

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CHUKARS TO BE RELEASED

About 14,000 chukars will soon be released from the Department of Fish and Game's Jerome Game Farm to avoid impact from some disease-causing agents, game bird manager for release as spring breeders in Gary Will said.

The birds, originally scheduled for release next spring, will go to areas closed to chukar hunting this season--Ada, Boise and Gem counties and portions of Elmore and Gooding counties, he added.

"We want to avoid an outbreak of coccidious, blackhead and tape-worm," Will explained. "These prolozoa and parasites usually lie dormant, but they can be activiated by

cool, wet weather."
Earlier his year, about 1,600 chu-kar chicks were killed by coccidios-is, but immediate medication eased that problem, he said.

"We are weighing the risk of a cool, wet fall, another hard winter and a cool, wet spring against the probability that the birds will make it on their own if they are released

to the Constitution in 1964, most people assumed the Legislature would have some authority to accept, reject or modify the state water plan developed by the appointed

Water Resources Board. A recent Idaho Supreme Court decision ruled that existing constitutional language was inadequate to grant such oversight. This amendment will preserve and protect the legitimate constitutional function of the Water Resources Board to formulate and implement a plan for the use of Idaho's public waters, yet restore final oversight of that plan by the elected

representatives of the people. 2. Some aspects of the state water plan are extra important. Public waters may be allocated to some groups of citizens and not to others. The economic well-being of cities, regions or individuals may be sharp ly impacted. It is, therefore, impor-tant that the principals of equal representation and accountability to the voters be part of the process. These

principles cannot be fully guaranteed through an appointed board. 3. Because the Idaho Water Resources Board is appointed, the potential exists for partisan or patronage appointments. These problems can be countered by insuring that the elected representatives of the people have influence in finalizing he water plan.

4. Legislative oversight on other major areas of state interest, such as education, corrections, other natural resources, or utilities, has not been withdrawn as has been done for management and development of water resources. The management and development of our water resources must be made subject to the subjec the review and oversight of the Legislature, just as are all other major concerns that affect Idaho's citi-

STATEMENTS AGAINST THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. The Idaho Water Resource Board is composed of citizens from all walks of life who are appointed by a Governor elected by popular vote. The board has the ability to utilize extensive hearing procedures to gather citizen input, allowing more thorough evaluation of the desires of the citizens of the State of Idaho. The Legislature does not have the time for extensive technical hoppings and in effected during cal hearings and is affected during its active session by numerous spe-cial interest groups which may in-fluence the decision-making process to the detriment of a majority of citizens of the State of Idaho.

2. The proposed amendment puts politics back into state water planning. The existing Constitution places the planning process in the hands of the general public through their Idaho Water Resource Board. Placing the final decision in the hands of the Legislature opens the deep to energial interest groups and door to special interest groups and partisan politics. The Idaho Water Resource Board holds public input sacred in formulating the state water plan. A defeat of the proposed amendment will leave state water planning in the hands of the people.


3. The complexities of water re-source management require the services of a single issue agency with both the resources and the time to do the job. The task must also include both a great degree of public education and public response. The Legislature, which must address many other important issues, has neither the time nor the expertise to make properly informed rather than merely political decisions about water management.

4. A viable long range plan for optimum development of the state's water resources must be consistent, with each part carefully comple-menting the others. Piecemeal amendment by legislative action will inevitably to violence to the integrity of the total plan and will not be in the public interest.


