UI Plant Protection Seminar will be Held Jan. 7-11 in Twin Falls Marlene Fritz Assistant Agricultural Editor

Twin Falls, Idaho—The University of Idaho College of Agriculture will hold a five-day Plant Protection Seminar January 7-11 in Twin Falls.

The conference provides intensive training in reduction of pest-conrelated crop losses and is aimed at growers, consultants, feed dealers, agricultural enforcement officials, agricultural chemical dealers, appli-

cators and field representatives. It will be held at the Holiday Inn from 12:45 p. m. January 7 through January 11.

January 11. Topics include insect, weed and plant disease identification and con-trol; bee poisoning; nematodes; ro-dents; pesticide fires and spills; cal-ibration and chemigation. Sessions will also be held on pesticide disposal and injury, performance complaints, determining spray patterns of ground rigs, computers, media rela-tions, fertilizer-disease interactions and identification of nutrient defi-

Both chemical and non-chemical control methods will be discussed to help participants make better decisions regarding the effective, econo-mical and environmentally sound control of pests.

The advance registration fee, which must be received before Dec. 21, is \$75. Registration after that date is \$85.

Participants who would like to earn 2.3 Continuing Education Units from the University of Idaho must pay an additional \$5.
