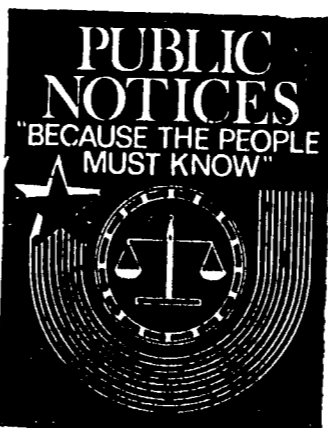

### CHEMICAL PRODUCTS

There is a large number of household chemical products that are po-

tentially hazardous to pets. Pets can be affected by the same chemicals that will produce adverse effects in people.

For example, pets can be adversely affected by many automotive and machinery products such as antifreeze, brake fluids, gasoline and carburetor cleaners. Gasoline, in particular, can become a problem to animals if it is swallowed, inhaled, or is spilled on a large area of the body. There are also many beauty aids and health aids that are potentially hazardous to pets. Some of these include deodorants, diet pills, liniments, and pain killers. Aspirin for

example is especially toxic to cats. Lawn and garden products can be hazardous to pets. These products include insecticides, herbicides, and gopher poisons.

A list of all products that are potential hazards would be very long; one relatively recent estimate indicates there are several hundred thousands of products that are potential toxins. In addition, new products are constantly being promoted. In general, pets are subject to the same household hazards as children. In some cases, such as lawn and garden products, pets are more liable to come in contact with a hazardous substance than children are. If an animal ingests a toxic substance determine first if the substance is corrosive or non-corrosive. Corrosive materials include strong acids, alkali, and petroleum products. Animals should not be induced to vomit if corrosive materials have been ingested.

If an animal gets very excited or convulses after ingesting a toxic substance try to keep it from injuring itself. If an animal gets a toxic or corrosive material on its skin then the skin should be immediately washed with large amounts of water. In the case of petroleum products, soap should also be used.

A sample of a hazardous material that is affecting a pet should be taken with the patient to a veterinarian, preferably in its original container. If the animal has vomited, then a sample of the vomit should also accompany the patient.

## Residential Construction in Idaho Shows Upward Trend, Says Bank Newsletter

Despite higher mortgage rates, Idaho residential construction activity during May experienced significant growth, said James Hoogland, II, Kendrick and Roselle Robinson, Genesee, quoting the May Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report, edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, senior vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, will be distributed this week. A major portion of the increase occurred in Boise City where 228 residential building permits issued accounted for 37 percent of the state total. Mortgage rates remained relatively flat in May. Adjustable-rate mortgage instruments continue to carry a first-year rates significantly below rates quoted on 30-year fixed-rate instruments. Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in May was \$46,071,838 or 16.4 percent

above 1983. New residential construction for 616 dwelling units totaled \$22,341,790, an increase of 40.6 percent in number and an increase of 18.8 percent in value compared with a year ago. Nonresidential construction valued at \$10,250,953 was up 5.5 percent from last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$13,479,095 were up 21.8 percent.

#### June Is Busy Time For Gardeners

June is time for action. Throughout the intermountain West, warm summer days spur gardens into full speed growth, providing more opportunities for gardeners than in any other month, reports the June issue of Sunset Magazine.  
 Feeding is particularly timely for perennials and lawns. For the coldest areas, Sunset's Intermountain Garden Guide recommends applying nitrogen fertilizer to flower beds; a complete fertilizer can be substituted only if one hasn't been applied in the past year. Any fertilizer that lands on leaves should be

rinsed off, and watered thoroughly. Feed lawns with nitrogen fertilizer and repeat in four to six weeks. Planting fruits, flowers and vegetables is also high on the intermountain gardener's agenda. Now is a good time, for instance, to plant strawberries. For gardeners who missed the barefoot season Sunset suggests setting out strawberries from nursery six-packs or pots. Choose a sunny place, provide a coarse soil mix with plenty of organic matter, and water generously at first. Vegetables are ready for planting as well. Sow seeds of beans, cucumbers and squash; or sow successive crops of beet, bush beans, carrots,

chard, kohlrabi, lettuce, onions, parsnips, peas, radishes, spinach, Swiss chard, and turnips. In areas where seasons are long and warm enough sow corn, pumpkin, and watermelon, and plant nursery seedlings of eggplant, peppers and tomatoes.  
 As for native grasses, at month's end sow seeds of blue grama, buffalo grass and crested wheat grass. For the first year, weed and water between summer showers.  
 Perennial seed can be sowed now, too. Good choices, says Sunset are aster, campanula, columbine, coneflower, coral bells, delphinium, erigeron, gallardia, gills, penstemon, and potentilla. In a bed that won't be disturbed all summer, distribute the seed; young plants will be large enough to transplant in late summer.

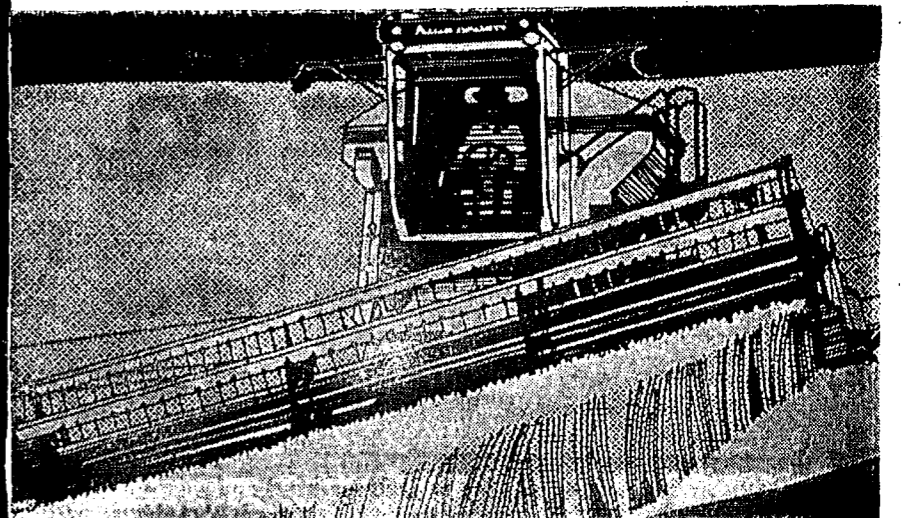

**"A Timely Word"—**

A timely word is so good! Not those flattering insincere remarks that are not worth anything. But just plain old good, gracious loving words shared with each other! How good they are!

Our tongues, I am sure we don't need to be reminded can be used in that way or the opposite! James says, "The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole person, sets the whole course of his life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell. All kinds of animals, birds, reptiles and creatures of the sea are being tamed and have been evil, full of deadly poison (James 3:6-8)"

And in the marriage relationship—how easy it is at times to "repay evil with evil, insult with insult" as Peter warns us not to do! Why? Because he says we were called to inherit a blessing! 
