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## Sunday visitors of Marion and Helen Upland Game Harvests Improve Over 1982

Upland game hunting was better for most species in 1983—comparing it with 1982—but harvests for both seasons generally remained below those in recent years, according to results of the Department of Fish and Game's annual questionnaire sur-

vey.

Harsh weather and loss of habitat continued to share much of the blame for the overall pheasant de-

cline that started in 1982, state game manager Gary Will said.

Pheasant harvest last year was estimated at 388,700, compared to 329,700 in 1982—and the total of 502,500 reported in 1981.

Loss of habitat to intensive land development has cut into pheasant populations. 'Idaho's favorite game birds just don't have enough of the habitat they need for cover and nesting", Will said

Chukar hunters took about 80,500

birds in 1983, up from 2,000 the previous year, when the cold, wet spring took its tool on brood populations for most upland game, he added.

The Canada goose harvest reported in the survey dropped to 47,000 from 55,200 in 1982, although both seasons topped the five-year average Duck hunters bagged about 508,400 hinds lest from company to 425,800 birds last year, compared to 425,600

Sage grouse, 26,100 (39,600); Hungarian partridge, 87,000 (63,200);





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
