Kendrick School Board Met Sept. 13

The regular meeting of the Kendrick Jt. School Board was held Thursday, September 13 in the board room at the high school. The school board took a ride on the new school bus driven by the recently retired supervisor Marion Souders to Juliaetta Elementary School. The board toured the school seeing the summer improvement project of lowering ceilings and new fluorescent lighting in 4 classrooms and the hall-way.

Colette Cozort gave the staff report reviewing the science curriculum writing that she worked over the summer to complete. She received input from Nancy Monroe and John Johnson in the respective grade levels in which they also teach science. This curriculum continuum is the second area of the curriculum in which the school district has had staff members identify specific concepts to be covered at each secondary grade level. The English continuum was completed in the summer of 1982. Ms. Cozort emphasized that such a continuum would be most helpful for new teachers coming into the district when handed a textbook and wondering what should be covered in a given year. She explained that this would also give a new teacher an idea of what students had covered in the past.

In other new business, the board reviewed the national SRA tests scores by grade level for the 1983-84 school year. The board approved a 1/2 hour increase in time for an elementary aide to supervise elementary bus students who disembark when 2 buses that serve that area of the district stop at the elementary school before returning to the high school. The board also granted a quit claim deed to Jerry Brown for property on school house hill as well as approving an increase in salary for substitute teachers and hourly pay for extra-curricular bus drivers. Likewise, the board approved additional money in cooperation with the High School Boosters Club to construct restrooms for the high school sports field.

In old business, the board set November 6, general election day, as the voting day for the bond election for an addition on Juliaetta Elementary School. The board also took action for the replacement plan of the proposed addition should be on a 10-year plan versus 15 or 20 years because of great savings to taxpayers after reviewing the information received by the First Security Bank.

A discussion was also held on the best way of getting information about the bond election to the voters. It was decided to have a special board meeting at the elementary school in October for interested community patrons. This would be one major way of disseminating information, with the artect present, and answering questions community members had. The bond election will be for 200,000 less than was ask of the voters in 1979.

The next regular board meeting will be October 11 at 7:30 p. m.

POTLATCH DONATES MICROWAVE GENERATOR

Moscow—Potlatch Corporation has donated a \$32,000 microwave generator to the Department of Forest Products at the University of Idaho.

According to A. A. Moslemi, depa-

rtment head, the special generator is designed for experimental drying of wood, fiber, and particles.

"It is especially suited for laboratory demonstration of experimental drying of lumber and other wood industrial feedstocks," Moslemi said.

Moslemi said the generator is a powerful unit which will be used in teaching and research. It is also to be used for an annual workshop the department conducts each fall for industrial dry kiln operators from throughout Idaho and the region. This year's workshop will be held on campus Oct. 15-18.

This technology, if used properly, has the potential of reducing drying defects and thereby upgrad-

ing quality in lumber, wood fiber, and particle feedstocks, Moslemi said.

"We are pleased to have this addition to our laboratory as a part of our lab modernization program and as a part of our cooperation with Idaho's forest industries," Moslemi said.

Potlatch also funds a \$6,000 annual fellowship program for forest products majors at UI. That program currently is involved in research on chemically modifying wood fibers for a new specialized breed of wood products.

BRUCELLOSIS, CONTAGIOUS DISEASE

Brucellosis is a contagious disease that can affect dogs, cats, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, horses, bison, elk and man. Brucellosis is caused by bacteria that are susceptible to heat and sunlight and are killed by common disinfectants and pasteurization.

This bacteria will live up to 60 days in soil, water, or an aborted fetus. Freezing permits almost indefinite survival of the organism. It

remains visible in raw milk for days. Man becomes infected through the ingestion of contaminated unpasteurized milk or cheese, or thru contact with the tissues of infected animals.

Most human cases of brucellosis are from occupational exposures such as packing houses workers, veterinarians and ranchers. Human brucellosis may be an acute or chronic disease. The chronic form is characterized by a relapsing fever illness.

Brucellosis in cattle is usually seen as abortions in females and sterility in both sexes; although loss of milk production, retained placentas, smaller birth weights, and slow growth in calves that sur-

vive are also a problem.

Cattle usually contract the disease by ingestion of contaminated food and water. Infected baby calves pass the organism in feces and aborted tissues are heavily contaminated. Although all ages in a non-vaccinated, herd are susceptible, young cows 12-24 months old are

naturally immune and never abort.

Only heifer calves between the ages of 4 and 12 months may be vaccinated. Vaccinated calves are identified with a tattoo in the ear and an official metal ear tag. The metal ear tags are consecutively numbered and the number is recorded with the State Animal Health Office.

Brucellosis in dogs is character-


ized by abortion of females and infertility in males. Occasionally an infected animal will appear normal. There is no vaccine available for brucellosis in dogs. Blood tests are needed to establish a definite diagnosis. Human infections, although rare, have been observed in some

individuals who have handled infected dogs. Humans are usually resistant to the type of bacteria that causes brucellosis in dogs.

CAP records show that the citizen anti-poaching organization has paid or offered \$93,500 in rewards since it was formed in 1981. During the same period, \$62,369 in civil penalties have been assessed and fine and court costs against offenders totaled more than \$66,000.

Citizens can report suspected fish and game violations by calling CAP toll-free, 1-800-632-5999, and their identity will be protected, Bertwell emphasized.

Since 1981, conservation officers have investigated each of the 1,853 calls, resulting in 716 citations and 416 cases. Rewards from \$100 to \$500 are offered if an investigation produces a citation.

A large part of the reward fund comes from unsuccessful controlled hunt applicants who designate all or part of fee refunds for CAP. This year, hunters contributed \$32,685 to fund.

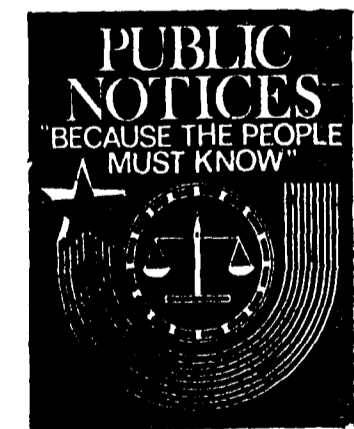

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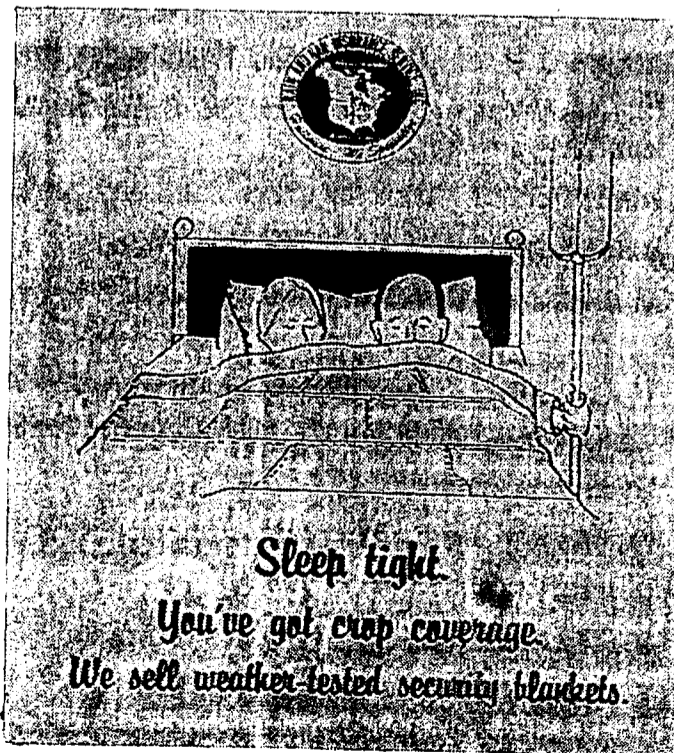
