Daymon Schneider Passes Sept. 26

Daymon F. Schneider, a mechanic with the U. S. Forest Service for much of 17 years, died of heart trouble Wednesday evening, Sept. 26. at the emergency room of Clear-water Valley Hospital at Orofino He was 68 and had suffered a stroke in May of 1980.

John Sager, Assistant Vice Presiment of First Security Bank Investment Division from Salt Lake City, Utah met Tuesday evening, Sept. 25 at 8:00 p.m. in a special board meeting at the high school board room. The purpose of the visit was to available wheat the Indicating additional control of the second special property and the second sec to explain what the Juliaetta addition bond election results would mean to the individual taxpayer and what the bond climate was like within the State of Idaho.

Mr. Sager reviewed his statistics with the board that showed that with the homeowners exemption a taxpayer with a \$25,000 home would show an average of \$2.06 per month increase while a person with a \$50,000 home would show a \$3.96 per month increase. Likewise, a person with a 160-acre farm with a market value, for property value purpose, of \$350 per acre would show a \$7.70 per month increase (\$350 per acre is an average ax market value of wheat land within Latah & Nez Perce boundaries of School District No. 283 according to the assessor's

figure.) Mr. Sager further explained that the bonding climate now in Idaho is about the best it has been within the past 5 years. He indicated that this has resulted in the passage of several school bond elections in sou-thern Idaho. He noted that Idaho school bonds are always in heavy demand particularly at the community level because of the tax exempt features that make them a more attractive investment than time certificates if an individual is above the 35% income tax bracket. He used the example that if a person in a 40% tax bracket buys a \$5,000 school bond at 9.25% interest for 10 years he would realize a 15.42% investment value.

The board took action to hire First Security Bank as the fiscal agent and Chapman-Cutler of Chicago, Illinois as the bond counsel for the upcoming bond election on November 6, 1984. This bond election is \$200,000 less than was asked of the voters in May, 1980.

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FISH & GAME TO STUDY BIGHORN SHEEP DIE-OFF

Lewiston-Reports of an unusual die-off of bighorn sheep in the Hells Canyon herd have prompted the Idaho Department of Fish and Game to initiate a study to find the cause. A dozen sick and dying bighorns have been observed in the area on both the Idaho and Oregon sides over the past several months.

Analysis of several carcasses has proved inconclusive. All were of animals eight and more years oldnear the maximum age for bighorn sheep-so death may have resulted from natural causes. Laboratory tests for most diseases are only elfective on sheep examined with an 10 hours of death. For this reason the Department plans to collect a few animals from the herd for study.

Only bighorns that display obvious symptoms of illness will be taken.

Idaho biologists have reason to be concerned. In 1983, a pneumona out break wiped out 70 percent of the bighorn sheep in Alberta, Canada's Waterton National Park herd. Soon after, the disease crossed the border and claimed several bighorns in adjacent Glacier National Park. The Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks has also reported losses in that state's Rocky Mountain Front herds. Researchers attribute the deaths to the combined effects of pneumonia, poor body condition and a high infestation of lungworms

Most Idaho bighorns also have lungworms. However, this condition by itself does not usually cause serious health problems. Wild bighorn sheep on good range are extremely resistant to disease. 
