





Constitutional Amendments

Two amendments to the Idaho Constitution will appear on the general election ballot. These have been proposed to the people for ratification following action by the legis-

The amendment proposals, the Legislative Council's statements of meaning and purpose, and the statements for and against are listed

H. J. R. No. 5

Section 5, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to read as follows:

SECTION 5. SENATORIAL AND REPRESENTATIVE DISTRICTS. A senatorial or representative district, when more than one county shall constitute the same, shall be composed of contiguous counting areas and no a county shall counties areas, and no a county challmay be divided in creating such dis-

The question to be submitted to the electors of the State of Idaho at the next general election shall be as

"Shall Section 5, Article III, of ho be amended to provide that sen-atorial or representative districts shall be composed of contiguous areas when more than one county constitutes the district and to provide that a county may be divided in creating such senatorial or representative districts for the Legislature of the State of Idaho?"

Legislative Council's Statement Of Meaning and Purpose H. J. R. No. 5

MEANING AND PURPOSE The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 5, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to allow counties to be divided in the formation of legislative districts.

EFFECT OF ADOPTION If this amendment is adopted, it will permit the formation of legislative districts that cross county

STATEMENTS FOR THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. Recent judicial decisions have shown that it is a practical impossi-bility to comply with the Idaho Con-stitution and not divide counties in forming legislative districts while complying with federal mandates to form legislative districts of equal population. This amendment will remove a barrier to the goal of achieving the "one-man, one-vote" principle of representative government.

2. Economic and social considerations do not follow county lines, most of which were established over a half-century ago. This amendment will allow legislative districts to be formed which can take these economic and social considerations into account, and still maintain a high degree of population equality.

3. Without this amendment, the large, unwieldy "floterial" legislative districts established by court order for the 1984 elections will be continued in some form or another. The large population numbers and the huge land areas included in the "floterial" districts have diluted the citizens' ability to know and contact their local legislators. If this amendment is adopted, legislative representation of a more local nature

can more easily be achieved. 4. Without this amendment, representation in the legislative body of the state will depend more on archaic county lines than people. Since only people vote, this amendment will allow legislative districts to be formed with the primary emphasis on the voting public, and not on county lines that were formed when the most common means of transportation was the horse and buggy.

STATEMENTS AGAINST THE

PROPOSED AMENDMENT 1. Splitting counties to form legislative districts will only lead to voter confusion as to who rep-

resents them in the Legislature. 2. The county unit is the most

basic of governmental units, and performs many important govern-mental functions. The county form of government should be strengthened and improved, not split and torn asunder as this amendment would do.

3. This amendment would allow rural, isolated areas to be combined with urban areas in forming legislative districts This practice will dilute the representation of the interests of our most important agricultural industry.

4. This section is a part of the original constitution of this state. It has served well for nearly a century, and the fact the 1984 legislative elections will be conducted in comformity with its requirements shows that no amendment is needed.

S.J. R. No. 117

Section 7, Article XV, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to read as follows: SECTION 7. STATE WATER RESOURCE AGENCY. There shall

be constituted a Water Resource Agency, composed as the Legislature may now or hereafter pre-scribe, which shall have power to formulate and implement a state water plan-for optimum development of water resources in the public interest; to construct and operate water projects; to issue bonds, without state obligation, to be repaid from revenues of projects; to generate and wholesale hydroelectric power at the site of production; to appropriate public waters as trustee for Agency projects; to acquire, transfer and encumber title to real property for water projects and to have control and administrative authority over state lands required for water projects; all under such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature. Additionally, The State Water Resource Agency shall have power to formulate and implement a state water plan for optimum development of water resources in the public interest. The Legislature of the State of Idaho shall have the authority to amend or reject the state water plan in a manner provided by law. Thereafter any change in the state water plan shall be submitted to the Legislature of the State of Idaho upon the first day of a regular session following the change and the change shall

"Shall Section 7, Article XV, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to provide that the Legislature shall have the authority to amend or reject the State Water Plan in a manner provided by law and that any change in the State Wa-ter Plan shall be submitted to the State Legislature upon the first day of a Regular Session following the change and the change shall become effective unless amended or rejected by law within sixty days of sub-mission to the Legislature?"

Legislative Council's Statement of Meaning and Purpose

S.J.R. No. 117 **MEANING AND PURPOSE**

The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 7, Article XV, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to specifically give the Legislature constitutional authority to amend or reject the state water plan in a manner provided by law.

EFFECT OF ADOPTION

If this amendment is adopted, it will eliminate any confusion about the role of the people's elected representatives and senators in the formation of water policy as prescribed in the state water plan for optimum development of water resources in the public interest.

> STATEMENTS FOR THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT 1. When this section was added

to the Constitution in 1964, most people assumed the Legislature would have some authority to accept, reject or modify the state water plan developed by the appointed Water Resources Board. A recent Idaho Supreme Court decision ruled that existing constitutional language was inadequate to grant such oversight. This amendment will preserve and protect the legitimate constitutional function of the Water Resources Board to formulate and implement a plan for the use of Idaho's public waters, yet restore final oversight of that plan by the elected representatives of the people.

2. Some aspects of the state water plan are extra important. Public waters may be allocated to some groups of citizens and not to others. The economic well-being of cities, regions or individuals may be sharply impacted. It is, therefore, important that the principals of equal representation and accountability to the voters be part of the process. These principles cannot be fully guaranteed through an appointed board.

3. Because the Idaho Water Resources Board is appointed, the potential exists for partisan or patroncan be countered by insuring that the elected representatives of the people have influence in finalizing the water plan.

4. Legislative oversight on other major areas of state interest, such as education, corrections, other natural resources, or utilities, has not been withdrawn as has been done for management and development of water resources. The management and development of our water resources must be made subject to the review and oversight of the Leg-islature, just as are all other major concerns that affect Idaho's citi-

STATEMENTS AGAINST THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. The Idaho Water Resource Board is composed of citizens from all walks of life who are appointed by a Governor elected by popular vote. The board has the ability to utilize extensive hearing procedures to gather citizen input, allowing more thorough evaluation of the de-sires of the citizens of the State of Idaho. The Legislature does not have the time for extensive techni-cal hearings and is affected during its active session by numerous special interest groups which may in-fluence the decision-making process to the detriment of a majority of citizens of the State of Idaho.

2. The proposed amendment puts politics back into state water planning. The existing Constitution places the planning process in the hands of the general public through their Idaho Water Resource Board. Placing the final decision in the hands of the Legislature opens the door to special interest groups and partisan politics. The Idaho Water Resource Board holds public input sacred in formulating the state water plan. A defeat of the proposed amendment will leave state water planning in the hands of the people.

3. The complexities of water resource management require the services of a single issue agency with both the resources and the time to do the job. The task must also include both a great degree of public education and public response. The Legislature, which must address many other important issues, has neither the time nor the expertise to make properly informed rather than merely political decisions about water management.

4. A viable long range plan for optimum development of the state's water resources must be consistent, with each part carefully complementing the others. Piecemeal amendment by legislative action will inevitably to violence to the integrity of the total plan and will not be in the public interest.

Organic Farming— The Way of the Future

The chemical issue is propably the most critical issue of our time. Cru-cial because it affects every living thing. It was a sad day when the first sack of chemical fertilizer was dumped on the Palouse with its promise of get rich, quick and easy, leading to abandonment of the most economical and effective conservation plan ever developed. A look at chemical farming's track record. Overproduction, ever-decreasing profits, ever-increasing expenses: sulting in the most expensive "bailout" in history and a financial crisis second only to the great depress ion. Chemicals have polluted our environment to the danger point, destroyed the physical structure of the soil, leaving an erosion problem comparable to the 30s.. Now we have conservation tillage, more chemicals and a return to stubble-burning-a plague of the '40s that we worked so long and hard to eliminate. Unless chemical usage is slowed down we may well see laws limiting its

Concerned scientists with the fut. ure well-being of our society in mind, have developed the alternatives to greatly reduce the need for chemi-

cals.

The alternatives are crop rotations, field sanitation (moldboard plowing), biological and microbiological control of insects and disease, Genetic engineering and highly selective insecticides, microble created fertilizers and soil condit-ioners. Combine this with grass. legumes and green manure plow down. We have organic farming—the met-Mr. and Mrs. Tom Flowers of hods by which the majority of the world's food will be produced in the next century.

The future well-being of all living things depends on the immediate support and establishment of a national pilot program of all-organic farms and regenerative farms where the alternatives to chemicals can be field tested and further developed. Organic farming will put agriculture within financial reach of the beginner, and stabilize the established. Soil Conservation Districts should
