**NOISELESS PETS**

Noiseless creatures often make excellent pets and are usually easy to care for. Take fish for example.

Aquarium fish make no noise, never leave a mess on the carpet, and they don't demand to be petted at inconvenient times. In addition, fish are pleasant to watch, are afflicted with few diseases, and require very little food and care.

Many people also keep reptiles as pets and except for occasional hissing noises, reptiles are usually noiseless. Reptiles include crocodiles, alligators, turtles, snakes and lizards. Most people are reluctant to keep larger reptiles such as alligators and pythons or venomous reptiles such as cobras, but many of the smallest reptilians make good noiseless pets. Examples of these include small turtles, chameleons, and iguanas.

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Another noiseless pet is spiders. Some of the larger species such as tarantulas are said to become quite affectionate. Pet spiders should probably not be allowed to roam around the house because of their fragility. Some unknowing guest may mistake it for a wild variety and inadvertently step on it.

Most insects have short lives and keeping them as pets is a temporary but often interesting experience. Much can be learned, for example, in watching the metamorphosis of a caterpillar into a butterfly. Most insects are noiseless. A colony of ants in an "ant farm" is educational, quiet, and easy to care for.

Some parasites have been made into pets and they are extremely quiet as well as hard to see. I have heard of flea circuses but have never seen one. Fleas are such a difficult medical problem to manage that I cannot envision taking an interest in "trained" fleas. The concept of a flea circus is as appealing as a louse rodeo or a tick parade. Personal

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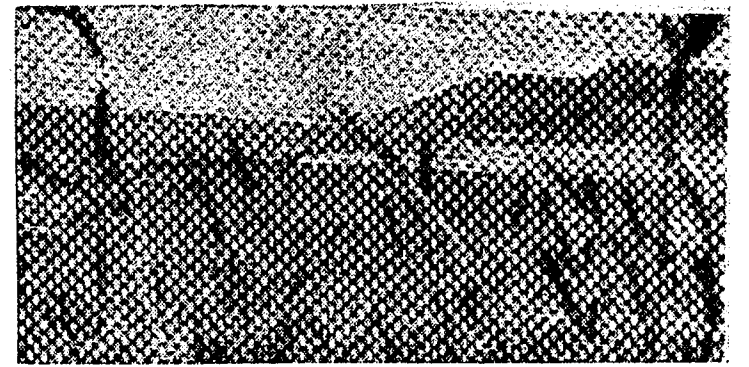

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### Spray Check Clinic at U of I Thursday, June 14

A Spray Check Clinic sponsored by the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service, is planned for Thursday, June 14. The program will begin at 10 a. m. at the U. of I. Plant Service Farm located east of Moscow on the Troy Highway. The spray clinic is designed to help applicators improve chemical application accuracy. Old chemicals like 2, 4-D were somewhat forgiving as far as chemical application accuracy goes. Newer chemicals require precise application especially at rates applied in ounces or fractions of an ounce per acre. Misapplication can be quite costly to growers. The spray check clinic will help applicators "tune-up" their methods of application and their equipment so that their chemical application can be more cost effective. The morning segment of the clinic will include sprayer calibration basics, low volume application and nozzle demonstration and testing. In the afternoon, field sprayers will be tested (equipment check, speed check, nozzle check and computer analysis). Bring your field sprayer to the clinic

### Field Day Features Fescue and Bluegrass Research

Moscow, Idaho—University of Idaho trials of new turfgrass varieties will be featured at the annual Grass Seed and Turfgrass Field Day to be held at 1:30 p. m. June 14, at the UI Plant Science Farm east of Moscow.

UI agronomist Ron Ensign said persons attending the field day will see 90 new varieties of Kentucky bluegrass that are being tested in nationwide trials. Also on display will be 48 varieties of fine leaf fescues which were being tested nationally.

Several dozen new varieties of tall fescues will be seen. The University of Idaho is participating in regional and national tall fescue trials.

"In regional turfgrass trials of 111 varieties, 15 different species are represented. Some of the species are water conservation grasses. We're inviting home owners and seed growers to see how these grasses grow in northern Idaho," Ensign said.

Two improved Idaho fescue varieties will be on display. The new varieties, "Joseph" and "Nezperu," were released by the University of Idaho last year for seed production in the Northwest. The drought-tolerant grasses are expected to be used widely for range and seedlings and for conservative purposes.

Field day visitors also will see a new white clover variety under seed production. In a grass seed production trial, the productivity of several Kentucky bluegrass varieties is being compared. Ensign said the system of comparison focuses on the part of the bluegrass plant which contribute to seed yields.

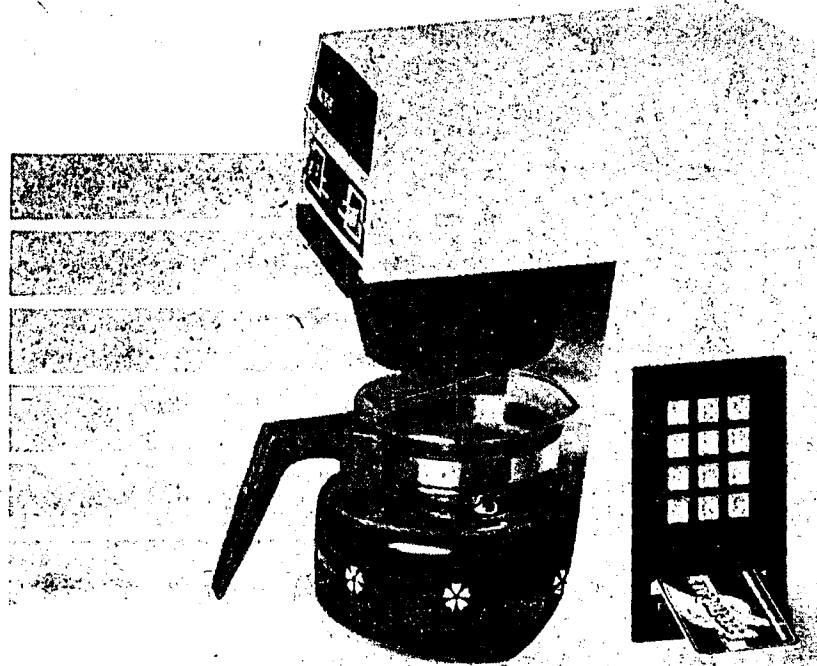

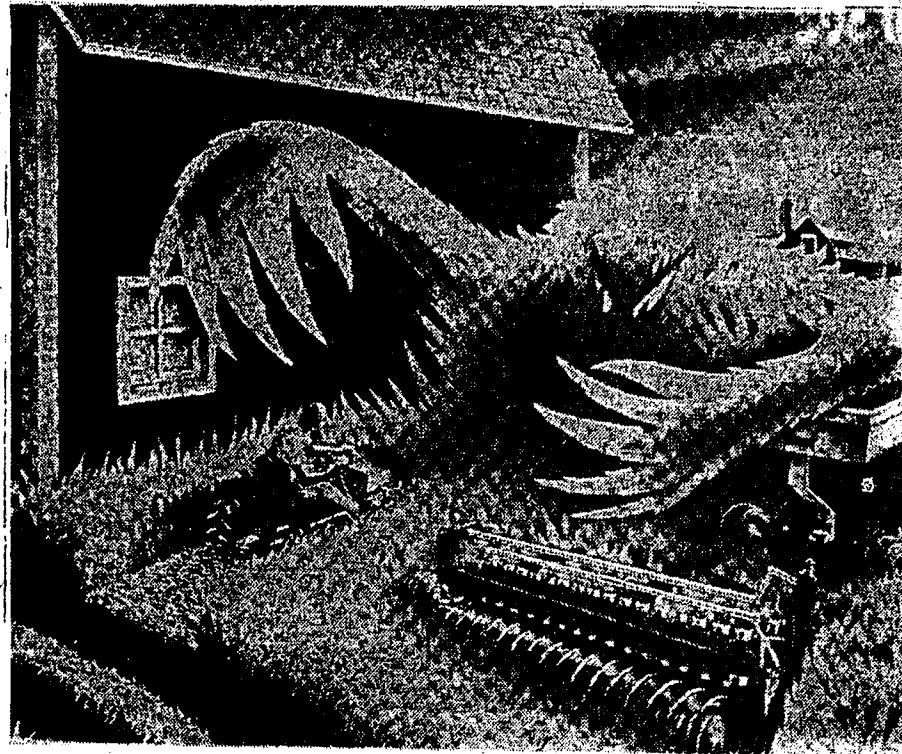

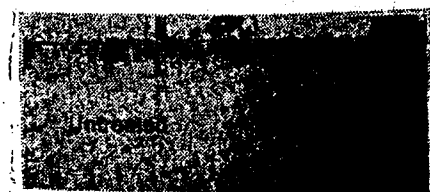

**New Nongame Leaflets Ready for Readers**

Two new leaflets about nongame wildlife have been printed and they are available at all Department of Fish and Game officers said state

nongame manager Martel Morache. Nongame wildlife leaflet 2, "The Colony Nesters," describes the water birds that live around Idaho's lakes, marshes and shorelines.

"Nesting high or low, on land or water, all of them have two things in common: a desire to live with their own or other species of water birds in large groups and the need to live near water," the leaflet states.

They range from the commonplace quills to the rare, white-faced ibis.

Nongame wildlife leaflet 3, "Back yards 'For the Birds,'" is a guide for attracting wild birds to yards in Idaho. It describes landscaping, types of feeders and feed the birds prefer lists the ones that are most apt to stop by.

Idaho's nongame program is supported by voluntary, tax-deductible contributions most of them from the Idaho individual income tax checkoff which had produced about \$56,300 as of April 25, compared to \$9,000 at the same time in 1983.

Last year's total amounted to about \$108,000, Morache said.

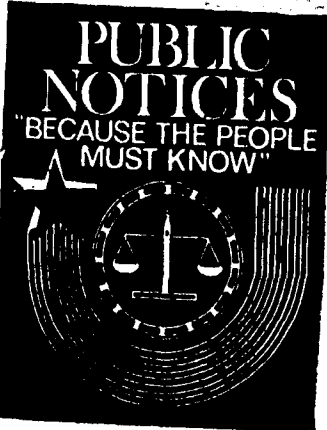

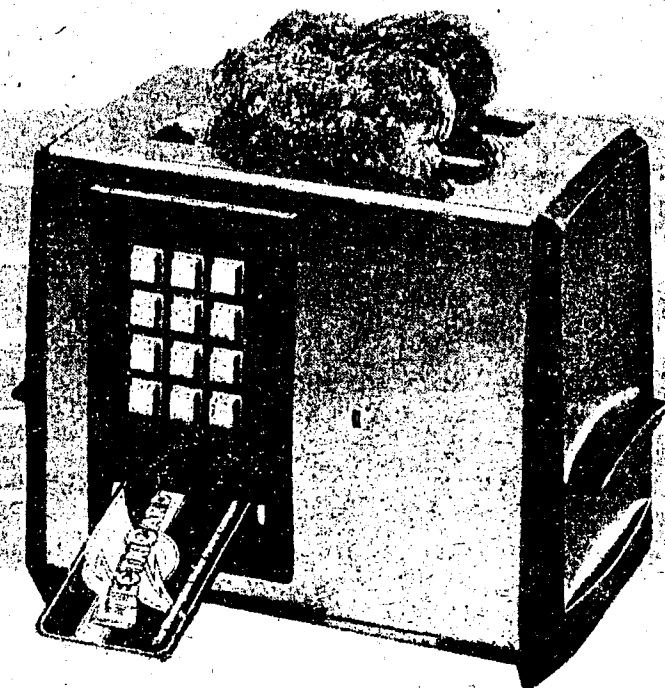
