miss Ouse was a former teacher and for a number of years had cared for her uncle, the late Fred Nagle, a Genesee farmer.

She was born Aug. 11, 1891 at Appleton, Minn., and came to Genesee with her mother and brother in 1899 to be near her uncle. She graduated from North Central High School in Spokane in 1909 and from the old Lewiston Normal School in 1913. She received her bachelor of arts degree from the U. of I. in 1929. In 1935, she received a BS degree from the Teachers College of Columbia University in New York City.

Her first teaching assignment was at the Kluge country school near Genesee where she rode a horse or bicycle to school, depending upon the weather. As was the custom, she boarded with a nearby family.

Her teaching career spanned 35 years.

A memorial service was held Monday at 11 a. m. at Malcom's Brower-Wann Chapel in Lewiston. The body has been cremated.

The Rev. J. Stanley Lyman officiated.

At her request, memorials may be sent to Idaho Youth Ranch of Rupert, Unity church or Idaho State Historical Society.

Genesee School District Voters Approve M&O Levy; Re-Elect Trustees

Voters in Joint School District No. 282 went to the polls Tuesday, May 15, and approved a Maintenance and Operation Levy of \$50,000 by a 71% margin. Although voter turnout was lower than it has been for the past two elections, the percentage of approval was substantially larger this year.

In Latah County there were 137 Yes votes for the levy and 52 No votes. In Nez Perce County there were 24 Yes votes and 13 No votes.

Voters also returned both incumbent trustees for terms of three years. Glen Baumgartner from Zone 2 was given 40 votes and Spencer Hampton, Zone 3, was given 36 votes.

Supt. of Schools Geo. Crawford expressed his satisfaction at the results of the Tuesday election and thanked the patrons of District 282 for their continued support of the schools.

Robert A. Gray, 96, Retired Genesee Farmer, Passes

Robert Andrew Gray, 96, a Genesee native, who farmed in Latah County all of his working life, passed away Tuesday afternoon, May 8 at Gritman Memorial Hospital in Moscow.



The son of Robert R. and Eliza Gray he was born March 30, 1888 on his father's homestead, and until retiring and moving to town he still lived on and farmed the home place.

He was a member of the Genesee Community Church.

He was married to Sophia Michelson on October 2, 1921. She died in December of 1975.

School District 283 to Consider Juliaetta Elementary Improvements Again

The regular May meeting for the Kendrick School Board of Trustees was held Thursday, May 10. The staff report was given by John Johnson, math teacher at Kendrick Jr.-Sr. High School. Mr. Johnson emphasized that the real value of mathematics is to teach students how to think, and think logically. He indicated that he really tried to stress problem solving in all of his classes which gave students practice in logical thinking.

In old business, the board instructed the superintendent to get specific cost figures from Jim Belamy, a Coeur d'Alene architect who designed the proposed elementary school addition several years ago. The board wants to explore the costs of how much less it would cost to build a multi-purpose room as formerly planned and leave unfinished the dressing rooms, and the remodeling of the cafeteria and kitchen to be finished as the district had the money from time to time. This method of dividing up overall building needs of the school was compared with a person buying a home with an unfinished basement and completing it as they could afford it. This action of obtaining cost figures was the result

of a continued discussion on the tabled action of pouring a cement slab over an area that would cover plumbing pipes of the proposed elementary addition. This slab was to alleviate a continued winter mud problem caused by classes being outside because of the present gymnasium size being large enough to house only 2 classes.

In other business the board awarded the 2 bids to Dale Taylor Construction for suspended ceilings with six inch fiberglass insulation battens above and florescent lighting for 4 classrooms and doing the same work for the T-shaped main hallway. The work is scheduled to begin in June as soon as the school term is over.

The board also heard a report on the psychologist intern program from Debbie Saunders, a graduate student from the University of Idaho. She is one of the internists working under the supervision of Dr. Tom Fairchild, the school psychologist and counselor from the U. of I.

A special meeting of the board of trustees was scheduled for 8:00 p. m. Tuesday, May 15, to convene the votes of the school board election as well as conduct a senior attendance review.

Bass Research Continues On Brownlee Reservoir

Department of Fish and Game has started the second year of a 3-year study aimed at finding the reasons for the decline in quality of a popular bass fishery in southwestern Idaho's Brownlee Reservoir.

Project leader Bob Rohrer, a senior fishery research biologist also is evaluating recent plants of fall chinook and he is looking at the species composition of all fish populations in the reservoir.

The work has involved weighing and measuring fish that have been harvested, collecting scales from those fish to determine their ages, tagging live fish to learn what percentage of bass are being taken—and asking anglers a variety of questions.

"Our findings to date indicate the quality-size bass—those longer than 11 inches—comprise only 5 percent of the population, the lowest of any system I know of," Rohrer said. A balanced population runs 40-60 percent, he added.

Percentage of quality-size bass in a body of water depends upon growth rate, the number of fish hatched each year and the mortality rates. "The growth rate is about what one would expect for this latitude. Recruitment of young fish into the population appeared good in 1983 and reasonable during 1980-82," Rohrer said.

"But mortality seems to be the major factor limiting the population. We found that 44 percent of the fish we had tagged were taken by anglers in 1983," Rohrer explained.

Tagging will be done again this year, Rohrer said, and he is again asking for help from the fishing public. "Anglers can report their tagged fish at the Hells Canyon store in Oxbow, Oregon; the gateway store in Brownlee, Idaho; Eastside Market in Weiser, or directly to Rohrer at the Department of Fish and Game regional office, 109 W. 44th Street, Boise 83704.

How to Prevent Social Security Overpayments

Here's an important reminder if you get Social Security checks: Promptly report any changes that may affect your monthly benefits. If you don't, you may become overpaid and have to return some of this money later. Also you may have to pay a penalty.

The most common cause of overpayments—in 8 out of 10 cases—is too much earnings from work. Last year, 1.2 million people received over \$1 billion more in benefits than they should have.

Keep in mind that some payments must be withheld if you are under 70 and your 1984 work earnings exceed: \$6,960 if you are 65 through 69; or \$5,160 if you are under 65. If you go over the limit, \$1 in benefits should be withheld for each \$2 of excess annual earnings. Also there's a monthly test that applies in certain situations.

There are special rules, which include medical considerations, if you work while getting disability checks. Let Social Security know if you start or stop working or if your 1984

earnings will be higher than you reported earlier.

You should do this any time during the year there is a change. The easiest way to report is by phone. Also notify Social Security of certain other changes that often lead to overpayments such as:

- death or marriage;
- medical improvement of a disabled person;
- a student 18 or over stops attending school full time; and
- a parents or other payee no longer has custody of a child or other beneficiary.

If you receive supplemental security income (SSI) checks, in addition to Social Security, you need to report changes in resources, income,

household occupants, and certain other things.

1983 Elk Harvest Best in 13 Years

Idaho's elk harvest last year was the best since 1970, including a best ever take of 9,420 bulls, the Department of Fish and Game's annual telephone survey showed.

Total elk harvest was estimated at 12,700, up 11 percent from 1982 and only about 1,500 less than the 1970 total. About 58 percent of the bulls taken in general seasons and 49 percent in controlled hunts last year were five-pointers or better, according to the survey.

"We are more than meeting our long-range harvest goals," said staff biologist Lou Nelson, who compiled the survey results. The department's five-year plan projected a harvest of some 10,000 elk by 1985.

General hunts last year accounted for 9,300 elk and permit holders in controlled hunts reported a harvest of 2,800. Muzzle loaders took 300, almost double the 1982 total, but the harvest of 300 by archers was down about 100 from 1982.

The total deer harvest of 50,600 in 1983 represented a 4 percent increase over the previous year.

Hunters in general seasons took 45,600 deer and 3,300 were harvested in controlled hunts. Archers bagged 1,200 deer, compared to 757 in 1982 and the muzzle loader harvest of 500 was less than 20 below the previous year's total.

The reported black bear harvest was 2,100, compared to 1,584 in 1982.



Preventive Medicine

Preventive medicine is the concept of using medical knowledge in an attempt to insure against a possible future sickness. Preventative medicine entails the use of vaccines, various drugs such as dewormers, management techniques, and proper nutrition.

Nutrition is probably the most important aspect of a good disease prevention program. Animals in a good state of health are better able to ward off disease and better able to recover from an illness they contract.


Vaccines are widely used to help prevent specific diseases. A vaccine stimulates an animal's immune system to build protective substances called antibodies. These antibodies protect the animal if it comes in contact with the particular virus or bacteria that it is vaccinated against. Most vaccines require a booster shot to provide immunity and an animal is not fully protected until 3 or 4 weeks after the booster is given. Occasionally an animal will not respond well to a vaccine and will not build enough antibodies to be protected well.

Another aspect of preventative medicine is parasite control. All have parasites. These parasites may be worms, lice, ticks, fleas, flukes, mites, or even single-celled organisms like protozoa and coccidia. Most parasites are difficult to completely eliminate and cause surprisingly few problems in low numbers. There are many methods used to help control parasite problems; however, the most frequently used methods involve the use of drugs to help eliminate worms from an animal's system. All manner of animals are placed on regular de-worming programs. Horses, for instance are usually dewormed at least twice a year (spring and fall) and often are dewormed regularly while on pasture to decrease the parasite load. Cattle, sheep, and goats have a variety of parasites and ridding them of these unwanted pests allows them to utilize their feed more efficiently, maintain their vigor, and produce more of the milk, meat, and fiber we raise them for. Dogs and cats frequently suffer from parasitic infestations which usually take the form of worms or fleas.

Certain management techniques help prevent illness and injury. Castration, for instance, decreases male aggressiveness so that male dogs are less likely to suffer bite wounds, male cats are less likely to develop bite abscesses, male cattle are less likely to injure each other, and male horses are less likely to injure themselves and their owners. In addition, castration prevents unwanted pregnancies that would seriously disrupt a breeding program and helps prevent pregnancies in dogs and cats that produce unwanted strays.

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More Controlled Hunt Permits Proposed For Deer and Elk

Most of the changes in Idaho big game regulations this year will be on the positive side, if the Fish and Game Commission approves when it meets in Boise, May 17-18.

More controlled hunt permits for elk and deer are recommended by the Department of Fish and Game. Three new moose hunts are proposed and 37 permits will be added to last year's 257, subject to commission approval.

The department is proposing that general either-sex deer hunting be discontinued in 29 southern Idaho management units, but that controlled hunts be added to provide a limited harvest of does.

"Populations in some of these units are not meeting objectives called for in our long-range management plan. Some areas in southern Idaho also were affected by the severe winter but, generally speaking, the deer and elk herds came through in better shape than expected," said staff biologist Carl Nellis.

"Northern Idaho herds are coming off a relatively mild winter and they are in excellent condition," he added.

Last year's harvest of 9,420 bull elk was the best ever, according to department records, and long-range population goals are on or ahead of schedule, Nellis said.

Controlled elk permits would be increased by 1,125 to a total of 8,735 reflecting an increased effort to reduce depredation problems and numbers of elk fed in some areas of south central Idaho.

Other major changes to be considered by the commission include: Deer—add 2,025 deer permits to last year's 6,200, "to allow antlerless controlled hunts in units where general either-sex hunting was eliminated." Ten new controlled hunts are proposed in units which could not support general, either-sex hunting.

Bighorn sheep—permits would be increased to 148 from 137, with one new hunt for Rocky Mountain big-

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horns and two for California big horns. Past reintroduction efforts are continuing to provide dividends to Idaho hunters.

Mountain goat—hunts in units 10 and 20 would be eliminated because of continuing declines in mountain goat populations, but one permit would be added to the 1983 total of 69.
