Jensen Sets Records at Idaho State Track Meet in Boise

Kirsten Jensen was a quadruple winning in the Idaho State A-3-A-4 track meet in Boise to lead the Kendrick girls to a 4th place finish. Jensen won the long jump, 100, 200, and 400, setting state records in the 200 at 25.3 and the 400 at 58.24. Marta Jensen took 2nd in the 400 with a time of 59.64. Marta also was 4th in the 200 meter dash.

Both girls broke the previous 400 meter record of 60.0. During the 1st day of the track meet, Marta broke the record with a 59.5 in the qualifying heats. The 2nd day Kirsten took it.

Slade Zumhove was the only Kendrick boy who placed at the meet. He was 6th in the long jump with a mark of 20.5 and 5th in the 200 with a 23.25, just three-hundredths of a second short of 4th place.

The Kendrick boys 800 meter relay was in 3rd place halfway through their race, when two troubled hand-offs put the Tigers out of the competition.

Saturday, May 26 Is Kendrick's 24th Annual Locust Blossom Festival

With a watchful eye on the weather, but not much hope of finding many Blossoms on the trees, the Kendrick community prepares to celebrate the 24th annual Locust Blossom Festival this Saturday, May 26. Months of hard work and planning by the Lions Club and V. F. W. will culminate with what promises to be a very good celebration, with a day filled with fun and entertainment for all.

The day will begin with the 7th annual 6-mile run and a 2-mile fun run. Registration will begin at 7:00 a. m. for both races. Those entering the 6-mile run will assemble and register at Browning Cut Stock Co. on the other side of Juliaetta. Fun run contestants will register at Doc Little's shop between here and Juliaetta. Both runs will begin at 8 a. m.

At 8:30 a. m. children with decorated bikes, wagons, etc. and those in costumes and with pets will assemble between the Kendrick Garage and the Joyce Clemenhagen home. The entries will be judged and the Kiddie Parade will get underway at 9:30.

At 10 the main Festival parade will begin with the promise of the usual fine number of floats and groups.

Immediately following the parade, there will be children's races in the

park; the flower show at the Fraternal Temple; the Art Show at the Methodist Church and the games and concession stands will all open.

Barbecue at 11:30

The highlight of the entire day begins at 11:30 when the serving of the annual beef dinner starts. The menu is the same as in previous years: barbecue beef, baked beans, cole slaw, pickles, bread, butter and punch or coffee. Inflation finally caught up with the Locust Blossom Festival and the price has jumped from \$2.50 to \$3.00. Serving will continue until 1 o'clock.

The Sweet Adelines and old Time Fiddlers will perform during the noon meal and afterwards in the Park.

A new attraction for the Festival, a pony pull, will be held near the old Forestry Building back of the Kendrick Garage beginning at 2. Teams of trained ponies will compete to see which can pull the heaviest load.

Ben P. Cooks Chosen Grand Marshals For 1984 Locust Blossom Festival



Ben P. Cook and his wife, Miriam, who have been associated with the Kendrick and Southwick communities since 1928, have been chosen by the Kendrick-Juliaetta Lions Club to be Grand Marshals of the 24th annual Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival. Mr. Cook is a retired teacher and Mrs. Cook taught Sunday School Kindergarten and was formerly the News Editor of the Kendrick Gazette.

Ben and Miriam and A. C. and Ruth Wilson, the Grand Marshals selected by the V. F. W., will lead the 1984 Locust Blossom Festival Parade Saturday morning, May 26.

Ben and Miriam first came to the community in 1928, following his graduation from Lewiston State Normal School. That fall Ben accepted a position to teach the upper four grades and coach at the old Southwick school for the sum of \$150 a month. He remembers that he paid \$8.50 a month to rent a house for he and his family. He was at Southwick until 1934 when he went to Genesee to teach the 7th and 8th grades and coach. This was in the depths of the great depression and his salary began at \$135 a month. Ben stayed in Genesee until 1943 when he accepted the position of Superintendent of Schools at Craigmont where he remained until 1947.

In 1947 the Cook family moved to Kendrick and Ben began a teaching tenure at Kendrick High School that would span 21 years; until he retired at the end of the term in 1970. While at Kendrick he served 12 years as principal at the high school and also taught math and manual arts.

Since retiring, the couple have enjoyed traveling, visiting and have been active with the Kendrick Campers group.

They are the parents of four children: Donna Goff of Lewiston; Gordon Cook of Port Angeles, Wash.; Ben B. Cook of Ontario, Oregon and Given Deobald of Kendrick.

A lifetime of service to their family and community have made Ben and Miriam well-deserving of honor of being this year's Grand Marshals of the Locust Blossom Festival.

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Intermountain Gardening
 Tips from Sunset Magazine

Still-cool weather and even one last frost shouldn't deter intermountain gardeners from beginning preparation for the approaching summer months. Several plants are ready for attention, including annuals and nursery-grown ground covers, trees and shrubs, reports the May issue of Sunset Magazine.

In addition to setting out nursery plants, Sunset's Intermountain Garden Guide suggests now as a good time for sowing seeds of African daisy, asters, bachelor's button, calendula, California poppy, clarkia cleone, cymoglossum, godetia, linaria, lobelia, pansies, Shirley poppy, snapdragons, sweet alyssum, sweet peas, sweet William, verbena and violets. At the end of the month, gardeners should plant heat-loving echium, nasturtiums, and petunias. As for nursery-grown plants, good choices are alpine currant, buffalo-berry (Shepherdia), dogwoods, honeysuckles, spreading junipers, Oregon grape, potentilla, raspberry, cherry, service berry, and snowberry (plant after last frost). In addition to these, which should be planted before summer heat arrives, perennial herbs (including mint, oregano, parsley, sage and tarragon) also can be planted out.

Other candidates for planting this month are perennial seedlings, including artemisia, asters, bleeding hearts (Dicentra), columbine, delphinium, Iberis, linum, martensia, and yarrow.

Before mid-month, a second crop of beets, broccoli, carrots, lettuce, peas, radishes and Swiss chard can be sown; later in the month, heat-loving beans and corn will be ready to be set out. (Keep soil moist until plants emerge.)

At the end of the month, tomato and squash plants can be set out, with frost protection available if necessary. At highest elevations, wait until next month.

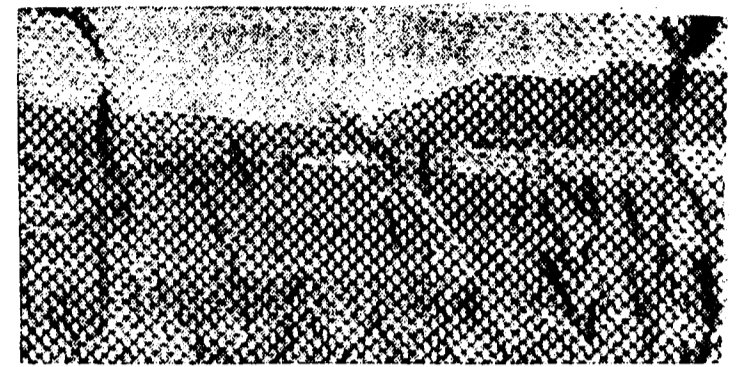

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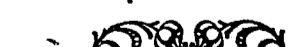
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Animal Topics

Season of the Newborn

This is the season of the newborn. Most wild animals give birth during the spring when food is available in abundance. Wild herbivores have their offspring when there is sufficient forage for milk production to feed the newborns. Most carnivores have their young during this time because the herbivores they hunt, including rabbits, mice, and ground squirrels are increasing in number.

Birds lay their eggs so they will hatch at a time of year when the food is plentiful. Insect eaters tend to raise their clutch earlier in the year than do seed eaters.

Animals reared by man are no longer completely in tune to these natural cycles of birthing and nesting. Cattle and sheep are traditionally manipulated to give birth in late or mid winter. This is done to get large calves and lambs in the fall when they are brought in off the range. Calves and lambs rounded up in the fall are often weaned at that time and shipped to market. If these animals were born in late spring or early summer as deer and elk are then they would weigh much less in the fall and would bring much less money than a calf born 4 or 5 months earlier. Breeding cattle and sheep to have offspring early in the year is a good marketing tool and the cattle are not at all harmed by this practice. The major problems with this scheme is the effects of harsh weather on young animals; however, good shelter and a watchful eye can circumvent many of the problems.

Commercially reared chickens and turkeys no longer make a nest at a specific time each year. In fact, they are manipulated to lay eggs most of the year. Roosters are only used if the eggs are to be hatched; otherwise, hens produce their wondrous packages of protein without being bred. It seems a foul deed, but the hens don't mind.

Newborns. Newborn animals, newborn ideas. We live in an age of tremendous technological achievement and marvelous modern miracles such as space shuttles, satellites, T. V., computers, aircraft, etc., etc. All of the modern day scientific achievements lumped to gether pale to insignificance when compared to the birth of just one animal. Each newborn has a genealogy that traces to the beginnings of life on earth.

Each newborn has evaded the accidents and diseases that would prevent it from being born, and they are innumerable. Each newborn, wet and shakily and helpless at birth has the possibility of having offspring that will see our modern achievements become obsolete.

Camp Hodia and Hodia Wilderness Camp for children and young adults with diabetes will be in session again this summer for the 7th consecutive year.

Teens and young adults will attend Hodia Wilderness Camp in the Idaho Wilderness Area. The wilderness camp is a beginners back pack trip. Food and equipment are provided and horses are used to pack some equipment.

The camps, sponsored by the Idaho Affiliate of the American Diabetes Association, provide the familiar camp activities and experiences but because the camps are exclusively for persons with diabetes, the participants have the opportunity to learn more about the disease. With increased knowledge, better control of the condition is often achieved. The opportunity to interact with other diabetics is also an important part of the program.

Not only are the campers diabetic, but many staff members also have diabetes. Staff members are primarily professional people who donate their time for the week of camp.

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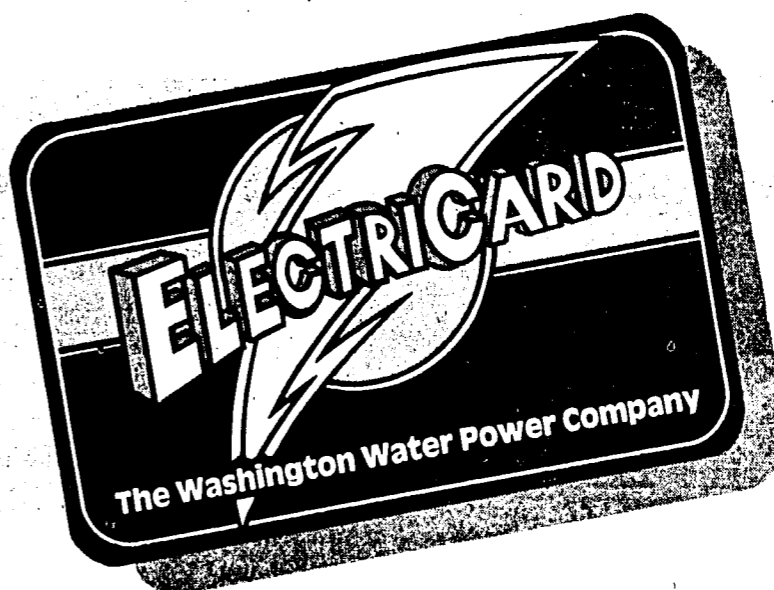
