Respiratory illness in cats is very common and can be caused by a variety of agents. The most common

cause of respiratory disease in cats is caused by viruses, however bacteria, parasites, heart failure, fungi and allergies can also cause respiratory illness in cats.

Viral caused respiratory disease in felines usually involves just the upper respiratory tract and not the lungs. This type of infection is similar to flu in humans. Possibly the most prevalent virus involved is feline rhinotracheitis virus (virus means nose, and trachea is a major portion of the upper respiratory tract, it is a suffix meaning inflammation; thus, rhinotracheitis literally means inflammation of the nose and throat).

Cats seldom die from rhinotracheitis but it may be lethal to nursing kittens or cats that are severely stressed from other illnesses. The virus is very widespread and is easily transmitted from cat to cat. Transmission is often accomplished when an infected cat sneezes near a susceptible cat.

Sneezing is often the first sign seen in cats infected with rhinotracheitis virus. Coughing can also be observed along with a mild fever and loss of appetite. A clear nasal or ocular discharge may occur. Any- one who has recently had a bout

with the flu can have a lot of empathy for a cat suffering from rhinotracheitis.

Treatment for feline rhinotracheitis consists mainly of good nursing care to help the animal fight the effects of the virus. This can include antibiotics to prevent concurrent bacterial infections, appetite stimulants, eye ointments, force feeding if necessary, and supportive vitamin therapy. The usual course of the disease is 7 to 9 days. Affected other pets and people don't become infected with feline rhinotracheitis.

Prevention of rhinotracheitis in cats is accomplished through vaccination. The common feline viral vaccine has distemper, rhinotracheitis, and calicivirus components. After an initial booster series to establish immunity, cats are revaccinated annually to maintain their immunity to these diseases.



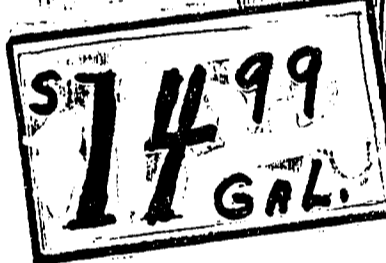

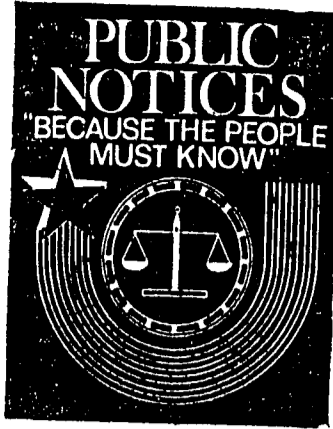

HOW TO HANDLE CRITICISM

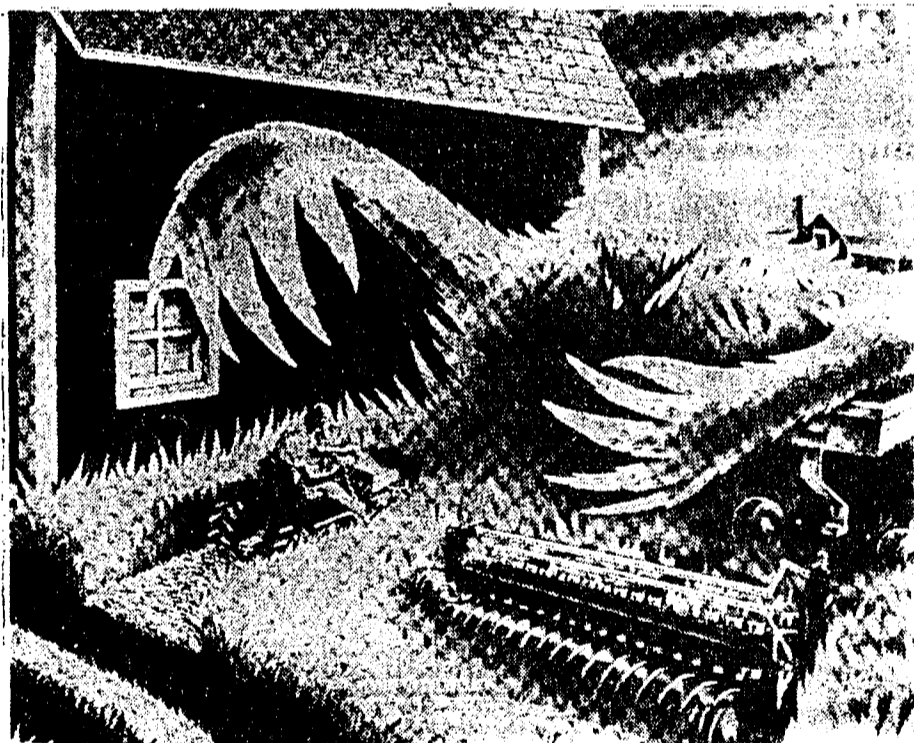

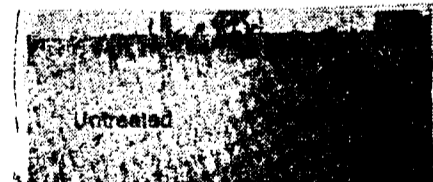

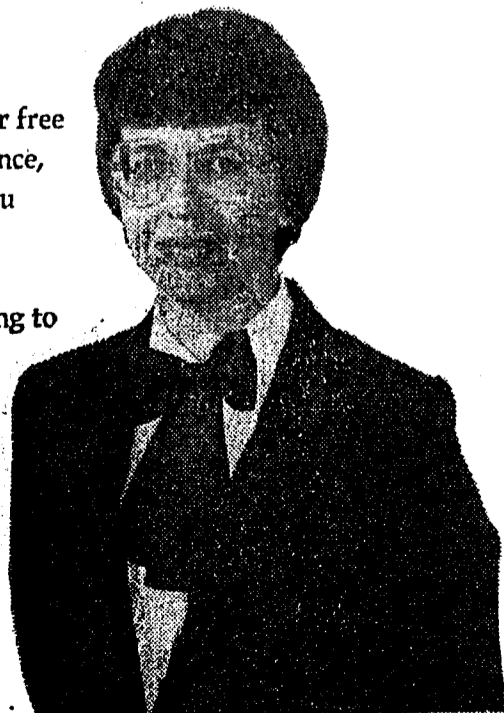
