New Stations to be **Available on Local TV Cable System**

Beginning this Saturday, September 15, 3 new channels will be available to subscribers to the Kendrick TV Cable System, it was announced by system manager, Chas. Lyons. In addition to the 3 new stations which all subscribers will receive, there will be a "premium" station, Home Box Office, available for an added fee for those who wish it.

The new stations become available to Kendrick with the installation of a 12-ft, fiberglass satellite dish up of the main antenna site, Lyons said.

The new stations to be added to the system are: U. S. A. Network (Channel 7), ESPN (a 24-hour sport station (Channel 9) and Lifetime (Channel 11). Channel 5 will be the

Home Box Office Station. The additional cost of securing these stations will force an increase in the cost of monthly service, and in the system of billing. At the present time, the cable subscribers were billed every 3 months, at a cost of \$5 per month (\$15 quarterly). Beginning in September subscribers will be billed on a monthly basis and the cost will be \$8 per month for those who just want the basic service of the regular stations they now receive and the added 3 new stations. If HBO is desired then the cost will be an additional \$10.50 per month.

One Free Week of HBO Lyons said that all cable subscribers will receive the first week of

Home Box Office reception free, so they may decide if they want to subscribe to this premium station on a regular basis. After the first week only those paying the additional cost will receive the station.

He expects approximately 25 to 30foreign scholars and faculty for the 1984-85 academic year, close to last year's total.

FISH AND GAME FINES TOP \$127,000 IN FY 84

Fish and game law violations resulted in almost 4,000 citations and \$127,600 in fines and forfeitures during fiscal 1984, the Department of Fish and Game reported.

Civil penalties assessed totaled about \$55,800-down slightly from the previous year.

The more common violations included fishing and hunting without heenses or during closed seasons, overlimits, use of illegal year and failure to observe special fishing regulations where they apply, the com puter printout showed.

With seasons for big game and upland game about to get into full swing,.. the department's enforcement bureau urged hunters to make a careful study of printed regulations to help avoid citations. Here are a few examples:

Always carry a valid hunting license and carry the proper tag and permit for big game. Validate the tag and attach it correctly immediaely after the animal is harvested. Be sure that evidence of sex is

shown as the regulations specify and be aware of reporting require--Upland game hunting areas and

bag and possession limits vary. Regulations give specfic information about hunting areas and management unit boundaries.

-A fully-feathed wing must remain on all dressed birds to allow identification of species and sex.

-Wanton killing for wasting of any game animal except a carnivore is a misdemeanor.

-It is illegal to party hunt, or help fill another hunter's bag.

It is unlawful to hunt on private land without permission or to shoot from or across a public highway.




