Christmas Safety Tips Offered

Christmas is an exciting and joyous time for all people. Unfortunately, it is also a time for many fire related accidents. The State Fire Marshal offers the following safety tips:

1. When choosing a Christmas tree, make sure it is not already too dry. You can check this by thumping the stump-end of the tree on the ground to see if the needles are dry and falling off.
2. Re-trim the base of the tree and place it in a holder that contains water. You may have to add water every day, so check it regularly. This will keep your tree from drying out too rapidly and will also keep it looking good.
3. Choose only Underwriters Laboratories (UL) of the U. S. or Canada listed lighting fixtures for your tree. Do not use candles. Keep extension cords out of the way of foot traffic. Check your lighting fixtures to discard worn lighting rather than trying to fix them. Do not place lights on artificial, metal trees.
4. Flame retardant applied to your tree is a good idea. Your local fire departments can give you details on this. Trees placed in businesses, churches, institutions, and other places open to the public should all be treated with flame retardant.
5. Place your tree in a safe area within the home keeping in mind distances from heat producing appliances and exit ways.
6. Remove your tree immediately after the holiday season and discard it properly. Burning the tree in fireplaces or wood burning stoves is not recommended unless the boughs are trimmed off and discarded.
7. Christmas wrappings should be discarded outside the house immediately after gifts are opened. Do not burn Christmas wrappings in stoves or fireplaces. Burning a large amount of paper in these appliances can lead to a chimney fire.
8. A good pre-season gift for the family would be a smoke detector for protection during the holiday season and the rest of the year as well. A smoke detector is an excellent choice for anyone on your shopping list.

Fuel Assistance Applications To Open Nov. 5

This winter's federal Low Energy Assistance Program gets its start in Idaho Monday, when applications will begin to be taken November 5, 1984, from the state's low-income elderly and handicapped residents for help in paying fuel costs. The program provides one-time checks for energy payments to people who meet certain qualification guidelines. This year, the guidelines have been raised to make more people eligible to receive the checks than have qualified in past seasons. The change will particularly affect a number of Social Security recipients. Food Stamp people will receive their application in the mail, but others who think they might qualify can contact one of a number of central Idaho public service offices. It is the responsibility of the people applying for the program to bring in proof of their income for each household member 16 and over. We have to have proof of income before we can take applications. Also required are a fuel bill, an electric bill and Social Security cards. Checks will begin to be issued sometime the latter part of November, 1984. More Tagging Stations Available for Bobcat Trappers, Hunters

Lewiston— Trappers and hunters who take bobcat or lynx during this December 1-December 31 season will have an easier time getting their pelts tagged this year, with five tagging stations set up throughout the region. To comply with the mandatory tagging requirement, sportsmen must present their pelts to one of the following stations within 10 days after the close of the season. Lewiston—Idaho Department of Fish & Game office, open weekdays, 8 a. m.-5 p. m. December 3-January 10. Peck—Idaho Trappers Association Fur Sale, all day, December 15. Moscow—Moscow Hide and Fur, 9 a. m.-5 p. m. December 14 and January 4. Kamiah—Idaho Department of Fish & Game Holding Pen, every Wednesday 1 p. m.-6 p. m. December 5-January 9. Riggins—Rapid River Fish Hatchery 8 a. m.-5 p. m. December 17 and January 7. At the time of tagging, the whole carcass with skull attached must be surrendered to Department personnel. Trappers and hunters must also report the sex of each animal harvested and the location, date and method of take. The Department of Fish and Game is conducting a continuing study of the state's bobcat and lynx populations. Biologists are able to estimate the age of an animal from its teeth, and they can determine reproductive success from an examination of the carcass. The cost of the tag is \$2.00. An additional fee of 50 cents will be charged for each transaction. Sportsmen who expect to take several bobcat or lynx during the season may wish to bring in all their pelts to be tagged at one time in order to minimize the transaction fee. For more information on the bobcat and lynx season, sportsmen may obtain a free copy of the 1984-85 Idaho Trapping Seasons and Regulations wherever hunting licenses are sold.

Free Firewood At Dworshak

The popular free-use firewood program at Dworshak Reservoir will begin at 8:00 a. m. on December 1, 1984. The Corps of Engineers is making blowdown materials available for home use. The wood materials have recently been removed and decked out at the Bruce's Eddy Launch Area. Located across the top of the dam, Bruce's Eddy is easily accessible to vehicles. The area is open weekends ONLY from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m. Woodcutters are required to stop at the Visitor Center for a free permit after loading up their rigs. All wood must be cut into lengths less than 8 feet. All species are decked without sorting and will be available for cutting on that basis. All you need is a powersaw and pickup truck or wood trailer to take advantage of this free firewood. This program will continue until the blowdown wood which is decked at Bruce's Eddy has been exhausted.
